Our guest editor, Wilhelm Flieger, is a priest of the Society of the Divine Word (S. V. D.). A graduate of the University of Chicago (Ph.D. in sociology, 1967), Fr. Flieger is currently professor and chairman, department of social anthropology, University of San Carlos (Cebu), a university professor of the University of the Philippines Population Institute (UPPI), and a research associate of the Population Research Center, University of Chicago. Francis C. Madigan, S.J., received the Ph.D. in sociology from the University of North Carolina. He is currently chairman of the department of sociology and anthropology, director of the Research Institute for Mindanao Culture, and director of the Mindanao Center for Population Studies — all at Xavier University, Cagayan de Oro City. Trinidad Osteria, assistant professor of demography, UPPI, has a D.Sc. degree in population dynamics from Johns Hopkins (1971). PSR received her review of the Cebu project report on November 19, 1971. William F. Stinner, whose manuscript was received the same day, returned to the United States shortly after that.
