Frank Lynch

Frank Lynch, SJ., received his earlier education from Fordham College in New York and Woodstock College, Maryland. He earned his M.A. in anthropology from the University of the Philippines in 1949, and his Ph.D. in the same discipline from the University of Chicago in 1959.

A past editor of the Philippine Sociological Review, Father Lynch published extensively on Philippine society and culture. From among the more than one hundred and fifty essays, articles and monographs he had written on the Philippines, he especially liked to be remembered for his Social Class in a Bikol Town, Understand. ing the Philippines (with M.R. Hollnsteiner), Bittersweet Taste of Sugar, Four Readings on Philippine Values (as compiler and contributor) and View from the Paddy (as contributor and editor).

At the time of his death in September, 1978, Lynch was resident consultant at the Institute of Philippine Culture and chairman and professor of anthropology at the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, Ateneo de Manila University. Off campus he was a consultant of the Population Center Foundation and a member of the Executive Board of the Philippine Social Science Council, as well as of various other learned societies in the social sciences.

Emma Porio

Emma Porio is a candidate for a Ph. D. in sociology at the East West Center in Hawaii. She received her M.A. in the same discipline from the Ateneo de Manila University.

Ms. Porio was sent as an exchange student to Texas in 1966-67, to participate in the American Field Service Exchange Program, and there received the American Heritage Award from the Future Teachers of America Association.

She joined the IPC in 1972 and in 1974 became project supervisor for the second part of the IPC/PSSC survey on national development, here reported.

Mary Hollnsteiner

Mary Racelis-Hollnsteiner is currently Senior Policy Specialist at the Community and Family Life Programme Group, United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), New York. In the past four years, she has travelled extensively in third world countries, studying the conditions of women and children in the underdeveloped world. Her findings are published in various UNICEF publications,

Prior to her commitments at the United Nations, Ms. Holinsteiner was professor of sociology and anthropology at the Ateneo de Manila University. She was also Director of the Institute of Philippine Culture from 1968 to 1977. In 1976, she was awarded an honorary Ph.D. (social sciences) by the De La Salle University, Manila, in recognition of her vital contributions to Philippine sociology and anthropology.

Dr. Hollnsteiner is author of *The Dynamics of Power in a Philippine Municipality (1963)* editor of *Society, Culture and the Filipino* and co-editor of *Tales of American Teachers in the Philippines (1959)*, as well as of numerous articles on social issues, published in learned periodicals here and abroad.

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
