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THE PRESIDENT' S REPORT

Socorro L. Reyes, Ph.D.

This report will depart from the traditional style of enumerating the achievements of the President's term, glorifying little successes while ignoring areas of neglect and will instead look critically at what it has done and failed to do. Not that the PSSC has not advanced the agenda it has set for itself for the 1990's as expertly and lucidly crafted by the 1989 Task Force.

In the past year, it continued to commitment of PSSC to address the "become an effective organization in influencing the shaping of public opinion and in the formulation of public policy which will enhance the quality of life." This was particularly manifested in the active participation of a core group of social scientists in the deliberation of R.A. 4846 otherwise known as the "Cultural **Properties** Preservation and Protection Act." As a result of these efforts, more measures will be taken to prevent the massive looting of our cultural treasures which constitute our legacy as a people. Corollary to this is the joint undertaking of a historical and archaeological study of Panhutongan. PSSC, Placer by the the National Museum, and the Surigaonon Heritage Foundation. Funding for the project is from the Toyota Foundation, the Daiwa Bank Foundation for Asia and Oceania, the Oriental Ceramics Society, Caltex, Philippines and several friends of the SSC.

The PSSC also inputted its the study recommendations to being undertaken the Congressional by Commission on Education in a meeting with its Executive Director, Dr. Dionisia Rola. Among the suggestions it made are: 1) social science participation in the revision of textbooks from the elementary to the tertiary levels; 2) the setting up of a regional speakers' bureau to present balanced discussions on issues; and 3) democratization the of educational opportunities through the encouragement of alternative strategies such as nonformal education and the use of mass media.

In response to the request for PSSC to take a position against the harmful consequences of the Small Scale Mining (R.A. 7076) on the traditional, Act indigenous miners of the North, the Social Issues Committee presented Fulgencio Secretary Factoran of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources a position paper appealing to his sense of fairness and justice in protecting the interests of this group in the formulation of the implementing guidelines.

We could have performed better and contributed more. There were other equally if not bigger and harder issues where we could have made our presence felt: military bases, foreign debt, budget deficit and new taxes, decentralization, housing for the urban poor, electoral

reform, environmental issues, etc.. While it is true that it is extremely difficult for any position to gel on these controversial issues, the greater problem was getting together the social scientists to even sit down and talk over coffee in a forum addressing these pressing socio-economic political concerns. And when we and manage to get together, we come up with bright and profound ideas nobody would like to implement due to tight schedules, prior commitments, etc., etc., Neither have we revived our linkage with the NGO community focused on these problems. The PSSC has been trying to rebuild our connections with them but the review to design sustainable activities and institute an NGO desk has been on-going for quite sometime now.

In terms of human resource development, the PSSC did its small share in the skills of government enhancing personnel at project impact evaluation seminar-workshop through on а evaluation research for the employees of Project Development the Office of Services of the Department of Interior and Local Government. In pursuit of its goal to "facilitate the formation of a selfgenerating critical mass of competent social scientists in the various disciplines", the PSSC continues with its Research Awards Program (RAP) which supplementary provides assistance to social science graduate students to undertake thesis or dissertation research. In 1991, there were 14 grantees (a total of 386 so far) with a significant number teaching in regional schools or universities. During this year also, the PSSC held the first of a series of colloquia to disseminate research results. A remarkable achievement was the organization of Valley Social Research the Cagayan Consortium composed of five schools: the Cagayan State University, Isabela State University, St. Mary's College, St. Paul's

University, and the Nueva Vizcaya State Institute of Technology.

And then it happened. The Governing Council and the Executive Board were locked in a serious organizational issue of who has power over what, when, and how, to paraphrase the respected political scientist. Harold Lasswell. While it cropped up over the selection procedure for the position of Executive Director, such conflict was bound to happen with the presence of two super bodies with overlapping turfs and recycled membership. Looking positively at the incident threatened which disrupt to the functioning of the organization, one can look happily at the formation of a task force to review the structures and bylaws of the PSSC. Hopefully, it will recommend the formation of one and only policy-making collective one where decisions will be reached in a democratic, participatory process.

But the PSSC continued with its tasks and the incumbent Executive Director. Professor Ruben F. Trinidad was reelected to a third term. We hosted the Ninth Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils Biennial Conference from August 5 to 6, 1991 and subsequently, the Ioint **UNESCO-**AASSREC regional symposium on human resource development on August 8 to 10, 1991. The Secretariat has been lauded several times for a job well done and I would like to add my personal compliments to the hard-working, competent, efficient staff. While the present administration tried its best to augment their salaries and provide benefits, we realize this is not enough. The next leadership will surely pick up this concern and continue exploring various means and alternatives to upgrade the present material incentives and rewards for the staff.

Still in the area of networking and building linkages, PSSC revived the PSSC-Chinese Academy of Social Sciences Exchange Program by sending Ms. Eloisa Parco of the History Department of the University of Sto. Tomas to the People's Republic of China and hosting two scholars from the same.

With all the problems and difficulties, both internal and external, the PSSC faced in 1991, its accomplishments are not bad after all. We could have performed better and contributed more. As the torch is passed, I wish to offer some thoughts to my successor on top of course of the tons of good luck and best wishes that come with these suggestions:

1. Develop new programs with social development thrust that will attract fresh funding and perk up the staff. When was the last time the PSSC was involved in actionoriented, policy research? How do we attract a paying clientele to avail of our well-designed training modules?

2. Provide sanctions for habitual absentees in committee meetings and while substitutes are welcome occasionally, refrain from allowing their permanent presence unless they formally take over from their principals after the latter's unavailability in three consecutive meetings.

3. Cultivate ties with NGOs. They hold the key to the country's progress and democratization. PSSC does not have to train its sight very far in search for these groups. They are right here in our premises doing their share in national development: for alternative legal assistance, the Legal Resource Center and BATAS; for fisherfolk interest, TAMBUYOG; for victims of political repression, FIND; for the protection of peasants, the Philippine Peasant Institute; for conthe Church-Based sumers, Consumers' Movement; and for the propagation of indigenous culture, Asian Council the for People's Culture. They are our partners for national development.

4. Be more proactive in influencing public policy decisions. Take on issues with significant social, economic and political impact.

5. Energize the organization with new, young, brilliant minds. Institutionalize a succession mechanism that will open doors to the promising and talented. Limit the number of terms any one social scientist can stay in any PSSC position.

6. Be sure that the results of PSSC discussions are widely disseminated to the rank and file of the member organizations. As a starter, inquire about the elections and regular meetings of these associations to determine whether their representatives to the PSSC still hold the popular mandate.

7. Open up committees to Associate Members. They have resources and ideas to contribute and might even be more religious in their attendance and participation in PSSC activities.

This is not an exhaustive list. You will learn and unlearn more as you journey through your term.

THE YEAR IN RETROSPECT

ORGANIZATION

 ${f T}$ he PSSC in 1991 was under the leadership of the following officers: Governing Council chairperson Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon (Philippine National Historical Society) and vice-chairperson Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar (Philippine Political Science Association); Executive Board president Dr. Socorro L. Reyes (Philippine Political Science Association), vicepresident Dr. Amaryllis Τ. Torres (Psychological Association of the Philippines), and treasurer Dr. Hector B. Morada (Philippine Population Association). The Executive Director, Prof. Ruben F. Trinidad, was secretary of both the Governing Council and the Executive Board.

Prof. Trinidad, whose second term as Executive Director ended on September 30, 1991, was reappointed to a third term (October 1, 1991-September 30, 1994). Under his directorship for the past six years the PSSC has undergone certain organizational changes meant to make the institution stronger and more responsive to both internal and external factors.

The first half of 1991, however, was marked by some controversy regarding the functions of the Governing Council and the Executive Board. To deal with this, a task force was created in

September review the to structural organization and the by-laws of PSSC. The task force, composed of founders and former chairpersons of the Executive Board, is headed by Dr. Mercedes B. Concepcion (demography) with the following members: Fr. Jaime C. Bulatao, S.J. (psychology), Dr. Cristina P. Parel (statistics), Dr. Domingo C. Salita (geography), and Dr. Bonifacio P. Sibayan (linguistics).

The year ended with the admission of a new associate member to the PSSC, the Philippine-China Development Resource Center (PDRC). It is the 37th associate member of the Council. Established in March 1990, the PDRC aims "to promote awareness of the problems of development in the Philippines and China (including Taiwan and Hongkong), and to foster understanding of Philippine-China relations among private and public institutions and individuals in the country." PDRC activities include research and databanking, publication (it publishes a bimonthly magazine, PDRC Currents), educational modules, conferences and symposia. Located in No. 23 Madison Street, New Manila, Quezon City, the PDRC is directed by Ms. Theresa C. Carino.

PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

 \mathbf{T} raining Program. In the area of Seminar-workshop training, a on Evaluation Research for the Office of the Project Development Services (OPDS) of the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) was conducted last June 17-22, 1991. This training which was conducted under auspices of the the Research, Training and Development Division was attended by 23 DILG employees. The seminar-workshop had as its main objective the development of basic skills in undertaking project impact evaluation. To address this goal, lectures and discussions on evaluation research. measures and indicators of project benefits and impact, methods of datagathering, analysis and interpretation of data, and report writing were held. For this training, Dr. Robert C. Salazar of the Philippine Sociological Society and De La University served Salle as **Project** Director.

The seminar-workshop culminated with a program attended by Dr. Salazar, OPDS Assistant Director Jose Miguel de la Rosa, and PSSC Executive Director Ruben F. Trinidad.

connection In with the training activities of the Research Training and Development Division, a brochure on PSSC social research training programs is already set for printing. The production of this brochure was conceptualized to PSSC aggressively market training programs. The "PSSC Training Brochure in Social Research" will include implementation available on training modules as well as the amenities and facilities that the PSSCenter has.

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RESEARCH AWARDS PROGRAM

One of the central mandates of the Philippine Social Science Council (PSSC) is to facilitate the formation of a critical mass of social scientists in the various disciplines. In response to this, the Research Awards Program (RAP) of the PSSC has continuously provided supplementary assistance to social science graduate students to undertake their thesis or dissertation research.

The Council has further subsidized the amount of grant from P3,000 to P5,000 in consideration of the rising cost of doing research work. Furthermore, the Research Committee has recently evaluated the existing RAP policies. As a result, the committee has come up with a list of revised research guidelines for prospective grantees and with a set of suggestions for PSSC to address the issue of upgrading the quality of PSSC-funded researches.

Since the launching of the program, a total of 386 applicants have benefited from the RAP including the 14 grantees this year. Of this number, 241 were in the MA/MS level, 132 in the Ph.D. level, and 13 grants given to established social scientists who undertook individual research projects.

Most of the grantees were in the fields of psychology (16%), sociology (10.1%), and linguistics (8.5%). Notable perhaps is the sizeable representation of grantees (11.9%) who were in the field of education with research papers of social science concern.

Majority of the grantees came from the University of the Philippines (58.3%)

and from the Atenco de Manila University (15%). Only a small number of the grantees were from schools or universities in the provinces. This does not mean, however, that the grants were not equitably distributed throughout the other regions. A closer look at their institution reveals that significant affiliation а number of the grantees actually came regional schools/universities and from offices taking up their masters or doctoral degrees in institutions here in Metro Manila

Grantees who have completed their studies submitted their research work, copies of which are available in the PSSC Library. However, a significant number of the grantees are in the incomplete and inactive category. To correct this problem, efforts were made to contact them. Alternatively, the directory of RAP grantees is now being updated.

Early this ycar, the Research Committee launched the first of a series of colloquia. This serves as the venue for the dissemination of the com pleted research works accomplished by the RAP grantees. Four grantees presented their research works, namely, Mr. Rolando C. Cronico, Dr. Ma. Lourdes G. Rebullida, Dr. Lourdes E. Abandingo, and Dr. Luis Dery. Also, a number of the grantees submitted a two page summary of their works which was distributed during the colloquium. Copies are available in the PSSC Library as well as in the RTD Division of PSSC

The colloquium was participated in not only by the RAP grantees but also by some professionals from various social science institutions, students from St. Scholastica's College, members of the PSSC Research Committee, and the PSSC Secretariat.

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INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Vallev Social Cagavan Research Consortium. The Cagayan Valley Social Research Consortium (CVSRC) was conceptualized through the initiative of the PSSC Institutional Development Committee with the support of UNESCO the latter's HRD Program. The under objectives of the program are the following:

1. to decentralize institutional research capability with the intent of reducing the so-called Manilamonopoly of talents;

2. to increase the pool of researchers who can meet the growing demand for social sciencebased data for policy-making and program planning; and

3. to enable local researchers to respond more immediately to social problems in their respective regions and provinces.

Five institutions in the region namely, Cagayan State University (CSU), Isabela State University (ISU), St. Mary's College (SMC), St. Paul University (SPU), and Nueva Vizcaya State Institute of Technology (NVSIT) will form the consortium.

To formally organize the consortium, a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) the was drafted by participating institutions during its first organizational meeting held at PSSC last June 1990. It further revised during its second was organizational meeting held at Isabela State University in Echague. Presently, the PSSC Secretariat is revising the draft discussed during the last MOA as meeting. The revised MOA is due for presentation to the respective presidents of the institutions sometime in January 1992.

After the presentation of the MOA to the university presidents, the signing will be scheduled sometime in February 1992.

SOCIAL ISSUES

Protection of Cultural Treasures. The Issues Committee (SICom) Social concern for the nation's expanded its cultural treasures by embarking on a fullarchaeologically-rich blow n study of barangays of Placer, Surigao del Norte. Through the efforts of Dr. Leslie E. president of the Philippine Bauzon, National Historical Society and current Chairperson of the Council, funds for the study were granted by The Toyota Foundation, the Daiwa Bank Foundation for Asia and Oceania, the Oriental Ceramics Society, Caltex Philippines, and several friends of PSSC who believe in the same goal of conserving our national treasures. The Presidential Committee on Culture and the Arts donated equipment for archaeological exploration.

The exact site of the Surigao project is the barrio of Panhutongan in Placer, approximately 33 kilometers southeast of Surigao City. In 1990, the site was brought to the attention of PSSC upon the discovery of dug-out log coffins and ceramics pottery in the Panhutongan Elementary School grounds. Reporting the discovery was the Surigaonon Heritage Foundation, Inc., group a oſ local teachers and historians who have organized themselves for the study and conservation Surigao of culture and history. By coincidence, the PSSC through the SICom had earlier held discussions with the National Museum to work with them on the protection of

cultural treasures. The Document of Understanding covering this arrangement was signed in May 1991.

In early March 1991, a scientific team from Manila visited Panhutongan to assess the site, and they discovered that in addition to the school site, there are cave burial sites nearby.

The first formal field excavation took place from October 8 to November 6, 1991 under the direction of Dr. Eusebio Z. Dizon of the National Museum. The purpose of this first field activity was to verify the presence of dug-out coffins burial and other associated cultural remains as well as to establish the stratigraphy of the site. The rest of the team was composed of Alfredo B. Orogo, Museum Researcher; Eduardo Bersamira, Artist/Illustrator; and Alejandro Regino Ernesto Maloles. Museum Techand nicians.

Fieldwork had to be interrupted because the heaviest rainfall in Surigao is between the months of November to January, brought about by the northeast monsoon. Archaeological, cultural and historical research will continue starting April 1992.

A significant aspect of the Surigao project is the participation of the community in the activities, having taken a keen interest in the possible results. During the March visit of the Manila team to the barangay, a meeting with the residents was called to discuss with them the significance of their prehistorical past and the importance of the prehistoric remains in the archaeological site. The people have exerted efforts to protect the site from treasure hunters. The Surigaonon Heritage Foundation plans to set up a museum to house the cultural treasures of the province.

Agrarian Reform. Continuing its interest in and concern for agrarian

reform, Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar, chairman of the SICom Task Force on Agrarian Reform, and two other members of the Secretariat attended the Conference on the Agrarian Reform Agenda for 1992 held at the Institute of Agrarian Studies (IAST) in U.P. Los Banos on October 2, 1991. The conference marked the start of a series of multisectoral consultations focusing on the identification of critical areas of concern in agrarian reform. The ultimate goal of the consultations is the formulation of a policy agenda on agrarian reform for the incoming 1992 leadership and a legislative political agenda on CARP in the next five years.

Selected academic institutions and DAR offices in the regions concerned assist the IAST in this endeavor. After the initial conference in Los Banos. consultations were held in Benguet State Trinidad, University in La Benguet (October 25, 1991) and Don Severino Agriculture College in Indang, Cavite (November 8, 1991). Preliminary reports of these activities have been written up and disseminated by the IAST. The points taken up during the consultations issues and problems of CARP include implementation, critical areas of concern which should be included in the 1992 agrarian reform agenda, and action plans that should be undertaken to ensure that agrarian reform program will be the articulated and adopted by the new political leaders.

Educational Reforms. The SICom invited Dr. Dionisia Rola who was Executive Director of the Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM) to a meeting to brief them on the commission's functions and procedures of reviewing and assessing the educational and manpower training system of the country. The goal of the review was to enable the EDCOM to recommend policies and programs to improve the system.

Submitted to the EDCOM after the PSSC meeting were recommendations which include participation of PSSC in the initiation and revision of textbooks in the social sciences from the elementary to the tertiary levels; a regional speakers' bureau to present balanced discussions on issues of national and local importance that will contribute to citizenship training, value formation and relevant knowledge in the social sciences; and the adoption of policies which will democratize education opportunities through the encouragement of alternative strategies, such as the use of non-formal education. mass media and increased through scholarship grants to access special teachers who will be involved in these alternative strategies.

Implementing Guidelines for the Small Scale Mining Act of 1991. Throughout August and September 1991, a government-created Inter-Agency Committee held a series of meetings to look into the implementing regulations of R.A. 7076, "Small Scale Mining Act of 1991."

Ms. Evelyn Caballero, anthropologist and member of both the Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao and the Philippine National Historical Society, participated in the discussions together with Atty. Augusto Gatmaytan of the Legal Rights Center. Ms. Caballero's participation as a social the committee was crucial scientist in because R.A. 7076 will affect the lives of traditional small scale miners in the Cordillera whose communities are threatened by big business and ineffective support. government She was not involved in the earlier stage of discussing the bill, and it was too late to introduce amendments or to suggest the repeal of the bill. 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The clauses were written up in a position paper prepared by Ms. Caballero and Atty. Gatmaytan and signed by members of the SICom. The paper, which was submitted to DENR Secretary Fulgencio Facto ran, carried the SICom's position on R.A. 7076, on the draft of latter's implementing rules and the regulations, and on the process oſ conducting public hearings.

Resources for People Program (RPP). The RPP, which was launched in 1986, is PSSC's attempt to work more closely with the grass roots through partnership with development NGOs. The program was inactive in 1991. The last time the RPP was active was in 1990 when it ran a series of discussions with government agencies and non-government groups on selected national issues and the general topic of strengthening GO-NGO-social science working relationship.

In the meantime, the suggestion that the RPP be organized around specific projects make room for the to participation of NGOs was made. Two possible projects are the protection of cultural treasures with the NGOs helping to provide information and mobilizing the grassroots for appropriate action, and an inform ation campaign on the Local Government Code.

The RPP review is an ongoing activity and will continue through the first quarter of 1992.

PSSC Social Science Information. The PSSC Social Science Information newsletter-cum journal came out in three issues in 1991.

A double issue for January-June 1991 had the theme "Issues in Governance" and featured articles by members of the Philippine Political Science Association: "Issues of Governance: Taming or Uplifting Labor?" by Lourdes Rebullida; "Political Development for the Muslims in Mindanao" by Carmencita T. Aguilar; "Solving the Mindanao Conflict through the Multilateral Approach" by Rudy B. Rodil: and "The Corporate Stock Distribution Scheme in Agrarian Reform: A Study in Hacienda Luisita" by Dolores M. Tan.

The issue for July-September-1991 was prepared with the assistance of the Philippines Communication Society and featured the following: "Media Education: Setting" Fr. Worth mentioning is the special arrangement which the Philippine National Historical Society (PNHS) entered into with the Heritage Publishing House for the latter to subsidize future issues of The Journal of History. To be published in the forth coming issues are the H. Otley Beyer Collection. (Please refer to the report of the PNHS for more information about the arrangement.)

Desktop Publishing Unit. The PSSC started its own desktop publishing activities in January 1991 through a grant of US\$10,000 from the UNESCO for the purchase of equipment, which includes one 386 SX PC, one 286 PC, one Hewlett-Packard Laser Jet III printer, one dot matrix printer, a scanner, and two mice. Software used are Ventura Publisher, Wordstar v.6.0, GEM Artline and Image 72.

In addition getting journal to manuscripts oſ member associations camera-ready, the Desktop Publishing Unit serviced 10 other outside offices and individuals in 1991 for printed programs, new sletters. papers and conference proceedings.

In-charge of the Unit are Elvira Angeles, Secretary of the Information and Special Services Division, and Lourdes Pacuribot, Editor.

The Frank X. Lynch Library. The year 1991 was an important year for the Frank X. Lynch Library. Two sets were added to its Special Collection – a) Visual (coded VS) - 113Schemes Collection titles of books monographs and and undergraduate a number of theses on Communication donated by the Visual Schemes, a non-government organization which used to be based at the PSSC and the b) Nicolas P. Lansigan Collection (coded NPL) - 7 titles of books, journals and magazines on Forestry donated by Nicolas P. Lansigan, a noted Filipino forester. Mr. Lansigan did research in the Library while working on his autobiography.

The Netherlands Organization for International Development Cooperation (NOVIB), also an NGO, donated their 1987-1990 issues of MIDWEEK and the Philippine News and Features.

With an increased library budget for 1991, the PSSC was able to purchase 155 new titles of books pertaining to the social sciences.

The Research and Training Division forwarded more than 20 titles of theses and dissertations authored by the Research Awards Program (RAP) grantces.

The library collection in 1991 is thus compared with last year:

Losses have been found to be minimal.

Central Subscription Service (CSS). The CSS operations under the semiautonomous arrangement with PSSC grossed P439,324 in the sales from the consigned books and monographs of other publishers and proceeds amounting to P166,303 from journals sales.

The hiring of a marketing assistant helped to facilitate sale of the above, including the follow-up of CSS goods in the following outlets: National Bookstore (10 locations), Goodwill Bookstore (4 locations), Merriam Webster, Popular Bookstore, University Book Center in U.P. Diliman, Greatbooks Trading, Solidaridad, National Historical Institute, Philippine Materials Service, and the Institute of Philippine Culture in the Atenco de Manila University. These outlets helped distribute various books and journals carried by the CSS.

The CSS also participated in 13 book exhibits throughout the year, including Cebu and Bacolod. tw o in City respectively, as member of the Association of Booksellers for the Academe and the Professions (ABAP).

The CSS has directly assisted the Philippine National Historical Society, Philippine Political Science Association, and the Philippine Sociological Society in publishing their journals by following up publishers' sworn statements, mailing permits and making arrangements for printing.

COMPUTERIZATION

Research Awards Program Databank. An on-going RAP activity is the updating of individual files of the RAP grantees for the development of a complete and accurate easy-to-access RAP Databank. There are six files kept for all grantees: the folder files, the index card files; the RAP Grantees' Directory, list of RAPfunded researches, tables, and graphs.

A folder file contains the grantee's letter of application; application form; the contract with the grantee's signature; correspondence letters between PSSC and the grantee; cash voucher file copy; and also a copy of the proposed research paper. An index card file contains the grantee's grant number, amount of grant, address, home and office mailing addresses. telephone number. the discipline to which the topic of the proposed paper belongs, the title of the project and schedule of fund releases and of reports to bc submitted by the grantce. The RAP Grantee's Directory contains the grantee's name, mailing address, home and office addresses, and telephone number. The list of RAP-funded researches contains the grantee's name and grant number, the title of the project, project status, and the year the project was completed. A table contains the list of grantees grouped according to certain variables such as: (a) year and status; (b) school and area; (c) school and year; (d) degree and discipline; (3) degree and year; and (f) discipline and year. A graph describes in realistic detail the variation (e.g. discipline) of а variable in comparison with that of one or more variables (c.g. degree).

Moreover, the Research, Training and Development Division (RTD) has come up with a complete collection of abstracts of RAP-funded researches from 1973 to the present. Mimeographed copies of

these will soon be made available at the Frank X. Lynch Library and the Central Subscription Service (CSS).

Data Base of Training Participants. The preparation of the data base on PSSCconducted trainings, particularly on the Program Summer Research Training which were conducted before, and those attended by the Department of Interior and Local Government and the Bureau of Agricultural Statistics is still ongoing. The Research Training and Development Division which handles the computerization of these information started inputting the data during the second quarter of 1991. However, due to additional information which were overlooked during the preparation of the data base, a modification of the data base structure had to be done. Though the inputting of information has slackened because of this modification, there already is a total of 145 records being kept in the data bank. Inputting of records is on-going as filled-up *aucstionnaires* sent participants to continue to come in.

As conceptualized, the computerization of this information was a move undertaken to facilitate easy access of information about the participants of the training conducted by PSSC.

Library Computerization. The computerization of library operations began right after the training on the MINI-MICRO CDS/ISIS (Computer-Documentation System/Integrated Set of Information Systems) conducted by the U.P. Institute of Library Science last March 11-15, 1991. The Librarian and her assistant underwent the training. Most of the books and monograph collection can be accessed through the computer now, but it will take time to finish entering the articles found in journals and periodicals.

NETWORKING AND LINKAGES

N inth AASSREC Biennial Conference. On August 5-10, 1991, the PSSC played host to the Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC) on of its Ninth Biennial the occasion Conference and a joint UNESCO-AASRREC regional symposium on human resource development. The AASRREC president for 1990-1991 was Ruben F. Trinidad. PSSC Executive Director.

The general conference was held during the first two days of that busy week and w as devoted to the presentation and discussion of reports of the activities of the member councils in the last biennium. Accomplishments, emerging issues, and opportunities or future plans were covered in the country reports.

Among the accomplishments cited were the conduct of research with an in clination away from the basic or theoretical issues more applied 10 concerns, the expansion of data archives documentation activities including and networking with national data bases, and linkages with NGOs engaged in social development work and providing consultancy services government to offices.

Some of the emerging issues affecting AASSREC are questions related to academic freedom and government influence through their control of funding and less government support for social science research vis a vis research in physical sciences.

The regional symposium on HRD brought together papers which were the result of country symposia on the same topic, addressing two related issues:

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social science perspectives on human resource development, and human resource development perspectives on educational planning.

The Philippine seminar had been held on May 27, 1991 and had been attended by 23 participants representing various NGOs. government agencies, and academicians interested in HRD. An ad hoc committee composed of Dr. Nestor Pilar (U.P.), Dr. Emma Porio (Atenco), Fr. Ibarra Gonzalez, S. J. (Ateneo), Mr. Sofronio Llorin (Development Academy of the Philippines), and Mr. Frank Lopez (Association for Non-Traditional Education in the Philippines) had been in charge of the seminar. Dr. Pilar wrote the final Philippine paper on HRD. Funding for the Philippine Seminar was provided by the Regional Unit for Social and Human Sciences. UNESCO, Bangkok.

Special guests during the regional symposium were headed by Dr. Lourdes R. Quisumbing, Secretary-General of the UNESCO National Commission of the Philippines, Dr. Erlinda Pefiangco who represented Secretary Isidro V. Cariño of the Department of Education, Culture, and Sports (DECS) and Dr. Marcial Salvatierra, also of DECS.

The conference ended with a vote of thanks to the PSSC for the fine job of preparing for and running the conference. the AASSREC Secretary General As expressed it, the delegates appreciated the "princely hospitality" shown them, and especially for the lesson that Prof. Trinidad "has developed human resources to the utmost" and the fact that "his developed unexpected team human resources in us by their skill with which they managed us, and drew us out and

made the best of us" during the conference.

PSSC-CASS Exchange Program. For the year 1990-1991, the Philippine Social Science Council was again fortunate to be the Executive Agreement included in between the Philippines and the People's Republic of China (PROC). As part of agreement, PSSC will exchange this scholars with the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS) for one month. This program aims to develop and strengthen friendly relations between the two countries through the establishment of inter-institutional linkages.

As PSSC's representative, Ms. Eloisa G. Parco of the Philippine National Historical Society and the University of Santo Tomas visited the PROC from November 5 to December 6, 1991, and undertook liaison work with the CASS and other institutions. Some of the places she visited were Shanghai, Xiamen, Yunnan, and Guangzhou.

of the On the part CASS, as previously agreed, two people, Mr. Niu Fengriu of the Institute of Rural Economy, Hebei University and Mr. Mu Jielin of the CASS Foreign Affairs Bureau were sent to visit the Philippines for two weeks. As part of their itinerary, they visited a number of government and nongovernment institutions including the University of the Philippines in Diliman and Los Baños, the International Institute of Rural Reconstruction in Cavite, and the livelihood cooperative headed by Dante Buscayno in Tarlac. Also visited by them were farmer-households in Laguna, Cavite, and Tarlac.

Presently, the PSSC is coordinating with the Department of Foreign Affairs for its participation in the 1992-1993 Agreement which is the last exchange covered by the Ford Foundation Grant.

PSSC Elected to the IFSSO Executive Board. PSSC for the first time is a member of the Executive Board of the International Federation of Social Science Organizations (IFSSO). This honor came about as a result of the participation of Dr. Emma Porio during the 10th of IFSSO in Brazil General Conference on December 9-13, 1991. PSSC will serve for two years.

Dr. Porio read a paper entitled, "Towards Sustainable Underwater Resources: Employing Behavioral Concepts and Methods in Resource Management." She was also elected chief editor of the conference proceedings.

IFSSO is an international forum for the cooperation and communication among Councils, Academies, and other Organizations responsible for the development, training, and funding of research in their respective countries.

PROSPECTS

SMALL RESEARCH AWARDS IN NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

 ${f T}$ he Small Research Awards Program in Natural Resource Management aims to provide small research grants to individuals based in the regions who are pursuing work natural resource in management. The program also shall encourage the regional lead institution to develop their own programs more attuned to the regional concerns and specificities. The grants shall be completed by training and publication support. This program was developed with the assistance of Dr. John Cool of Winrock International and Dr. Romulo del Castillo and Dr. Jerome Sison of the University of the Philippines College, Los Ba os.

In October 1991, the Secretariat sent the proposal to the Environment Policy Program of the IDRC. The IDRC has indicated potential interest in the program. Last December 19, Mr. Stephen Tyler, Program Officer, met with Prof. Ruben F. Trinidad to discuss and clarify some details of the proposal. Though funding was not committed as yet, more definite word will be heard from IDRC about the middle of next vear. Meanwhile, Mr. Tyler suggested that PSSC meet with UPLB again as well as with prospective regional institutions to work-out other details of the proposal.

STUDY OF FISHING COMMUNITIES IN 7 BAY AREAS

The Department of Agriculture (DA) through the Fisheries Sector Program invited the PSSC to submit a proposal to do a socio-economic and investment opportunity study of fishing communities along 7 bay areas in Luzon and Visayas.

It is a holistic program on coastal resource management aimed at determining how ecological base may be rehabilitated or sustained on the one hand and alleviating the widespread poverty in these bay areas by improving and diversifying the livelihood options of coastal fishing communities on the other.

The proposal has been submitted to the Fisheries Sector Program of the DA and the PSSC is awaiting their response. If contracted to undertake the project, the PSSC shall commence preliminary work early 1992. Project duration is 6 months.

SOCIAL SCIENCE ENCYCLOPEDIA

Work on the production of disciplinal manuscripts for the social science encyclopedia which began in the last quarter of 1991 is expected to be completed before the end of 1992. A Council Editorial Board, headed by Domingo C. Salita as Chairman and Editor- in-Chief and Allen L. Tan as Executive Editor, will continue to meet every month with the chairpersons of the discipline editorial boards to follow-up and receive the finished entries for the encyclopedia.

Possible funding sources for the production and printing of the encyclopedia are being looked into, with December 1993 as the target date for the release of the finished work.

PSSC SILVER JUBILEE

In 1992, the plans and preparations will begin for the celebration of 25 years of existence of the PSSC by December 1993. To be planned together with this is the holding of the Third National Social Science Congress, also in 1993.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT

Hector Morada, Ph.D.

Although the past year was characterized by serious economic difficulties which were exacerbated by the unusual occurrences of several natural calamities, the Philippine Social Science Council (PSSC) coasted through the year 1991 with relative ease. Our income from the General Fund rose by 23.1 percent from P3.693 million in 1990 to P4.546 million in 1991. Expenditures from the General Fund posted P3.758 million in 1991 compared to P3.000 million in 1990, or a rise of 25.3 percent. Our receipts from the Special Funds, however, declined by almost half (46.7 per cent) from the level of P4.713 million in 1990 to P2.212 million in 1991. Expenditures from the same fund were only P1.993 million in 1991 which was significantly low at 54.1 percent from the P4.344 million in 1990. On the aggregate therefore, our total receipts in 1991 at P7.060 million was lower by 16.0 percent from the P8.406 million in 1990. Total disbursements on the other hand dropped by 21.7 percent from P7.344 million in 1990 to P5.751 million in 1991. As a consequence, our total accumulated fund balances at the end of 1991 stood at P5.126 million compared to P4.018 million in 1990, more by 27.6 percent.

Total assets at the end of 1991 were P12.895 million as against total liabilities of P2.101 million, hence a gross liquidity of 6.138. Of the total assets, the amount of P8.790 million represents restricted funds (endowment, sinking, and project funds), bringing down net liquidity to only 1.95. This means that PSSC has the capability of meeting its immediate liabilities, at about two pesos for every one peso indebtedness.

Operation of the General Fund

Of the total receipts of P4.546 million in 1991, the operations of the Center contributed two-thirds (61.4 per cent), the investment income shared one-third (34.5 per cent), and the remainder (4.1 percent) came from miscellaneous income. The shares of the above items of receipts in 1990 were more or less in the same levels.

On the other hand, of the total expenditures of P3.758 million in 1991, 69.6 percent went to operational costs (personnel, utilities, and maintenance) and 30.4 percent to research and development expenses.

Operation of the Special Fund

Funding in 1991 amounting to P2.212 million was only almost half as much as the receipts of P4.713 million in 1990. Principal sources were the UNESCO (P1.625 million), the Toyota Foundation (P0.301 million), the National (Philippines) Statistics Office (P0.263 million), and the Daiwa Bank Foundation for Asia and Oceania (P0.200 million).

A bigger portion of the UNESCO grant was earmarked for the support of the Ninth Biennial Conference of the Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC) held in August 1991 and hosted by the PSSC. The rest of the grant was used to fund commissioned researches, trainings, and surveys.

Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balances

Total assets rose by 17.7 percent from P10.960 million in 1990 to P12.895 million in 1991. The increase came mainly from the investments in notes and bonds, stocks and the project savings account. These assets are presently being managed by the Bank of the Philippine Islands (BPI), the Private Development Corporation of the Philippines (PDCP), and the Fund Assistance for Private Education (FAPE). Cash on hand and in bank was P0.539 million, while our property and equipment, excluding the building, was P0.383 million.

Against these assets are total claims of P2.101 million at the end of 1991 compared to P1.490 million in 1990, or an increase of 41.0 percent. The liabilities consisted mainly of accounts payable, accrued expenses, due to CSS, subscribers and tenants deposits, and unearned administrative and rental income.

The total fund balances of the PSSC at year-end (1991) are P10.794 million as compared to P9.470 million in 1990 or a difference of 14.0 percent. These consist of Endowment fund (P4.666 million), Sinking fund (P0.342 million), Project fund (P3.123 million), General Fund (P2.003 million) and other funds (P0.525 million).

Budget for 1992

The Budget of the Philippine Social Science Council (PSSC) for 1992 was approved by the Governing Council on December 12, 1991 upon the recommendation of the Finance and Business Affairs Committee (FBAC) of the Executive Board which met on November 26, 1991. The preparation of the budget took into account the operations of the Council in the last three years (1989-1991) as well as the budgetary askings of the various committees and the Secretariat. The various components of the total outlay were estimated taking into account the present economic condition.

The 1992 PSSC Budget calls for a total outlay of P12.703 million divided into P4.706 million for the General Fund and P7.997 million for the Special Fund.

General Fund. The estimated total receipts of P4.707 million in 1992 is more by P0.318 million over the 1990 income of P4.389 million. The increase will come mainly from center income and CSS income.

Charged against the expected income is an expenditure program of P4.707 million (balanced budget concept), which is higher by 8.5 per cent over the P4.389 million spent in 1990. The major compo nents of the total outlay are operating expenses, P3.847 million; Council program expenses, P0.456 million; and committee project expenses, P0.403 million.

Special Fund. In 1992 PSSC is projected to undertake only three projects which would involve a total outlay of P7.997 million. Funding is expected to come from the National Statistics Office, the Toyota Foundation, the Daiwa Bank Foundation for Asia and Oceania, and the International Development Research Centre.

The projected fund receipts are planned to be applied to the following projects: Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey, P5.500 mil-Archaeological lion; Surigao Survey, P0.497 million; and the Small Research Award Project, P2.000 million.

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A COMPILATION OF THE ANNUAL REPORTS OF ACTIVITIES OF REGULAR AND ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

INTRODUCTION

To date, there are forty-nine (49) member associations in the PSSC; 14 regular or voting associations and 35 non-voting members. The Congressional Research and Training Service is the newest associate member of the Council which was admitted on 10 April 1991. The ASEAN Academy of Law and Jurisprudence is no longer an associate member of the PSSC, having terminated its activities and closed shop.

The reports included in this section are the midyear and annual reports of the regular and associate members which were submitted in time for publication.

Some annual reports submitted are reprinted *in toto*. Some reports have been rewritten in order to incorporate the midyear reports earlier submitted. Others have to be summarized to meet the schedule for and the financial limitations of publication.

Eight (8) out of the fourteen (14) regular members submitted their annual report of activities for 1991. These are the Philippine Historical Association (PHA), Philippine National Historical Society (PNHS), Philippine Political Science Association (PPSA), Philippine Population Association (PPA), Philippine Sociological

Society (PSS), Philippine Statistical Association (PSA), Psychological Association of the Philippines (PAP) and the Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao (UGAT).

The Philippine Association of Social Workers (PASW) and the Philippine Geographical Society (PGS) have submitted only their midyear reports.

For the associate members, thirteen (13) out of thirty-five (35) members were able to submit their reports. These are the Agricultural Credit Policy Council (ACPC), Center for Institutional Research and Development, Philippine Christian (CIRD-PCU), University Congressional Research and Training Service (CRTS, College of Mass Communication, University of the Philippines (CMC-UP), Institute of Philippine Culture, Ateneo de Manila University (IPC-AdeMU), Institute of Social Research and Development, St. La Salle University (ISRAD-SLSU), Language Study Center, Philippine Normal (LSC-PNU), University National Tax Research (NTRC), Center Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP), U.P. **Population** Institute (UPPI), Research Center, Divine Word University of Tacloban (RC-DWU), School of Graduate Studies and Research, University of Nueva

Caceres (SGSR-UNC), and Statistical Center, U.P. (SC-UP).

On the other hand, seven (7) associate members submitted reports of their activities covering only the first half of 1991. These are the College of Social Work and Community Development, University of the Philippines (CSWCD-International Institute UP), of Rural Reconstruction (IIRR), Philippine Association of Nutrition (PAN), Research and Statistics Center, Bicol University (RSC-BU), School of Urban and Regional Planning, U.P. (SURP-UP), Social Research Ateneo de Davao University Office. (SRO-AdeDU), and Social Weather Stations (SWS).

Hence, this section contains thirty (30) reports of PSSC members: ten (10) from

the regular and twenty (20) from the associate members.

In general, the activity reports of the members focus on some of the following concerns: a) changes in organizational structure; b) new thrusts and programs; c) research projects and research-related holding activities: d) of semi-annual meetings, conferences, or conventions; e) conduct of seminars, workshops, and other training programs; f) contribution of articles to or publication of journals; g) holding of public fora and other forms of info-dissemination campaign; h) membership campaign; institutional i) development; and problems and i) recommendations.

PHILIPPINE HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION (PHA)

Activities for 1991

January

a. A joint meeting between the PHA and the Philippine Historical Foundation (PHF) was held at the headquarters of the Veteran's Federation of the Philippines, Arroceros St., Manila on January 18 1991. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss matters concerning the working relationship between the two.

b. The General Membership Meeting and Annual Election for 1991 was held at St. Mary's College, Quezon City on January 27. The traditional presidential lecture was given by Col. Cesar Pobre on the topic, "The Communist Movement of the Philippines from the Historical Perspective."

February

a. PHA Board of Governors for 1991 were elected during this month and Col. Pobre was elected as president. On February 5, the members of the Board were invited to attend the Silk Road Con ference at Casa Manila. It was jointly sponsored by the UNESCO and the National Historical Institute (NHI).

b. On February 12, PHA became a chartered member and one of the founders of the Federations of Associations for Education in the Philippines.

March

a. The monthly meeting of the PHA Board was held at the residence of Prof. Celedonio Resurcecion in Quezon City. The Board discussed the proposed celebration of the Centennial Anniversary of the birth of the late President Jose P. Laurel and Maximo Kalaw and matters concerning the implementation of the new history curriculum in secondary schools.

b. During this month, PHA was also busy in preparing two issues of the Philippine Historical Bulletin and the quarterly *Balita*, the PHA newsletter intended to raise the history consciousness and deepen the nationalistic spirit of the Fili pino.

April

a. The PHA participated actively in the SEDP Training Program for Araling Panlipunan IV (World History) of public school fourth year teachers and regional trainors of private school teachers. These were held, respectively, at the Teacher's Camp, Baguio City under the auspices of the Burcau of Secondary Education and at the College of Education, U.P. Diliman with the assistance of the Fund for Assistance to Private Education (FAPE). Members of the Association acted as lecturers and national trainors.

b. The Association through the initiative of its President, Dr. Cesar Pobre, co-sponsored the Laurel Centenary held at the National Defense College on the theme "The Leadership Vision of Jose P. Laurel." Plans for the celebration of Dean Maximo Kalaw's centenary were also finalized.

May

a. On May 6, the PHA coordinated with the Batangas Cultural Society and the National Historical Institute in the launching of the Exhibit on Maximo Kalaw at the Club Filipino with Sen. Sotero Laurel as Guest Speaker. This was followed by a dinner celebrating the 100th birth anniversary of Don Maximo Kalaw on 10 May 1991 co-sponsored by the PHA and the Kalaw family at the Club Filipino. Dr. Cesar Pobre led the PHA in launching the centennial year which will end on 6 May 1992.

June

a. The 130th birth anniversary of Dr. Jose P. Rizal was celebrated by PHA with a seminar on his "Thoughts, Visions, and Perspectives" held at Biñan on 19 June 1991 at the Perpetual Help College Systems with the assistance of the Biñan Municipality and the Knights of Rizal Biñan Chapter. Sec. Isidro Cariño was the guest speaker. Seminar speakers were led by Dr. Onofre Corpuz who spoke on the "Right and Morality of the Revolution" from Rizal's perspective. Other speakers were Dr. Alma Fernan dez ("The Role of Women in National Development") Mr. Victor Manabat ("The Role of Youth"), and Prof. Diosdado Capino ("The Socio-Economic Ideas of Rizal"). The participants are public and private school teachers, educators, civic citizens and relatives of Rizal from the Alberto clan of Biñan. As a result, the celebration of June 19 every year in Biñan under the aus pices of the PHA and the Municipality of Biñan was institutionalized.

b. On June 25, a joint meeting was held by the PHA and the Philippine History Foundation at the Club Filipino. The Foundation reiterated its commitment to help the Association.

c. In its mid-year meeting held to coincide with the celebration of the 92nd anniversary of the declaration of Philippine Independence, the Executive Board passed a resolution to intensify its campaign to deepen the historical consciousness of our people in all walks of life by reaching out to the outlying regions of Metro Manila and gradually expand its activities to more distant depressed areas like Samar, Catanduanes, and Marinduque.

The campaign will be carried out by holding seminars and conferences on controversial issues in our history in line with the celebration of the *Decade* of *Nationalism*. To institutionalize the effect of the Seminar, the sponsoring institution in the locality will be encouraged to organize a Philippine History Center and to form a local PHA Chapter with autonomy to administer its own affairs following the objectives of the Association as embodied in its Constitution.

In this connection, linkages with various agencies, both government and non-government were firmed up such as the linkages with th following agencies:

(1) National Historical Institute (NHI) – An agreement was reached to support all activities of the institute by providing speakers and helping the Institute program its activities. On the other hand, the Institute will co-sponsor all PHA activities by helping print its program whenever funds are available.

(2) National Social Action Council (NASAC) - The Council will provide some messengerial and secretarial assistance to carry out PHA activities. On the other hand, the Philippine Historical Association will assist the NASAC in deepening the consciousness of the three sectors (church/religious, private/business/NGO, government agencies) of Philippine society.

(3) Philippine Association for Teacher Education (PATE) – PHA will help in the preparation of curricular requirements to prepare a teacher in all three levels of the educational ladder to teach history effectively.

(4) Federation of Associations for Education (FAEP) – PHA will help coordinate efforts of associations involved in education to strengthen the history component of various professional offerings such as Engineering and other allied professions.

(5) Asian Ecumenical Interfaith Movement (AEIM) – PHA will help provide the historical perspective of our various movements in the Philippines such as the Kapatirans which traces its origin to the Katipunan.

(6) Department of Education, Culture, and Sports (DECS) – PHA will assist in the holding of in-service training seminars for teachers in history, monitoring the teaching of history in all levels of education, and in the preparation of instructional materials in making the teaching of history effective and relevant.

(7) Philippine Veterans Federation (PVF) and National Defense College (NDC) – PHA will assist in projects to promote the proper recording of the contributions of our veterans in moulding the Philippine History.

(8) Green Forum Philippines – PHA will help provide historical background to the various problems encountered in our environ ment such as the depletion of our forest reserves.

d. On June 27, PHA and PHF held a joint meeting to seek financial assistance for the proposed regional seminars.

e. On June 28-30, PHA observed the National Congress of Prayer

July

a. On July 4, a joint meeting with FAEP to plan out a seminar to intensify the efforts to teach Philippine History effectively as basis for development was held.

b. On July 5, PHA attended a joint meeting with the Green Forum to help formulate UNCED statement to be presented in the preparatory Summit Conference on Sustainable Development to be held in Paris and later in Rio de Janeiro using history as background.

c. On July 16, the Committee on Nationalism approved the publication of several books or/and monographs on activities of veterans during the World War II, subject to the availability of funds to be raised by the Federation of Veterans of the Philippines

August

a. On August 23, a seminar on *The Visions of the Katipunan* was held at Wesleyan University-Philippines at Cabanatuan City. The Philippine History Center was launched. The PHA and NHI donated some books on that occasion.

b. On August 31, PHA formalized its support for the integrity of the environment by signing Earth Covenant with the Green Forum.

September

E.A. WARRANT CONTRACTOR OF CONTRACTOR OF

a. On September 15-21, the History Week was celebrated under the auspices of the National Historical Institute. An attempt was made to hold a seminar in Bataan but the PHA speakers had to return to Manila due to the unexpected flow of lahar in Porac. However, a pledge was given by the association to furnish the governor of Bataan with the undelivered lecture.

October

a. On October 12-13, PHA participated actively in the workshop on Moral Recovery and Peace Efforts held at the Atenco de Manila University, Quezon City.

b. The rest of the month was used to monitor the offering of history in line with the SEDP in Marinduque and other parts of Region IV and the National Capital Region.

November

a. On November 4-11, PHA evaluated SEDP offering of History in preparation to the mass training program of secondary teachers in World History with the Philippines as core subject.

b. On November 27, PHA assisted NHI in awarding the prizes for the essay contest held among high School and college students on the topic "If I were to Write Philippine History."

c. On November 30, PHA participated in commemorating Bonifacio Day at the Liwasang Bonifacio by offering a floral wreath.

December

a. On December 6-7, the Annual Seminar on "Visions of the Good Society from a Historical Perspective: Focus on the Decade 1890- 1990" was held at College of Education of the University of Sto. Tomas. NHI donated books for the students of the Center of the Philippine History.

b. On December 12, the Association commemorated the contribution of Dr. Sixto Orosa to Philippine History under the NHI.

c. On December 30, it participated in the nationwide commemoration of the execution of Dr. Jose P. Rizal at a book launching of the translation of Noli at Fort Santiago under the auspices of NHI.

PHILIPPINE NATIONAL HISTORICAL SOCIETY (PNHS)

The PNHS is a charter member of the Philippine Social Science Council. Founded in 1941, PNHS observed its Golden Jubilee in 1991. It has great beginnings and its greatness has never diminished. Today, PNHS serves a national community of historians and scholars in the social sciences from Tuguegarao to Tawi-Tawi. Its declared objective is given in Art. II of its 1941 Constitution: "It shall be the aim the of this Society to encourage and undertake the study of Philippine history."

1. New thrusts and programs

Within the framework of Art. II of its Constitution, PNHS signed a Memorandum of Agreement with Pamantasan ng Lungsod ng Maynila (PLM) on 8 February 1991 with the following important provisions: (a) to help review and strengthen the AB History curriculum of PLM; (b) to help write the reading materials for the core courses under the this curriculum; (c) to undertake joint activities like conferences, symposia, seminars, and the publication of papers and articles; and (d) to undertake joint research projects on the history of Manila.

These provisions constitute the new thrusts and programs of PNHS toward propagating and strengthening the discipline of history at the institutional level on a specific basis. PNHS signed a similar document with Polytechnic University of the Philippines on 18 April 1990 and is negotiating under the same terms with the University of Santo Tomas and the Cavite Studies Center.

2. Research projects and other related activities

Research projects were undertaken by members of PNHS on an individual basis. Among the notable projects are those of Dr. Ma. Luisa T. Camagay (UP Diliman) on the social history of Manila; Fr. Rolando S. DelaGoza, C.M. (Adamson) and Dr. Bernardita R. Church ill (U.P. Diliman) on the institutional history of Adamson University; Fr. Jose S. Arcilla, S.J. (Ateneo) on the history of the Restored Jesuits in the Philippines; Dr. Violeta L. Gonzaga (La Salle Bacolod) on the social and economic history of Negros; Dr. Domingo M. Non (MSU-General Santos) on T'boli ethno history; and Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon on the commercialization and evangelization of Surigao and Agusan.

Aside from being involved in the Encyclopedia Project of the Philippine Social Science Council, PNHS has research-related activities pursuant to the agreements with PUP and PLM, namely, the writing of the booklets for the core history courses and of the history of Manila.

3. Holding of semi-annual or annual meetings, conferences or conventions

Since 1978, PNHS has been holding annually its prestigious National Conference on Local and National History. This annual scholarly activity has catalyzed nationwide interest in the study of Philippine history. It is the foremost forum for the presentation of the latest findings in local and national

history. PNHS sets the pace and direction of Filipino historical scholarship and this conference is the venue for the sharing of new ideas and views.

PNHS is able to hold this conference regularly because of its excellent linkages with regional universities and local societies.

On 22-24 October 1991, PNHS held its 12th National Conference on "Local and National History" in Marawi City with the Mindanao State University (MSU) as host institution.

The 13th National Conference on "Local and National History" shall be hosted by MSU-Tawi-Tawi in October 1992 and the 14th National Conference on Local and National History shall be hosted by UP Visayas in October 1993.

Aside from the 12th National Conference on Local and National History hosted by MSU-Marawi, PNHS held these other activities:

a. First National Conference on the "History of Social Problems: Epidemics and Discases, Mental Illness, and Prostitution," 19 February, PUP Manila

b. National Symposium on "Surigaonon Archaeology and History," 8 March, PPA Conference Hall, Surigao City

c. Lecture-forum on "Vietnamese History as a Part of Southeast Asian History," by Dr. John G. Kleinen (University of Amsterdam), 9:00-12:00, 30 April PUP, Manila

4. Conduct of seminars, workshops, and other training programs

The 12th National Conference on Local and National History held in Marawi City was also billed as "Seminar-Workshop in the Teaching of History". Hence, the Conference also conducted workshop sessions on innovative teaching methods designed to help improve the teaching of history and to reorient Filipino historians regarding the role of the peoples of Mindanao in the shaping of Philippine history.

5. Publication of journals, holding of public fora, and other forms of info-dissemination campaign

PNHS updated *The Journal of History* to 1990 by releasing two issues: Volumes 32 and 33 (1987 and 1988), partially subsidized by PSSC; Volumes 34 and 35 (1989 and 1990), fully subsidized by Heritage Publishing House.

Because of the tic-up between the Heritage Publishing House and the PNHS, *The Journal of History* shall go back to being a bi-annual for its 1991 issues, and shall transform itself into a quarterly in 1992. Under this tic-up, the H. Otley Beyer Collec tion shall be serialized in *The Journal of History* and the papers generated by PNHS conferences shall be published separately as monographs. PNHS is deeply grateful to Heritage Publishing House under Mr. George B. Alcantara for this full assistance.

Now being edited and proofread are the Butuan Conference Papers of 1988, the General Santos Conference papers of 1989, the Naga Conference papers of 1990, and the Manila History Conference Papers of 1991, as well as the H. Otley Beyer Ethnography Collection Index. Being encoded for editing are "Guerrilla Resistance Movements in the Philippines"; "The Puppet Government of the Philippines", and "Who is who in the Philippines."

PNHS wishes to formally acknowledge the valuable assistance of Miss Lydia G. Wenceslao, Miss Emily G. Tuzon, Mrs. Elvira S. Angeles, and Mrs. Lorna P. Makil of the PSSC Staff in enabling PNHS to update its official organ.

6. Membership campaign

The recruitment of new members is a continuing task undertaken by PNHS. New members are recruited by (a) mass mailing of membership forms accompanying the issuance of PNHS circulars; (b) personalized contacts; and (c) campaigning for membership during PNHS conferences, symposia, lecture-fora, and similar gatherings.

As a result of the sustained effort exerted to recruit new members, PNHS now has 105 life members and 209 regular members for a total of 314 dues-paying members. The number of PNHS members has more than tripled in the last five years.

While the total number is still small, it is worth noting that the impact of PNHS nationwide is far greater than its size. This is because its annual National Conference on "Local and National History" is today regarded as the foremost forum in the field of history for the presentation of the latest find ings of historians. Hundreds of historians, social science scholars, and history teachers from all over the Philippines participate in this yearly gathering.

7. Problems and recommendations

The fundamental problem remains the lack of funds. This problem serves as a big constraint toward enabling the Society to satisfy the needs of its national constituency, especially in terms of organizing more conferences, seminars, symposia, lecture-fora, and training workshops; issuing a periodic newsletter for information-dissemi nation purposes; and giving modest travel and research grants.

It is a good thing that Heritage Publishing House has come to the rescue of PNHS by subsidizing the *The Journal of History* and the publication of the conference proceedings of the Society.

PSSC is doing its best to help its member associations for which PNHS is extremely grateful. However, the member associations themselves should exert greater efforts toward attaining financial self-reliance.

In closing, PNHS wishes to express its deepest gratitude to Dr. Benjamin G. Tayabas of PLM, Dr. Nemesio E. Prudente of PUP, Fr. Rolando G. DelaGoza, C.M. of Adamson University, Dr. Ahmad E. 2. Research-related activities

As during the first half of 1991, all research-related activities of the Association

concentrated on the finalization of the Department of Health (DOH)-sponsored Health Research Network (HRN). In the six-month period form 1 July through 31 December, the PPA Board met five times in Manila. Three of these meetings were joint session with the HRN Steering Committee, composed of representatives of research agencies in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao.

In May 1991, a revised draft of a continuation contract between the DOH and PPA was submitted for signing to the DOH. An initial contract between the DOH and PPA, which called for preparatory activities leading toward the establishment of the HRN, had expired on 31 December 1990.

The new contract envisions the start of the actual research activities in the so-called 'initiated regions' of the country, i.e., regions with established research agencies as well as established linkages between local research agencies and local DOH offices (Regions III, IV, VI, VII, X, XI, and NCR). The contract also aims to set up an HRN infrastructure in the other ('uninitiated') regions.

In August, DOH returned the contract draft with modifications suggested by DOH Undersecretary Taguiwalo. One of the main revisions was the establishment of a Governing Council, to be composed of 3 members each of DOH and the PPA and chaired by an undersecretary of DOH. The Governing Council is to act as a policy-making and supervisory body for the HRN with the ultimate authority to accept or reject research proposals sub mitted by local DOH offices and local research agencies.

In October, the PPA Board accepted the modifications and, subsequently, the contract was finalized. The first meeting of the of the Governing Council is scheduled for late January or early February 1992. In November, DOH released to PPA the first portion of the contracted funds.

At the time the funds were first released by DOH, the HRN Steering Committee had screened six research proposals submit ted by the 'initiated' regions and recommended for funding to the PPA Board. The proponents of five of these proposals received the first part of their contracted funds in December; the sixth proposal is undergoing some further revisions.

A second batch of proposals, likewise coming from the 'uninitiated' regions, is presently undergoing screening. For the screening process, the PPA Board decided to enlist, in the future, the services of social During the earlier sessions, the criteria regulating the eligibility for joining the HRN had been formulated. By November 1991, two research establishments had applied for affiliation with the HRN, one from Region VI, and the second located within DOH Manila.

The current DOH-PPA contract obligates PPA to establish an HRN infrastructure in all regions of the country. During 1991, extensive efforts to extend the HRN into Region II had been made by Dr. Zablan of UPPI. During the November 1991 joint meet ing of the PPA Board and the HRN Steering Committee, Dr. Zablan was requested to continue her work in Region II and to document it for the purpose of using her experiences as an eventual model to be followed in the other 'uninitiated' regions.

The next joint meeting of the PPA Board and the HRN Steering Committee, scheduled for 11 January 1992, will decide on a date (preferably before the end of the current school year) for a general assembly of all HRN- affiliated institutions and local (regional) DOH representatives. At the general assembly, HRN developments since the last assembly of November 1990 will be highlighted, ongoing research activities will be discussed, and local experiences of cooperation between the DOH officials and researchers will be exchanged. At the same time, elections will be held for positions in the HRN Steering Committee vacated by those members whose tenure has expired. The meeting will likewise serve as the First General Assembly of the PPA.

In September 1991, the first issue of "HRN Health Research Network", a bimonthly publication of the HRN, prepared by the HRN Secretariat, came off the press and was distributed to affiliated and other institutions. The second issue will come out in the near future.

3. Publications

The Philippine Population Journal (PPJ), the official publication of the PPA, is still in the process of catching up. So far, three annual volumes have been published: 1986, 1987, and 1988. The 1989 issue was supposed to have been produced by the end of 1991 but its publication will, unfortunately, be somewhat

delayed. Work on the 1990 issue is currently in progress. In the next PPA Board meeting, an editor for the 1991 issues will be appointed.

4. Problems and Recommendations

According to its By-Laws, the PSSC is a 'national' organization. That designation holds true inasmuch as the PSSC has regular members (like the PPA) that are national associations, and associate members that are located in various parts of the country. Unfortunately, the designation 'national' does not (yet) hold quite true when it comes to the involvement in **PSSC-sponsored** affairs. That statement is substantiated by a simple perusal of lists of PSSC Committee members or minutes of Board or Council meetings containing the attendance list.

In a letter of the PSSC Executive Director (dated 5 December 1991), once again a request was made for nominations of suitable persons for the PSSC Working Committees. There are suitable professionals outside of Metro Manila who are "interested, willing, and committed" to work in such committees.

Unfortunately, they cannot be nominated unless they are willing to defray on their own the costs of travel to, board and lodging in, Manila because they are not entitled "to remuneration apart from the standard allowance in the amount of P200 given during the attendance at regular committee meeting."

Evidently, interest, will, and commitment are neither dependent on the ability of a suitable person to privately defray all involved costs nor can the three enumerated characteristics be equated with such ability.

The apparent reason for the above quoted "200 pesos" statement is the lack of funds. As long as the latter exists, little can be done to bring suitable people to Metro Manila or to transfer the meetings to somewhere outside of Metro Manila.

The fact is unfortunate but has to be accepted for now. But does it have to be accepted for good? If it is one of the foremost aims of the PSSC to get people and organizations 'in the country' involved in social affairs, then this aim must include ways to make such nationwide involvement possible, not just 'otherwise', but also financially. Under the existing circumstances, I find mysclf almost always unable to attend any kind of PSSC meeting, I cannot, in good conscience nominate suitable persons from outside of Metro Manila for the simple reason that they will be unable to serve.

To eventually change the present situation, I once more like to suggest. as I did in the 1989 Annual Report of the PPA, that the PSSC explore funding possibilities that ensure national participation in the affairs of the PSSC.

2. New thrusts and programs

a) Workshop on the Teaching of Sociology. In answer to the recurrent demand to assist members in a more vigorous, theoretically-based and relevant teaching of Philippine sociology, a series of regional workshops is being planned. The first is scheduled in the Summer of 1992 at the Central Luzon State University. To be featured are innovative methods of teaching by topnotch resource persons to cover the main modules of a typical introductory course. Funding sources are now being tapped.

b) Encyclopedia of Philippine Sociology. This is in collaboration with the Philippine Social Science Council Encyclopedia Project. Profs. Belen Medina and Isabel Panopio are co-editors.

c) Social Scientist Award. A year-long search for the National Social Scientist coming from Sociology was started in December 1991. This is again in line with the PSSC's annual recognition of outstanding social scientists.

d) Special Circles. Small meetings of sociologists interested in special issues or fields (e.g., the environment) are being encouraged and will be scheduled from time to time.

3. Publications

The *Philippine Sociological Review* is still regularly published. The second issue for 1989 was released only this year. The 1990 issue presents theses and dissertations in the field, including works in education and Philippine Studies with a sociological focus from 68 schools offering graduate degrees in the Philippines. The extended bibliography covers the period 1919 to March 1990. Trends in students' research in Sociology will be the subject of a review essay by the editor, Ricardo Abad.

The 1991 issue features the papers presented at the National Convention in February and is edited by Robert Salazar.

4. Membership

These include: "Development and Anthropology," by Ponciano Bennagen; "Indigenous Peoples and Ancestral Domain," by Francisco Claver; "Peasants and Social Change," by John McAndrew; "Women and Development," by Rosario del Rosario; and "Anthropology and the Fisherfolk," by Cynthia Neri Zayas. A special session on Anthropology and Disaster had the following topics: "Militarization and Indigenous Peoples," by Sabino Padilla; "Deforestation," by Daylinda Cabanilla; "Mt. Apo," by Atty. Augusto Gatmaytan; "Mt. Pinatubo," by Eufracio Abaya; and "Disas ters and Children," by Nestor Castro.

5. Community extension programs

Since the eruption of Mt. Pinatubo in early June, members of the organization have been involved in the relief and rehabilitation of Ayta Communities in Zambales. UGAT joined the task force Pinatubo Ayta, a network of NGOs active in the relief and rehabilitation of Ayta communities displaced by the volcanic eruption.

Through the initiative of the Sentro Para sa Ganap na Pamayanan (SPGP) and UGAT a comprehensive survey of the status of the Ayta in the evacuation centers was undertaken.

With the financial Assistance of OXFAM, a Central Luzon Ayta Workshop was organized. This was held at the Poverillo Seminar House in Quezon City last October 23, 24, and 25, 1991. The workshop consolidated common problems and identified possible solutions to the resettlement problem. The Ayta leaders in the workshop organized the Central Luzon Ayta Ad Hoc Council and has since taken over the lead in planning and organizing activities for the development of their own communities.

5. Linkages

a. UGAT is a member of the Task Force Pinatubo Ayta consisting of non-government organizations which assist in the rehabilitation of the Aytas

b. UGAT has confirmed its membership and commitment to TABAK (*Tunay na Alyansa ng Bayan Alay sa Katutubo*) which is now in the process of reorganizing.

c. With the Working Group for Indigenous Peoples and Bangsa Moro Rights, UGAT continues to support the passage of the Bills on Ancestral Domain and the Total Log Ban.

d. UGAT held consultation meetings with the Cordillera People's Alliance and other NGOs to plan efforts to deal with the ill effects of the open pit mining in Antamok area of Itogon, Benguet.

e. UGAT is also a member of the Philippine Environmental Action Network (PAEN).

6. Publications

Two issues of UGAT Newsletter came out in 1991. UGAT's official journal, Aghamtao, for 1990 which includes the papers read in the 1990 conference on Philippine Ethnography is now at the press. The Aghamtao, 1991 issue which contains the papers read in the 1991 conference on "Development and Anthropology" is currently being edited for publication.

The UGAT Directory of Anthropologists is now being finalized for initial printing.

7. Forthcoming activity

The National Conference on "The Anthropology of Philippine Anthropology: Issues and Concerns for the 90's" which was scheduled October 1991 was reset for April 1992 due to financial constraints. This will be held as planned in the Visayas Miag-ao Campus.

II. ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

AGRICULTURAL CREDIT AND POLICY COUNCIL (ACPC)

1. Research programs/projects

a. completed projects

(1) Evaluation of the Local Resource Management: Community Projects Fund Scheme – This study assessed the Local Resource Management (LRM) Rural Credit Financing Scheme being implemented by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) and the USAID in pilot regions. It entailed the (a) documentation and analysis of the LRM experience in three of the seven pilot provinces; (b) evaluation of the schemes vis-a-vis the banking and credit policies and experience under livelihood programs of line agencies, banks and non-government organizations; and (c) formulation of policy recommendations to improve rural credit financ ing.

b. ongoing projects

(1) Impact Evaluation of the Integrated Rural Financing (IRF) Program – One of the major projects approved by Congress for implementation by ACPC in 1991, consisting of three modules, namely, (a) Impact of Farmer's Income, Production, Savings, and Repayment Capacity, (b) Impact on Transaction Costs of Lenders and Borrowers, and (c) Impact on Savings Mobilization Perform ance of Participating Banks.

(2) Financial Intermediation in an Agrarian Reform Regime – The study aims to determine the structural changes that are expected to take place as a result of the implementation of the Comprehen sive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP), and the financial adjust ments that will accompany such changes. This is an 18-month activity which began last June 1990.

2. Credit flows and program monitoring activities

Course description: The two-day training dealt with financing and guarantee programs of government and the private sector to enable small farmers and fisherfolk to avail of credit services with the support of the banking and guarantee institutions.

b. Fourth Grameen Bank Replication Program Intensive Training, Negros Women for Tomorrow Foundation Training Center, Bacolod City, Negros Oriental, September 11-27, 1991

Participants: Non-government organizations, cooperative federations, cooperative rural banks, and social foundations.

Course description: The training aimed to equip prospective proponents of the Grameen Bank Replication Program with the knowledge, attitude and skills on the concept and operations of the Grameen Bank, and the role of the Agricultural Credit Policy Council in the program.

c. Fisheries Sector (FSP) Credit Consultative Dialogues, Iloilo City (February 26-27, 1991), Alaminos, Pangasinan (March 20-21, 1991), Balibago, Angeles City (April 17-18, 1991)

Participants: Provincial & municipal agricultural officers, fishermen's associations, and potential FSP clients

Course description: The training objective is to explain the mechanics and objectives of the FSP credit component, and the lending and guarantee schemes of government for the fishery sector.

d. The FSP Credit Appreciation Seminars, Naga City (November 12, 1991), Iloilo City (December 17, 1991)

Participants: Department of Agriculture field personnel

Course description: The seminar aimed to provide the participants with a background of the FSP credit component, its objectives, mechanics and status.

CENTER FOR INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT, PHILIPPINE CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY (CIRD-PCU)

1. Administrative structure and academic programs

The Academic Council under the leadership of the President is finalizing the unified Programs and Thrusts for the 90's. This will incorporate the structural and organizational changes initi ated last year.

To improve the communication system in the University, we have installed PABX Telephone System which became operational on January 8, 1992. New sets of computers had been purchased for the Library, Accounting, Personnel, and Registrar offices. These will facilitate the work and minimize delay in the recording and processing of records and credentials.

Meanwhile, PCU has a new Vice-President for Academic Affairs and a Personnel Officer. This year too, PCU has started a Ph. D. program on Development Administration and a Language Proficiency Program for Foreign Students.

The CIRD also has an ongoing program with the faculty of College of Nursing started in August this year. It is a modular program on Building the Research Capabilities (BREC) of the teachers in that unit with regular monthly workshops. It will be duplicated in other units.

2. Research and development activities

a. The amount of \$16,500 for the first phase of the two projects was sent by the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia last December 1991.

(1) Textbook Writing Program – Writers Training (WRIT) phase of the Program is scheduled on February 20-22 this year.

(2) Jacob's Well: An Opportunity Center for the Disadvantaged – The proposed center for the disadvantaged based in Dasmariñas, Cavite Campus of PCU is presently organizing its staff and programs.

b. The University has also allocated substantial funding for the Human Resource Development Pro-

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gram this year. For a starter, an administrator's Teambuilding Seminar was held on 5-7 June 1991. This was followed by seminars for coordinators and staff (September 3-4, Novaliches, Q.C.) and secretaries and clerks (December 12-13, Dasmariñas, Cavite). Each of these groups had several follow-up sessions after the initial seminar.

A number of our faculty members and some staff are enrolled in our Ph. D. and Master's programs and are given subsidies and discounts. Attendance to seminars, symposia, and conferences have been encouraged. Several of our senior officers have been granted travel grants and invited to present papers abroad.

3. Publication

The Inter-Institutional Consortium (I-IC) in which PCU is one of the five members is coming up with two new books on *Alternative Foods* and *Science Teaching*. The project was coordinated by the PCU-CIRD Director with funding from the UBCHEA. These will come out of the press by the end of January 1992.

Effective SY 1990-1991, the CIRD is tasked with the publication of PCU newsletter, *Christian Cord*, and journal, *Academic Review*.

The University Handbook is being prepared by an Ad-Hoc Working Committee appointed by the President. The first draft was submitted to the President last Dec. 5. Copies were distributed to all concerned for their comments and suggestions. These will be collated for possible inclusion in or revisions of the Handbook. The final draft will be prepared in time for the PCU Board of Trustees meeting in March for approval.

4. Present concerns

a. Administrative matters

(1) Need to further streamline our organizational structure

COLLEGE OF MASS COMMUNICATION, UNIVERSITY OF THE PHILIPPINES (CMC-UP)

1. Changes in organizational structure

Dr. Delia R. Barcelona was appointed new dean of UP-CMC effective May 1, 1991. Prior to her appointment, Dr. Barcelona was chairman of the College Graduate Program and has since been replaced by Dr. Ma. Lourdes C. Ocampo. On the other hand, Prof. Florinda D.F. Matco was appointed as the new College Secretary.

To facilitate the flow of work at the Office of the Dean, two new positions were created - that of the Assistant to the Dean for Academic Matters and the Assistant to the Dean for Administrative Matters.

2. New thrusts and programs

As articulated in its 1991-1995 Plan, the UP-CMC's vision is to move from being the leading communication education institution in the country and pushing its frontiers as such beyond the Philippines to the Asia and Pacific regions, particularly for graduate and postgraduate programs.

The fulfillment of this vision necessitates the redirection of the College's programs to go beyond mass communication to the other various forms of communication. More specifically, the realization of the vision requires a periodic review of the curriculum to make it more responsive to social needs and realities, keeping abreast with the latest communication technologies, implementation of a continuing faculty and staff development program, and providing students with a more adequate and well- rounded training in communication.

3. Research activities

The following research projects were completed within the year:

a. *Philippine-Japan Imaging Project* – This project had two compo nents: a) content analysis of news items related to Japan on nightly TV newscasts and in national dailies; and b) a videotape production of selected sequences from TV newscasts, programs and commercials related to Japan administered, along with a question naire, to a sample of college students.

b. Knowledge, Attitude, Practice or Behavior Related to HIV and AIDS among Seamen – The project aimed to gather information regarding the knowledge, attitude, practice or behavior of seamen with regard to HIV and AIDS.

c. Program for Decentralized Educational Development - Information, Education and Communication (PRODED-IEC) - The project involved the development, production and dissemination of IEC materials for the PRODED Program of DECS.

d. DWIR, Batanes Community Radio: An Evaluation Study - The study sought to gauge the impact of the Batanes Community Radio, a project conceptualized and implemented by the College on the community.

e. Impact of New Communication Technology on the Literacy Skills – The project aimed to study youth publications, their structure and contents, and their effect on the awareness and knowledge on the young readers.

An ongoing research project is the Survey on the "Effects of Mass Media on Health Related Behavior."

4. Seminars and training programs

The College conducted the 7th Graciano Lopez-Jaena Community Press Workshop last May 1991. This is an annual activity of the College aimed at upgrading the skills and professional competence of community journalists, aside from providing a national venue for the discussion of issues affecting community journalism and its practitioners.

A training program on Communication Management and Audiovisual Materials Production was also conducted by the College from June- September 1991 in cooperation with FAO-Rome, for a FAO fellow from Ghana, Africa.

Another FAO fellow from Uganda is undergoing training in Audio visual Production. The training program started last October 7, 1991 and will end on January 7, 1992.

5. Publications

The seventh issue of the *Philippines Communica*tion Journal came out in February 1991.

Two faculty members published their own books: Prof. Luis V. Teodoro, *The Summer of Our Discontent*

and Mr. Joel David, The National Pastime: Contemporary Philippine Cinema.

Dean Delia R. Barcelona and Prof. Jose R. Lacson, Jr. completed a publication project for AMIC on *Communication Education in the 90s*. The paper aimed to describe communication education in selected schools in Asia.

On-going publication projects are: 1) the translation and adaptation of Curtis McDougall's *Interpretive Reporting* which is in its final editing phase, and 2) a book on *Interpretative Reporting* authored by Prof. Luis V. Teodoro. Lastly, a proposal for a style manual on journalism in Filipino has been submitted by Mr. Ben G. Domingo for a faculty grant.

6. Other programs/services

The CMC has been selected as the WHO collaborating Center for Health Reporting for the Asia-Pacific Region. As such, the College is tasked to conduct researches and training programs on public information and education for health reporters.

The UP-CMC manages radio station DZUP. Plans are underway for strengthening the station's role as a medium for information dissemination within and outside the University.

An electronic newsroom was recently installed in the College. The project is intended to acquaint the students with some of the technology currently used in the processing of news and other materials for publications to prepare them for eventual work either in the print or broadcast media industry. The newsroom is equipped with a McIntosh computer, a laserprinter, three IBM computers with printers and a fax machine.

The Communication Law Office (CLO) was set up as part of the extension program of the College. The CLO will serve as a center for the compilation and study of laws affecting the Philippine mass media. It is envisioned to be both a resource for those undertaking research in mass media and as an active center of support for the improvement of the working conditions of mass media practitioners in the country.

7. Other activities

Last December 4, a College-wide curriculum review was held where in proposals to strengthen the College's academic programs were presented. Apart from the College's faculty, lecturers, and students, representatives of UP Visayas, UP Baguio and Miriam College participated in the review of the proposals.

On November 22, Dr. Erik Mortensen, a communication technology expert, delivered a lecture on information networking.

8. Problems and Recommendations

To effectively realize its vision, the College foresees the importance of addressing the following:

a. Fine-tuning of academic and administrative policies of the College;

b. Exploring the possibilities of tapping existing services in the College (e.g., printing unit) as sources of income for the College;

c. Periodic review of academic programs and course offerings; and

d. Establishing linkages with alumni and agencies in and outside the country.

COLLEGE OF SOCIAL WORK AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, UNIVERSITY OF THE PHILIPPINES (CSWCD-UP)

1. New thrusts and programs

5. Problems

The College was confronted with budgetary constraints which impeded the implementation of certain aspects of the curricular/extension/research programs and prevented the hiring of needed personnel.

6. Recommendations

Academically, CSWCD needs the support of the University in the implementation of its curricular program which is praxis-oriented with its class and field work offerings.

With respect to the academic and management review of the Col lege, it is suggested that indicators for assessing the perform ance of the College must not be limited to quantitative variables like student enrollment but must include such qualitative variables as community involvement and the like.

To increase enrollment, a review of the over-all admission policy is suggested. Likewise, a provision for incentives to encourage enrollment is recommended.

To successfully implement the programs of the College, its faculty and staff must also be assured of funding support.

CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH AND TRAINING SERVICE (CRTS)

Year 1991 proved to be a very productive year for the CRTS, a non-partisan, non-governmental legislative support structure, as services for the training and research components were consider ably expanded to address the needs of its growing clientele. In addition, CRTS has started to strengthen itself in two other areas: (1) information development and (2) project development, both of which are still in their initial stage.

1. Training activities

In the pursuit of its objectives of strengthening legislative capability and enhancing the legislative process, the Training Unit of the CRTS provided skills-building seminar workshops, information/orientation seminars, policy alternative seminars, and consultation forums not only to Members of Congress, their staff and Committees but to other sectors involved in the legis lative process as well. These include sectoral groups, non-gov ernmental organizations, people's organizations, and legislative liaison officers from the Executive Branch. Considering the wide range of clientele serviced by the program, training modules were designed to suit their various needs.

A new dimension to CRTS' thrust in institution building is found in its involvement in strengthening the legislative capability of the Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (ARMM). In connection with the operationalization of ARMM's Regional Legislative Assembly, CRTS conducted a "Legislative Capability Building Seminar Workshop."

Activities under CRTS programs such as the Comparative Legislative Systems Program (CLSP) and the Women Legislative Program (WLP) were also conducted.

Under the CLSP, an ambassadorial lecture series introducing the structures, processes, and dynamics of the parliaments of Asia, Africa, Latin America, Canada, Europe and the United States was held. This was in response to the growing need for information on parliamentary systems as a result of the move to change the form of Philippine government from presidential to parliamentary.

With respect to WLP, initial activities consisting of training programs and consultation forums were conducted with the aim of enhancing the role of women in the formal structures of power.

Evidently, the 1991 training agenda of CRTS designed to enhance legislative capability and strengthen democratic processes have been achieved through the different activities of its Training Unit.

2. Research services

Innovative approaches were adopted by the Research Unit in coming up with a very comprehensive Research Program that will be rele vant to the needs of its growing clientele. CRTS publishes *Info Packs*, which contain procedural and substantive information on certain legislative issues, and *Congressional Highlights*, a quarterly journal which contains an up-todate information on the Senate and the House of Representatives. Cognizant of the need to make the Philippine legislative process more meaningful and understandable to a greater number of Filipi nos, popularization of CRTS publications was included as part of its research agenda. Publication of popular issues, however, was implemented only during the last quarter of 1991. These issues include: *Kuwentong Kongreso* (comics), *Foreign Investments Act* (primer), *The 1991 Local Government Code: A Primer, and Primer on Electoral Reforms Law* (English and Tagalog versions).

3. Information development

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Aware of the need for a one-stop-shop for all materials and documentation on the Philippine and foreign legislatures, CRTS formally created and established a separate and independent unit, the Information Development Unit (IDU). An Information Develop ment Program was initiated to provide services which may be useful to researchers gathering data on a wide range of issues relevant to legislation.

The services of the Unit under the program include: (1) the library, which maintains a collection of materials related to legislation, political and socioeconomic subjects; (2) Legislative Newsdex, a concise abstract of Congress-related articles from different publications; (3) news monitoring, where newspaper articles are clipped, classified, and filed according to sub jects provided in CRTS Thesaurus; (4) enacted legislations, a collection of all copies of Republic Acts; (5) master cards, which contain official figures on various political and socioeconomic indicators; (6) Info Catalogue, a catalogue of local and international materials which can be found in different government and non-government agencies; (7) IDP Hot Line, which will provide quick response to inquiries on commonly used legislative materials and data through the phone; (8) Pick-up your data, where IDP staff put the data themselves for pick up by clients; and (9) Express News, which provides a digest of all important news dominating the front pages of leading newspapers in the country.

The services of the program will be opened to the public after the 1992 elections in time for the opening of the 9th Congress of the Philippines.

4. Project development

Through the CRTS' Project Development Unit, project proposals and programs are developed for submission to evaluation by funding agencies.

The Unit also provides technical and administrative services for commissioned projects outside of its regular training and research programs. At present, CRTS is engaged in two projects, namely, "Idealizing the Convention on the Rights of the Child" and "Grassroots Women's Political Participation Project." Funded by the UNICEF, the first project aims to prepare legislative agenda and action plan for Filipino children in the 1990s. The second one which is under the WLP of the CRTS focuses on sensitizing women at the community level regarding genderbased issues.

5. Plans

As the Eight Congressional Calendar comes to an end, CRTS is already preparing and developing new programs for the opening of the next Congress. Already in the pipeline is the People's Organ ization Internship Program (POINT), which seeks to familiarize the people's organizations with the executive and legislative structures and processes.

In time for the 1992 elections, a voters' education seminar series shall be conducted by CRTS in different colleges and universities. Also, briefing sessions and consultations shall be conducted with NGOs on the new Local Government Code, with focus on how to maximize their participation in local governance.

In the international front, CRTS has started networking with legislative support structures of other countries. CTRS thus plans to organize an international conference of all legislative support structures of countries in South America and Asia Pacific.

2. New thrusts and programs

IIRR has two core programs: the Field Operational Research (FOR) program and the Training and Outreach (TO) program. A support program, the Support Services and Institutional Management Pro gram covers the administrative and logistical activities. 3. Research projects and other research-related

activities

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The IIRR conducts field operational research in three "social laboratories" in the Philippines — one in Cavite, another in Albay, and the third one in the municipality of llog in Negros Occidental. The llog social lab is supposed to have been completely phased out last year.

The IIRR also has projects outside its "social laboratories" especially in other countries. A growing thrust is to have more non-Philippine-based projects in collaboration with IIRR's kindred organizations (national RR movements or alumni associations) or other strategic regional or national NGOs.

Research projects are conducted on a variety of subjects. Consistent with its integrated approach to rural development, IIRR's research projects fall under various field areas such as health, community organizing, informal/adult education, rural credit, women's rights, appropriate technologies, land reform, etc.

a. New major projects for 1991 are :

(1) Development of educational materials on the environment for nationwide distribution;

(2) A macro-project on food-based income generating alternatives in Negros Occidental in collaboration with UNICEF, the provincial government and other NGOs;

(3) The People's Education and Organization for the Protection of the Living Environment (PEOPLE) project in Cavite which will involve the organization of "environmental activists" at the village level capable of catalyzing community action towards local environmental issues;

(4) A project on regenerative agriculture in semi-arid lands in India in collaboration with MYRADA, a prominent Indian NGO; and

(5) A documentation project on the experiences in regenerative agriculture of farmers in Ghana.

b. Some of its major on-going projects are:

(1) The Agrarian Reform Information, Education and Legal Referral Services (ARIES) project in all three social labs;

(2) A macro-project which seeks to assist displaced, landless farmers find employment or business opportunities within the developing industrial environment in Cavite (the Program for Rural Industrialization and Development Entrepreneurship or PRIDE Project);

(3) The Participatory Nutrition Project supported by the FAO which seeks to develop, test and document a model for involving local communities in the planning and management of their own projects for nutrition and food security;

(4) Strengthening of the PAMANA Interlending Cooperative Federation – an association of village cooperatives seeking to achieve the stature of a "people's bank"; and

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(5) The continuing development of regenerative agricultural technologies specifically in the areas of low external input rice production, foodlot modules, bio-intensive gardening, agro- forestry, rural energy, aquaculture, low external input animal production systems, genetic resources conservation, coffee-based multi-storied cropping systems, and technologies for rural microenterprises.

4. Conferences

In 1990, the IIRR hosted a roundtable conference of Asian women leaders to discuss women's right issues. A second follow-up conference with a wider coverage is being planned this year.

The Second African Students Conference, a follow-up to a similar activity in 1990 will be held at IIRR's Silang campus in October.

In September, a conference of East African alumni to be held in Kenya is being supported by IIRR.

5. Training programs

The Institute conducts two regular international training pro grams yearly : one is a course on rural development management and the other is subjectspecific which varies depending on the needs of Third World rural development agencies as identified through the research efforts of the Institute.

The first training program for the period July 1991 to June 1992 is the "International Course on Regenerative Agriculture," scheduled in November. The "International Course on Rural Devel opment Management" is scheduled in May 1992.

Other training activities are or may be conducted upon request. Study tours have been organized, for instance, for Chinese and Cambodian rural development leaders in the second half of the year.

The IIRR also conducts or sponsors training activities outside the Philippines. Specifically, the Institute will be having a workshop on regenerative agricultural technologies in Guatemala this August, is proposing a number of training on family plan ning and regenerative agriculture in Africa and will be conduct ing a series of training on rural development management for a semi-government agency in Malaysia.

6. Publications

The Institute publishes the Rural Reconstruction Review, an annual journal for RR alumni and the

thrice-yearly International Sharing newsletter meant for alumni, friends, and other contacts. Both publications contain research papers and other material prepared by the staff of affiliated movements or those of IIRR.

Occasional monographs, special studies, proceedings of major conferences, sound slide/video productions, appropriate technology information kits, etc., are also produced. A major project of IIRR is the production of educational materials on the environ ment for nationwide distribution in coordination with GOs and other NGOs which have a program on the environment.

The Institute has its Communication Department with a corp of editors and writers and facilities for audio-visual production and desktop publishing.

7. Outreach activities and linkages

IIRR conducts training and outreach activities in order to spread its philosophy of integrated rural development called "Rural Reconstruction" (RR) and the practice of RR throughout the world. There are several thousand alumni of IIRR from countries of three regions of Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The Institute tries to maintain contact with these alumni through correspondences, "outreach visits", and its publications.

The alumni do not constitute or maintain any formal membership to IIRR. Through them, however, along with other dissemination campaigns, new participants to the Institute's training programs are recruited.

IIRR training alumni sometimes form themselves into independent alumni organizations. In every way possible, the Institute supports these associations. Right now, there are five such organizations based in Bangladesh, Thailand, East Africa, and Nepal.

Aside from the alumni associations, there are six affiliated national movements of IIRR which are located in India, Thailand, Guatemala, Colombia, Ghana, and the Philippines. There are independent organizations which carry out their own research activities in the tradition of social lab setting and their own outreach activities which aim to popularize the approach of rural reconstruction in integrated rural development within their national borders. IIRR maintains close contact with these movements which includes collaborative research projects. 54

INSTITUTE OF PHILIPPINE CULTURE, * ATENEO DE MANILA UNIVERSITY (IPC-AdeMU)

Activities

IPC maintained its research and training activities in the context of its research programs on agrarian reform, community health, social forestry, urban poor, and women. For its irrigation program, IPC continued to be a resource institution, but it was not actively involved in research in this area. IPC had been in the forefront of irrigation research and training activities for over 10 years; thus, it decided to end its active participation in this area.

The work in the ongoing research programs continued to involve "basic" research. The results of this were inputted into the ongoing development activities of government agencies and nongovernment organizations engaged in the resource area or sector covered by the programs. Two usual mechanisms through which IPC channeled the utilization of its research results were training programs and field implementation manuals.

IPC staff members participated in the design of training programs for field staff of government agencies and nongovernment organizations concerned, prepared the training materials, and acted as facilitators or resource persons in the training sessions. They also became members of committees which designed the implementa tion manuals and, subsequently, wrote the appropriate sections of these manuals.

Its research and training activities engaged the Institute with the following groups:

 personnel of the research unit and women in development unit of the National Confederation of Cooperatives (NATCCO) and its two regional development centers;

managers and implementors of programs and projects supported by the Canadian International Development Agency ((CIDA);

- staff of the Community Health Service of the Department of Health (DOH) and other DOH units involved in the agency's Partnership for Community Health Development Program;

- research staff of St. Louis University, Silliman University, and Colegio de San Jose-Recoletos which were involved in the community health research project of the International Develop ment Research Centre (IDRC);

-- staff of the Forest Management Bureau of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and other DENR units in volved in the agency's upland development program;

- staff of the resource institutions of DENR's upland development program, including the Philippine Business for Social Progress, University of the Philippines at Los Baños, and Visayas College of Agriculture; and

- staff of the Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), nongovernment organizations (NGOs), and resource institutions involved in the Tripartite Partnership for the Development of Human Resources in Rural Areas (PHILDHRRA).

As stated, the IPC staff was engaged in the preparation of manuals for the implementation of development programs in which the IPC was involved. For the DOH-PCHD (community health) program, IPC collaborated with the DOH in preparing the manual on "Process-Oriented Management Reporting System." For the TriPARRD (agrarian reform) program, IPC worked with PHILDHRRA in preparing the "Manual for TriPARDD Implementors." For the DENR (social forestry) program, IPC is leading in the write-up of the "Community Profiling Manual" and is participating in the preparation of three other manuals of the DENR social forestry program.

IPC also produced research reports on its research projects. Three reports were published during the year, namely: Romana P. de los Reyes and Sylvia Ma. G. Jopillo, *Pursuing Agrarian Reform in Negros Occidental*; Jeanne Frances I. Illo and Jaime B. Polo, *Fishers, Traders, Farmers, Wives: The Life Stories of Ten Women in a Fishing Village;* and Jeanne Frances I. Illo, ed., *Gender Analysis and Planning: The 1990 IPC-CIDA Workshops.*

Another major activity of IPC in 1991 was the Professional Social Science Graduate Training Program for Southeast Asian Students which started in October 1985. Under the program, Filipino, Indonesia, and Thai students are awarded scholarships to obtain any of the following master's degrees at the Department of Sociology and Anthropology (DSA) of the Ateneo de Manila University: M.A. in Sociology, Anthropology, and M.S. in Social Development. IPC

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has been managing this program, in collaboration with the DSA.

In addition, IPC has been in-charge of teaching a two-semester required course for the M.S. in Social Development, as well as organizing the field practicum during the semestral break. As of December 1991, a total of 51 students have been accepted into this program. Of the 51 students, 21 have completed their master's degrees, 6 are completing the write-up of their theses, 9 are undertaking thesis research, 5 are undertaking their course work, while 9 have either withdrawn or been released from the program.

The IPC's Visiting Research Associate Program continued to assist foreign researchers. In 1991, IPC had 7 visiting researchers. Four were graduate students—1 from the Australian National University, 1 from the University of Amsterdam, 1 from Rikkyo (St. Paul's) University, and 1 from the Institute of Developing Studies. The other two were university professors—1 from Kyushu University, and 1 from the Center for South and Southeast Asian Studies of the University of Amsterdam.

Plans and concerns

IPC intends to continue its research programs on agrarian reform, community health, social forestry, urban poor, and women. It expects to begin a watershed management program in 1992 through a research project with the Antique Integrated Area Development. Moreover, in line with its plan to strengthen its community health program, IPC will develop and teach a course on "Anthropology and Sociology of Medicine" at the Department of Sociology and Anthropology of the Ateneo de Manila University beginning in School Year 1993-94.

The lack of senior research associates remains a major concern of IPC. To resolve the problem, IPC is encouraging its promising research assistants to pursue graduate studies.

INSTITUTE FOR SOCIAL RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT, ST. LA SALLE UNIVERSITY (ISRAD-SLSU)

1. Reorganization

The school year 1990-1991 saw the rebirth of the Social Research Center into the Institute for Social Research and Development (ISRAD). As an institute, it now represents an organization whose members constitute a unique technical and professional entity dedicated to research in the social sciences and development.

By means of both 'basic' and 'applied' research, ISRAD seeks to render the highest form of academic contribution (a) in solving the complex societal problems that confront the province and the nation, and (b) in arriving at a deeper understanding of Filipino lifeways as exemplified in this part of the country. In all its activities, it shall strive for scholarship, intellectual honesty, moral integrity, and social meaning.

One of the ISRAD's primary objectives is to provide the university faculty in the field of anthropology, economics, history, humanities, mass communication, political science, psychology, sociology, and related disciplines a venue for engagement in research.

It encourages faculty members to present meritorious research proposals dealing with subjects of vital significance in the social sciences, the humanities and related disciplines.

Moreover, the ISRAD seeks to provide students who are interested in the social sciences and the humanities a 'laboratory' with the fundamental skills required by the different disciplines. Through their participation in the ISRAD's activities, they will be assisted in deepening their commitment to careers in these fields of endeavor.

The Institute now has a regular, full-time staff of 17 research associates, research training and technical assistants. Along with its contracted staff, ISRAD employs as many as 30 staff members consisting of research assistants, process documentors, trainors, data encoders, community organizers, museum and library assistants. The key people in the Institute are as follows:

2. Program thrusts

In line with its mandate, the Institute pursues different program initiatives.

Undertaken on a continuing and regular basis, the following shall be maintained as the ISRAD's principal programs: (a) Social Research Program, (b) Negrense Studies Program, (c) Development Studies Program, and (d) Computer and General Services Program.

The coverage of the four principal programs are delineated as follows:

The Social Research Program includes sociological surveys, an thropological researches, evaluation studies, economic and labor market analyses, poverty studies, social planning, and research on specific target groups such as women, children and national cultural communities. This program shall have charge of rapid appraisals and process documentation.

The Negrense Studies Program covers historical documentation and preservation, museum development, archaeological explorations, collection as well as publication of literary, historical, and critical works, and the partronage of the local arts. This program shall have charge of the Museo Negrense as well as the research library.

The Development Policy Studies Program focuses on public administration issues, political and legal analysis, and development policy research and analysis (on such themes as industrial and agricultural development, agrarian reform, public health, social housing, and the environment). The program shall have charge of social advocacy, which may entail participation in multisectoral committees, interfacing with government entities, and providing informed commentaries on relevant social issues.

The Computer and General Services Program supervises the Institute's computer facility and provides the administrative support services that are indispensable to the day-to-day manage ment of the Institute, such as accounting, personnel, supplies, and physical plant. This program shall meet the data and word processing needs of the other programs and provide data banking services.

The complementary program areas of the ISRAD are as follows: (a) Publications Program, (b) Training Program, and (c) Visiting Research Associate Pro-

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gram. Under these programs, ISRAD will, from time to time, issue publications to disseminate important findings from its research studies, conduct training programs along its various lines of expertise, and provide institutional affiliation to researchers coming from other academic institutions.

LANGUAGE STUDY CENTER, PHILIPPINE NORMAL UNIVERSITY (LSC-PNU)

There has been no change in organizational structure since last year.

A proposal on the evaluation of the New Elementary School Curriculum (NESC) Filipino and English curricula has been prepared. Unfortunately due to lack of funds, said project has not yet been started.

The Center launched a publication project. The proposal is for the Center to put up its own journal, newsletter and occasional paper series. Actually, the latter is meant to be a revival of the Occasional Paper Series which the Center put up in the 1970's. Like the evaluation proposal mentioned above, the journal could not be published for lack of funds. It deserves to be mentioned, however, that the maiden issue of the journal expected to be out in June 1991 is supposed to contain seven articles in about 200 pages. All but one of the articles have been edited and are ready for typesetting.

The article by Mrs. Lou Hohulin of the Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL) entitled "Notes on Keley-I Relational Grammar-I" is being prepared as the Center's Occasional Paper. Hopefully by the end of February, 1992,the Occasional Paper shall have been made ready for distribution.

Problems and recommendations

The intention was to carry out research activities but due to financial problems, this was not pushed through.

It is hoped that this year, 1992 the LSC will be able to generate needed funds to finance its proposed projects.

2. In support of the government's response to the problem of Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD), the PAN has engaged into the following activities:

a. RESEARCH AND STATISTICS CENTER, BICOL UNIVERSITY (RSC-BU)

1. Organizational structure

In order to reinforce the research capability of the different colleges of the University, the teaching personnel of the RSC are deployed to such colleges to teach and to coordinate and to conduct researches for the college of their choice. Their items will be fully transferred to the colleges by January 1992. THe six non-teaching staff and the Director of the Research Center are now full-time staff.

RESEARCH CENTER, DIVINE WORD UNIVERSITY OF TACLOBAN (RC-DWU)

1. Administration

Mr. Antonio E. Lim, Jr., the assistant director of the Research Center, left last October 14, 1991 for his doctoral studies in Brussels, Belgium, and Miss Denisa P. Moreto, chairman of the Committee on Health-Related Researches, was appointed to take over his functions.

The new chairman of the Committee on Health-Related Researches is Mrs. Elvira Lanza, Level IV coordinator and research adviser in the College of Nursing.

2. Activities

a. The Research Center sponsored the Second Training Course on Research Advisorship last November 14, 15, and 23 at the DWU Conference Room and Computer Laboratory.

The objectives of the training course were as follows:

(1) To identify the statistical tests appropriate for the different research designs.

(2) To appreciate the basic concepts of the commonly used statistical tests.

(3) To be familiar with the operation of the IBM personal computer.

(4) To apply some tests contained in the Epistat and Microstat, two statistical packages, in the analysis of research findings.

The team of trainors included DWU Graduate SchoolDean Efleda Bautista, Dr. Jovita Jadloc and Mr. Gabino Petilos from the Graduate School of the Leyte State College of Tacloban, and DWU Computer Education and Application Center of Acting Director Felipe Vilches, Jr.

It was an in-service training participated by 33 faculty members and research advisers from the different departments/colleges of the institution.

The ultimate goal of our series of seminarworkshops on research advisorship is to have a core of faculty members who are adequately skilled in advising undergraduate students in conducting research for their theses.

b. The Research Center has been assigned to prepare and published the Festchriff, a souvenir yearbook for the 25th year of DWU as a university. The target date for the release of the yearbook is February 1992.

Aside from pictorials covering the major events in the historical development of the institution, the yearbook contains selected articles on researches conducted in the University, or by administrators and faculty members connected with the University.

c. Meanwhile, the Research Center is preparing for Paisan-isan '92 which will be held on February 4-8, 1922. Paisan-isan is a yearly competition of researches, and quiz contests in the fields of Behavioral Sciences, Commercial Sciences, Health-Related Sciences, Humanities and Natural and Physical Sciences. The programme of activities has been prepared, and the Chairpersons of the various working committees have been already identified.

d. Regular meetings have been conducted with the members of the Research Council. During the meeting last October, the research proposal of Mrs. Estrella de Dios on the topic, "Cryptosporidiosis: Its Epidemiology and Diagnosis" was evaluated. It was re spectufly returned to the proponent with the following recommen dations:

(1) Its significance for Region 8 should be clarified.

(2) The approval of Philippine Women's University (where the proponent is currently enrolled) that Divine Word University be made a co-owner of the finished project be sought.

3. Problems

This year, the Research Center received only two research proposals for funding. The reason is that our faculty members would rather accept more teaching loads than conduct researches. This in turn is due to lack of financial incentives in conducting researches.

4. New facilities and acquisitions

The SURP Library has recently acquired training and library materials on Alternative Low-Cost Water Resource Develpment and Management courtesy of the International Training Network-Training Network Center (ITN-TNC) consisting of twenty (20) Training Modules of fifty-three titles. Expected to arrive shortly are computers and a photo-copying machine to augment the information dissemination capabilities of the School as a participating institution of the network.

Recently inaugurated is the new Filipiniana Section of the library serving as the repository of Philippine materials on planning and planning-related activities and concerns in the country. This section houses 2,409 titles of 4,549 volumes in a specially designated room of the expanded SURP library.

Recently turned over are documents and materials which are the outputs of the Legislative-Executive Bases Council about U.S. Conversion plans on the alternative socio-economic and military uses of the U.S. bases in the country.

For the first half of the year, the library also acquired forty- five (45) new books on various topics related to development planning.

5. Publication and information dissemination

The Philippine Planning Journal (PPJ) is the publication of the School which serves to disseminate information on contemporary and vital planning issues and concerns. Recently published is the October 1987 and April 1988 edition focusing on the theme "Planning Issues" which came off the press in March 1991.

The "Kapihan sa SURP" is another forum for meaningful sharing of information and experiences among faculty and research staff of SURP in the course of the conduct of their projects and consultancy engagements. Three "Kapihan ..." sessions were held during this period on the following topics:

6. Problems

a. difficulty in increasing enrolment

The SURP is a graduate school and does not have any undergraduate program to feed and ensure reasonable class size for its graduate program. Such set-up limits the student popula tion to working students and/or government scholars who consider a second degree as postponable providing them the reason to drop-out or take a leave of absence for certain periods of time to attend to work-related matters like increased office duties, field assignments, etc.

b. inadequate resources/lack of incentives to do research

The research output of the faculty and the research staff can stand a lot of improvement. This is so because university fund ing for research is very limited and some of the staff perceive that incentives to perform well are practically nil.

c. undermanned training staff

The Training Division consists of only a two-man staff, the Director of Training and the Training Associate who divide the total work load for training between the two of them – from the routine administrative functions of program implementation to the more substantive aspects like improving training design, monitoring effects of program on participants and on their respective offices, etc.

d) Lack of facilities and equipment

Another major problem is the lack of adequate support logistics like computers, audio-visual equipment, softwares, etc., which are standard support facilities in quality planning schools. The venues for the SURP's training programs have been the training room and the mini-theater which have been perceived by the participants as inadequate and ill-equipped.

7. Recommendations

a, to increase enrolment

The School has started accepting new students during the second semester even if this would mean repeating several core courses offered during the first semester. Also, a one-year Diploma Course on Land Use Planning has been approved by the faculty and referred to the University curriculum cluster concerned as a response to the demand of local government planning officials for a short degree program. The School also proposes to add Transportation Planning to its areas of specialization to be included in the program for 1991-1995.

b. to improve research facilities

Upgrading of the Research Division will not only entail beefing up of its staff but also providing the mecessary logistical support for basic equipment and facilities in view of the present backlog on the publication of the PPJ and the reproduction of other research outputs. Thus, the staff are being encouraged to attend seminars on the conduct of research, preparation of research materials and methodology development to improve their research capabilities. There are also definite plans to acquire the needed equipment for the research division which include a 30MB hard disk with the accompanying software for its computer, a printer and a slide projector.

c. to increase the staff of Training Division

Similar to the Research Division, the Training Division will require beefing up and training of its present staff and the provision of the necessary training equipment and facilities such as computers with audio-visual capabilities, public address systems, slide and film projectors, overhead projectors, etc.

d. to provide adequate credit to extension services rendered by the Faculty

SURP faculty members and research staff are extensively in volved in various extension services which enable them to share their expertise and resources with the national and local governments requesting their technical assistance. Since these activities entail substantial time and considerable effort, it is recommended that they be given the appropriate credit allowed to substitute for research and academic work load.

SOCIAL RESEARCH OFFICE, ATENEO DE DAVAO UNIVERSITY (SRO-ADEDU)

SOCIAL WEATHER STATIONS (SWS)

1. Background

SWS is a private non-stock, non-profit social rescarch institution. It is an association of social science professionals called Fellows. Whatever their discipline, the Fellows recognize that social, economic and political developments are interre lated and that the quality of social analysis is ultimately founded on the empirical data base.

SWS is oriented towards empirical, social indicators-based research on public issues. Thus, government agencies, private corporations and various development-oriented institutions are its main clientele.

The original survey data are archived in the SWS Survey Data Bank permanently available for future research. The Data Bank now includes: diskettes for time series of 12 national surveys and 6 Metro Manila Surveys from April 1984 to March 1991; the diskettes from several ad hoc commissioned SWS surveys in various locations; and data tapes for a 1983 national survey and several 1981-1982 Metro Manila surveys that had been done by SWS Fellows earlier. Findings from the surveys are published in fortnightly Social Weather Bulletins, occasional SWS papers, research reports, and in newspaper columns and articles by SWS staff members.

SWS is self-supporting, non-subsidized, academic institute for survey research. It enters into research contracts in the areas of expertise of its fellows and staff members. Its non-commissioned survey activities are supported from a General Survey Fund made up from the fees paid by institutional and individual subscribers. These subscription fees are pooled together in order to defray the expenses for the continuing of Social Weather Surveys.

To maintain its credibility as an independent and unbiased source of primary survey data, SWS inhibits itself from conduct ing proprietary surveys. In cases of commissioned, socially-sensitive survey research, SWS makes arrangements with sponsors for a strictly temporary embargo of the data and of research findings. After the projects are terminated, all SWS survey data may be accessed by the public without the need for permission from the original project spon-

sors. It, however, reserves the right to charge appropriate fees for use of the SWS Survey Data Bank.

2. Research projects

a. The Social Weather Surveys. This series of noncommissioned general social surveys constitute the theme project of SWS. Designed under SWS initiative, these surveys aim to fill in gaps in data not covered by existing sources. They include both negular time series and readings on contemporary public issues. The list of contemporary issues considered in each survey is drawn up in consultation with the SWS council of advisers. The time series include many variables which SWS has been monitoring for years, thus providing trends in economic and social conditions.

For 1991, SWS conducted the March 1991 Metro Manila survey, the findings of which have already been released to its clients, press and the general public. On field now is the June 1991 national survey.

b. Rural Welfare Monitoring: Focus on Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries. Sponsored by the Presidential Agrarian Reform Council (PARC) through the Department of Agriculture (DA), this project develops a new series of annual surveys capable of monitoring rural welfare and the impact of the agrarian reform program on the welfare of its intended beneficiaries, namely, the Rural Welfare Survey and a 1990 Survey of the Welfare of Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries. It also designed special software for computer-encoding of the survey data and conducted training seminars for Bureau of Agricultural Statistics (BAS) provincial staff members. For 1991, BAS took over the field implementation of the new series of surveys, with SWS retained for technical consultancy services.

c. *Religion and Social Consciousness*. Commissioned by the National Secretariat for Social Action (NASSA), a social action arm of the Catholic Church to do research examining the correlation between the religious variables and the public's attitudes on selected social issues, SWS, SWS submitted a report to NASSA entitled, "National Survey on Religious Affiliation, Church Attendance, Strength of Religious Belief, and Views on Family Planning" in January 1991.

d. Annual Monitoring of Poverty. This study, jointly sponsored by the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) and International Labor Organization (ILO), aims to synthesize available technical procedures for monitoring urban

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poverty on an annual basis. The final paper was submitted to ILO (Geneva) in January 1991.

c. Database on Labor Recruitment Agencies. Commissioned by the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA), SWS developed a computerized database of recruitment agency pro files.

f. A Study of Social Attitudes of Filipinos Towards Family Planning Interest Groups. This is a project sponsored by the Philippine Legislators' Committee on Population and Development Foundation (PLCPD), out of a research grant from the Population Crisis Committee. It involves developing and implementing a special survey module covering PLCPD concerns in the June 1991 a national survey.

3. Publications and data services

5. Publication plans

SWS hopes to publish the following: Statistical Yearbook, a Philippine Social Report, and an SWS Catalogue.

6. Organizational structure and election of SWS Board Members

a. organizational plan

The SWS staff has been reorganized for greater efficiency and to adjust to the reality of SWS' large size. The staff are now organized into three Groups: (a) Projects and Surveys Group (b) Publications and Data Services Group (c) Administration and Finance Group. Each Group is headed by a Group Manager, who is answerable to the President.

b. salary structure

SWS aligned staff wages to a pay structure approved by the SWS Board in December 1990, which aims to be competitive with institutions such as UP, NEDA, PIDS, and CRC. There is a Committee on Staff Advancement to handle recommendations for merit increases and promotion.

c. SWS Board Members for 1991

The General Assembly of Fellows elected the seven members of the SWS Board for 1991, namely: Dr. Mahar Mangahas, Prof. Felipe MIranda, Mrs. Mercedes Abad, Ms. Jasmin Acuna, Ms. Meliza Agabin, Ms. Linda Guerrero, and Ms. Luz Bautista.

7. Networking

a. In May 1991, SWS participated in the International Social Survey Programme (ISSP) annual meeting in Dublin, Ireland, which discussed the forthcoming ISSP's 1992 survey agenda. The ISSP survey module planned for 1992 will be on Social Inequality. The meeting further identified Environment, National Identity, and Role of Government as the survey topics for 1993, 1994, and 1995, respectively.

b. The SWS is highly involved in various activities of the Market Opinion Research Society of the Philippines (MORES). Particularly relevant for social research is the effort to standardize the various socioeconnomic classification systems (the so called ABCDE system) used by the MORES members. Another important activity is the unification of action, including possible legal action, to protect the

proprietary rights of MORES members to their research data.

8. Seminars

The SWS Research Seminar Series was formally launched with the maiden seminar by Dr. Mahar Mangahas on the SWS Public Opinion Surveys, arranged in collaboration with the UP School of Economics. Thereafter, the seminar on the PARC survey results on agrarian reform was conducted jointly with the UPLB— Institute of Agrarian Studies last June 17, 1991.

9. Membership campaign

In 1991, SWS admitted Dr. Margarita Holmes (Clinical Psychologist), Dr. Abraham Felipe (President, Fund for Assistance to Private Education), and Dr. Steven Rood (Associate Professor of U.P. College in Baguio) as SWS Regular Fellows.

10. Problems and recommendations

a. Survey data leakages to non-clients prior to SWS publication

To protect its rights to its intellectual property, SWS has taken the following steps:

(1) Improvement of its copyright label;

(2) Registration of SWS publications such as the Social Weather Reports and SWS Occasional Papers at the copyright section of the National Library;

(3) Scheduling of SWS briefings guided by the following considerations: (a) a one-week gap between the subscribers' brief ings and the limited media presentation by SWS; (b) a one week gap between the media presentation and the end of the embargo; and (3) a provision that the end of the embargo should be two months after the start of the pre-publication briefings;

(4) Issuance of formal warnings to briefing participants not to violate the understanding that data revealed in the briefings may not be published or passed on for publication and initia tion of legal action if necessary; and

(5) Issuance of formal protests to media publishers and journalists who publish SWS data which have not yet been cleared for publication and is initiating appropriate legal action.

11. Plans

a. SWS plans to intensify its campaign in inviting the social science community to make use of the SWS Survey Data Bank.

b. SWS plans to continue commissioning rider survey questions on a module basis or a set of questions on current economic, social and political issues, in its regular Metro Manila and national survey rounds.

The approved guidelines are:

1. Nominations

The award is open to any individual provided that he/she comes from any of the thirteen social science disciplines as defined by the by-laws of the Philippine Social Science Council. These disciplines are as follows: anthropology, communication, demography, economics, geography, history, linguistics, political science, psychology, public administration, social work, sociology, and statistics.

Nominations will be solicited from regular and associate members of the PSSC. Nominees from associate members shall be referred to the regular associations concerned to compete with the other nominees. Specific procedures for nominations shall be formulated by the regular member associations concerned. These proce-

dures shall comply with the prescribed criteria for the procedures stated in item number 3 of this document. The standard curriculum vitae form created for this purpose will also be used.

2. Schedule for giving awards to the various disciplines

Not all disciplines will be given awards for every year. The following schedule will be followed:

1990 (first year):	Geography Linguistics Political Science Psychology Statistics
1991 (second year):	Anthropology Economics History Public Administration
1992 (third year):	Communication Demography Social Work Sociology

3. Criteria

The following criteria shall guide the selection of the awardee. These criteria are prescribed by the Governing Council in various resolutions:

a. Education. The nominees must have at least a graduate degree.

b. Teaching experience in private or public schools

c. Research and publications. The nominators will be asked to submit copies of their work for examination.

d. Service to the PSSC and other scientific institutions

e. Practice of his profession or of any other social science discipline either singly or in company with others in the service of public or private organizations and the community, not included in the above-mentioned criteria

f. Moral integrity

4. Selection

The regular associations will select one from among the nominees submitted to them. Their choice will be considered semi-final and will be submitted to the PSSC Executive Board which gives the final approval. The participation of the regular association in the selection of the awardee is based on the premise that one's own peers and colleagues are in the best position to effectively and accurately judge a candidate's achievements in and contributions to their specific field. In making their choices, the associations shall be guided by the aboveprescribed criteria and guidelines. They shall also furnish the Executive Board with a brief justification of their choice.

5. Announcement of Awards

The awardees shall each receive plaque of recognition. Awarding ceremonies will be held during the Annual Meeting of the PSSC in February of each year.

That upon completion of at least two and a half (2 1/2) years of service, the performance of an incumbent Executive Director shall be evaluated by a Committee of five (5) members; three from the Governing Council and two from the Executive Board. The senior member from the Governing Council shall be the Chairman of the Evaluation Committee without the power to vote except in case of a tie.

2. That only social scientists who have served the PSSC for at least one (1) year as members of the Governing council, Executive Board, or any of its standing committees, are eligible to be appointed as members of the Evaluation Committee.

3. That in the evaluation of the performance of the Executive Director, the following shall be considered with the corresponding percentages as indicated:

a. Ability to assist the Governing Council and the Executive Board and its working committees in the formulation, adoption, promulgation and implementation of resolutions, policies, programs and procedures.......20%

b. Ability to assist the Treasurer in the management of the funds of PSSC and to maintain a stable fiscal position......20%

d. Initiative to generate funds and secure equipment for PSSC and to maintain linkage with funding institutions.......20%

c. Initiative to promote and maintain linkage with local and foreign institutions as well as with any agency of the Philippine Government with similar objectives with PSSC....20%

4. That on the basis of its findings, the Evaluation Committee shall make recommendation to the Council and to the Board, as to whether the incumbent Executive Director shall be reappointed or not. The recommendation must be made within 30 days upon creation of the Committee.

5. That in case the recommendation is for non-reappointment, the Evaluation Committe shall then constitute itself as the SEARCH COMMITTEE.

6. That upon instruction from the Chairman of the Governing Council and/or the President of the Executive Board, the Committe shall then announce the coming vacancy for the position of Executive Director to as wide an area as possible stating the follow ing qualifications and the compensation thereof:

a. Filipino citizen and holder of at least a Master's degree in any field of social science.

b. Available and willing to serve for a period of three (3) years on full time basis, without prejudice to reappointment.

c. Known academic stature, competent in his/her field and experienced in teaching and/or research.

d. Satisfactory track record in financial management/program administration.

e. Respected member of the social science community, dynamic, flexible with moral integrity, able to work with other and with various types of institutions and organizations.

7. Based on the curriculum vitae of the applicants, the Search Committee shall, within 30 days before the end of the term of the incumbent Executive Director, submit three (3) most qualified nominees to the Council and the Board form whom they would select in a joint meeting the most qualified to the position of Executive Director.

8. The appointing authority (Council and Board) shall be guided by the attached score card in which are listed the criteria to be considered in evaluating the candidates.

9. The President shall sign the appointment of the chosen Executive Director. In his/her absence or inability to act, the Chairman of the Governing Council shall sign the appointment.

10. That all previous rules, orders, procedures and resolutions inconsistent with this

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Resolution are hereby repealed and superseded.

11. This Resolution shall be effective upon approval by the Governing Council of PSSC.

I. Call of the meeting to order. The Chairman called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. after the national anthem was played.

II. Proof of quorum. Only seven (7) out of fourteen (14) members were present.

III. Approval of the proposed agenda. The agenda were approved as proposed.

IV. Approval of the minutes of the February 16, 1991 Annual meeting. The minutes were approved after taking note of the correction of Dr. Rosario Cortes' last name which was misspelled with a 'z' not an 's'.

V. Business arising from the minutes

The Executive Director briefed the body on the resolutions of the Governing Council during the first half of 1991 and the corresponding actions that were taken.

VI. New Business

A. Report of the President

On behalf of the Board President, Dr. Socorro L. Reyes, who is still abroad the Vice-President, Dr. Amaryllis T. Torres presented the President's Report.

Emphasis of the report was on the new projects and organizational changes that were launched or undertaken for the continued pursuit of the Agenda Towards the Year 2000 as well as the resolutions and declarations of the National Social Science II held two years ago.

As for the PSSC's finances, the finanprojection for the year 1991 was cial assured as it posted a seventy percent (70%) realization from January to June due mainly to the good returns on its investments and the increase on center rental income. However, PSSC expects a slight decrease on its investment returns beginning the later part of the year and the first half of 1992 due to on the national the adverse effect economy of calamities and political-related factors.

All in all, the first half of 1991 seemed to be a lean period in terms of research and training projects as compared to its previous mid-year performance. It is expected, however, that the rest of the year will be a productive period.

B. Report of Regular and Associate Members

The Executive Director presented the report of the eight (8) out of fourteen (14) regular associations and seventeen (17) out of thirty six (36) associate members who were able to submit their report in time for the mid-year meeting. The reports appear also in the printed mid-year report.

For associate members whose reports were not included in the printed midyear report, the following through their delegates rendered brief statements on their activities; Gowing Memorial Research Center; Bicol University Research Office; Divine Word and Statistics University of Tacloban; University of Sto. Tomas; Social Research Center; and the Philippine Association of Nutrition.

VII. Open Forum

Prof. Aguilar explained the rationale for the theme of the open forum which is "Unity and Collaboration Among Member-Associations".

The theme of the open forum is based on the observations that:

a) not all member associations are in touch with all the goings-on in PSSC;

b) there is a perennial difficulty in getting the associations to be involved in multi-disciplinal activities due to the lack of time of the senior individual members who are often called upon when

the PSSC has to undertake such activities; and

c) the secretariat is having difficulties in monitoring baseline data important in determining the strengths and weaknesses of the associations necessary in drawing up plans and projects.

The following points, focusing on the unmet requirements of the Council's development thrusts and its memberships' inter-organizational strengthening, were raised in view of the said problems.

a. Need to tap the expertise of the members of PSSC Governing Council and Executive Board and other scholars affiliated with the Council to set directions and priorities on programs and projects that PSSC may undertake.

It was stressed that what is needed up with viable in order to come programs and projects is a group of scholars who will really devote time and effort on such projects. In view busy often conflicting of the and schedules of the members of the Board and the Council, is it possible for them to delegate the tasks to others who are worthy of their trust and will surely work for the realization of the project?

Another suggestion is that PSSC should tap or even pressure the members of the Council and the Board— in view of their stature, connections, and awareness of the trends in research and sources of funds— to set direction for the PSSC and identify the short-term and long-term programs and projects that PSSC should undertake.

b. The need to identify the common areas of collaboration among member-associations for a particular period of time.

At present, the PSSC is involved in planning and carrying out social science programs and projects under such areas of concern as training, publication, research, and advocacy.

Specifically, two projects were cited as examples of the past and present efforts of the PSSC to promote collaboration among its members. These are the PSSC Social Science Encyclopedia Project which is still seeking for external funds and a research consortium organized in the Cagayan Valley area.

It was noted that among the problems that must be considered in multi-disciplinary projects that initiating would require collaborative efforts are lack of available funds, lack of viable programs that must and concrete be presented to funding agencies, and difficulty in arranging meetings among members of the Board due to their schedules to sit and plan busv for specific projects that may be undertaken.

Alternatively, the PSSC may study the possibility of providing some assistance to member associations seeking approval from funding institutions of their respective programs and projects. The PSSC may also provide ways and measures to strengthen horizontal contacts among its province-based members.

Specific areas of collaboration were also discussed such as the concern on disaster research and the sharing of information on electoral reform.

c. Need to consider the possibility of holding at least one conference annually where papers on a specific topic viewed from different perspectives will be presented by member associations.

Through the holding of an annual conference, it is hoped that the par-

ticipation of the member associations will be further enhanced.

d. Need to facilitate exchange of organizational and social science information among member associations.

The PSSC should study the posof coming up with an informasibility tion bulletin or a newsletter that will help circulate among member associations information on their respective acor any other relevant informativities tion that they want to be disseminated. Such publication may sent to members at regular intervals.

The PSSC may also help in the collection of data sets useful in research to be made available to member associations. The SWS in particular invited the members to use the SWS data bank at minimal cost.

e. Need to help in the promotion of institutional exchange of faculty members for research and similar purposes.

In this regard, some members noted that PSSC may have difficulty in contributing on this matter.

With respect, to the monitoring problem of the Secretariat on the activities of the member-associations, the following suggestions were given:

> —PSSC should improve its communication facilities; for instance, PSSC may invest in the acquisition of a facsimile machine.

> —The computer know-how of the Secretariat (e.g., interchanging software programs and disk

capacities) should be upgraded to facilitate the exchange of information.

---There should be periodic contacts between the Secretariat and the member associations. The member-associations at their own initiative may send representatives or correspondence to the Secretariat regarding their activities. The PSSC must also adopt measures to make the members aware of each other's concerns.

--Quantitative and qualitative developments in PSSC's network should be reflected in a map. With some color coding, the PSSC will be able to keep track of the strengths and weaknesses of its members, especially in the regions.

VIII. Adjournment

There being no other matters to discuss the meeting was adjourned at 12:20 p.m.
