I am pleased to transmit the annual report of the Philippine Social Science Council for Calendar Year 1982. This report covers PSSC's major accomplishment, regular programs, special projects and general financial status.

I. MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENT

The Council's major accomplishment this year is the groundbreaking for the Philippine Social Science Center and the start of its construction thereafter.

On March 26, the signing of the agreement between the University of the Philippines and Matsuda, Hirata and Sakamoto Architects, Planners and Engineers, Inc. regarding consultant services for the establishment of the PSSCenter took place at the office of U.P. President Edgardo J. Angara.

Two months after, on May 31, the groundbreaking ceremony was held at the project site on Don Mariano Marcos Avenue, University of the Philippines, Diliman, beside the Asian Institute of Tourism.

The list of distinguished guests for the early morning groundbreaking ceremony was headed by His Excellency Prime Minister Cesar E.A. Virata, who delivered a short speech. He was accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Joy Virata, who presided over the cutting of the ceremonial ribbon. His

Excellency Hideho Tanaka, Ambassador of Japan delivered an address. Mrs. Sumiho Tanaka, the Ambassador's wife, assisted Mrs. Virata in the cutting of the ceremonial ribbon. Other programme participants were Dr. Bonifacio P. Sibayan, PSSC Executive Board Chairman, who gave the opening remarks and Dr. Gemino Abad, Secretary of the U.P. Board of Regents, who gave the welcome address on behalf of U.P. President Edgardo J. Angara. Dr. Loretta Makasiar Sicat, PSSC Executive Director and PSSCenter Committee Chairperson acted as master of ceremonies.

The time capsule was lowered by Prime Minister

Virata, with the assistance of Ambassador Tanaka. The

capsule contained important documents such as the following: Joint press statement of President Ferdinand E.

Marcos and Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki formally mentioning
the PSSCenter; exchange of notes between the Philippines
and Japan; presidential letter of instruction to U.P.; memo
of agreement between U.P. and PSSC; contract between U.P.
and Matsuda, Hirata and Sakamoto; contract with Taisei
Corporation; May 31, 1982 issue of The Bulletin Today;
PSSC articles of incorporation and by-laws; list of people
who had been involved with the project; plans of the building; Filipino and Japanese coins; and a copy of the programme
of the groundbreaking ceremony.

The Center is still currently under construction. It will have three storeys and one partial basement. The principal facilities will comprise the PSSC head office, the Central Subscription Service office, offices of member and related organizations of the Council, reference library, training and education facilities, computer room, auditorium, cafeteria, and others.

In a matter of a few months, by April or May 1983, the Center will be completed and ready for occupancy. All of us are looking forward to the fulfillment of an eight-year quest for a home for the social sciences. It is with optimism, indeed, that we await the coming of the new year.

2. REGULAR PROGRAMS

2.1. PSSC Research Consortia Program. In June 1981 the Council formally launched the Research Consortia Program for the development of faculty and the formation of high quality and relevant research in the country. The program will be implemented in three stages over a three-year period through an initial grant from the International Development and Research Centre (IDRC) of Canada, the Ford Foundation, and the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS).

It is my pleasure to inform you that three consortia groups now exist involving a number of institutions in the PSSC Research Network in various areas of the Philippines. These consortia groups are: the Bicol Research Consortium (BREC), the Visayas Research Consortium (VRC) and the Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium (EMARC).

2.1.1. The Bicol Research Consortium.

Two research centers are participating in this consortium:
the Research and Service Center of Ateneo de Naga in Naga
City and the Research Bureau of Aquinas University in Legazpi
City. To assure effective tie-up between consortium projects
and development efforts in Bicol, participation is also
solicited from certain agencies engaged in development work

in the region. The agencies involved are the National Economic and Development Authority in Legazpi City, the Ministry of Education and Culture, the Commission on Population, the Ministry of Social Services and Development and the Ministry of Local Government. The BREC went operational on April 28, 1982 after a memorandum of agreement, creating the formal structure of BREC, was signed by the participating institutions. F2. Manuel Piñon, President of Aquinas University is Chairman of the BREC Governing Body. Local coordinator is Jeresha Meneses, Director of Aquinas University Research Bureau.

For its initial activity, the BREC Research Committee is conducting research on "The Cost of Borrowing of Some Selected Groups of Farmers in Camarines Sur and Albay."

The study will focus its investigation on actual costs of borrowing to try to find why, despite the availability of credit in the formal market, farmers still turn to the informal credit market for their financial needs. The study also aims to come up with data-based policy recommendations for effective implementation of credit programs. It is scheduled to be completed in April 1983.

2.1.2. The Visayas Research Consortium.

(VRC). Four social research centers of leading universities

in the Visayas comprise the Visayas Research Consortium. The centers are the Social Research Center of La Salle College in Bacolod City, the Office for Social Research of the University of San Carlos in Cebu City, the Social Science Research Unit of Central Philippine University in Iloilo City and the Silliman Research Center of Silliman University in Dumaguete City. The VRC was formally created on Movember 20, 1981. In January 1982 the VRC Research Committee met in Bacolod City to discuss and evaluate proposals for the first research project of the consortium. Identifying poverty as first among previously-identified priority areas of social science research, the committee assessed studies conducted on poverty. Policy input and providing leads for future studies were high in the list of the objectives for research.

The study entitled "The Faces of Poverty in the Visayas: A Cross-Sectoral Study" is undertaken to explore the regional dimensions of poverty and to evaluate the impact of development projects and technological change on cross-sectoral groups within the Visayan region. It aims to promote a comprehensive understanding of the incidence of poverty in the Visayas. Started in April 1982, the study is to be completed by the end of March 1983.

Heading the Visayas Research Consortium is Fr. Florante
S. Camacho, President of the University of San Carlos and

Chairman of the VRC Governing Body. VRC Coordinator is

Dr. Violeta Lopez-Gonzaga of La Salle College in Bacolod

City. The National Economic and Development Authority of

Central Visayas through the Office of the Regional Development Council of Regions VI and VII are also members of the

Visayas Research Consortium.

2.1.3. The Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium (EMARC). Formally launched on January 8, 1982, the Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium is composed of the Social Research Office of Ateneo de Davao in Davao City, the Research and Development Institute of Notre Dame University in Cotabato City, the Socioeconomic Research Center of Urios College in Butuan City and the Planning, Research and Project Development Office of the Noly Cross College of Digos. HCC of Digos was renamed CorJesu College of Digos recently. Apart from the Presidents of the four schools, membership in the EMARC Governing Body include the NEDA Regional Directors for regions X. XI and XII. After a series of meetings and discussions among EMARC Research Committee members and social scientists from Manila, the committee came up with a proposal for the first EMARC research project entitled "A Multi-purpose Survey of Fishing Villages in Eastern Mindanao." This project will focus on four research concerns, namely, baseline statistical

data, study of local organizations, people's attitudes, perceptions, needs and aspirations, and a study of the effectiveness of government assistance.

The Research Consortia Program of the PSSC has many features that are worth noting. One such feature is the faculty development plan which encourages the development of consortia staff along lines of social science research. This move is calculated to upgrade present levels of capabilities in social research in the regions.

The Visayas Research Consortium (VRC) faculty development program is envisioned to promote academic excellence in specific social science disciplines among faculty members. This specialization will be university-specific so that scholars, for instance, who wish to train for a particular field of concentration will go to a particular university in the consortium. According to this plan, each university will take steps to gather a group of scholars in their respective areas of concentration in order to conduct the training of researchers, teachers and scholars who will in turn serve the research needs of their particular localities. Aside from the short-term and long-term training of the staff, the consortia also encourage collaborative research and dissemination of research results. It is also significant

funds from the Ford Foundation, the member universities

promised to commit university resources to the establishment of these academic centers of excellence.

In a similar move, the Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium (EMARC) faculty development program addresses itself to the need for graduate and post-graduate training in the social sciences, specifically in research, among faculty members in Mindanao. EMARC thus seeks to introduce an innovative approach to professional development by instituting a two-pronged academic program in the social sciences in eastern Mindanao. This program provides graduate training for faculty members from the EMARC member institutions including those from other local institutions and development agencies and gives opportunities for post-graduate training for faculty members within the consortium. This program hopes to produce competent personnel who can conduct quality research in their respective institutions.

At present, the Bicol Research Consortium is still in the process of formulating faculty development plans for their staff in the region.

2.2. 1982 Research Training Program. As in the past summers, the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc.,

in collaboration with the Department of Sociology and Anthropology of the Ateneo de Manila University conducted its 1982 Research Training Program from April 14 to May 26. The courses offered were Social Statistics, Research Techniques and Research Strategies. The trainers were Dr. Ricardo G. Abad and Dr. Virginia A. Miralao of the Ateneo. The venue was at the Ateneo, Loyola Heights, Quezon City.

A special feature of the training program was the visit to the Philippine Institute of Development Studies (PIDS) and the National Census and Statistics Office (NCSO).

There were 22 participants from selected institutions throughout the country. Please refer to Appendix A for the list of participants and their institutional affiliations.

- 2.3. Discretionary Research Awards Program.

 (DRAP). There are 13 DRAP grantees this year. This brings the total to 233 grantees during the past years with 141 completed projects. Financial support comes from the Fund for Assistance to Private Education (FAPE). However, as of the middle of this year, the DRAP fund has been exhausted and a re-negotiation with FAPE is being done. Please refer to Appendix 8 for the list of 1982 grantees.
 - 2.4. Conference Awards. Five (5) associations,

namely the Psychological Association of the Philippines (1981 and 1982 Conferences), the Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao, Inc. (Anthropological Association of the Philippines), Philippine Geographical Society, Linguistic Society of the Philippines, and the Philippine Political Science Association were this year's recipients of the seminar awards program. Total financial assistance in the amount of \$35,206.90 was provided for the annual conference of these five associations.

- 2.5. Publications Subsidy Program. The National Science and Technology Authority (NSTA) recently released an additional #240,000.00 as part of its five-year (1979-82) subsidy of #1.2 million to the journals of the PSSC member organizations. Attempts are being made by the various organizations to have the journals published on time.
- 2.6. The Central Subscription Service. The CSS continues to market the publications of the Council's member associations and institutions. Its total gross income for the period of 10 months (January to September 1982) amounts to \$\mathbb{P}55,383.86\$. Accumulated net earnings as of September 30, 1982 is \$\mathbb{P}148,805.15\$.

This year, the CSS participated in publication exhibits of the 1) Annual Convention of the *Linguistic*

Society of the Philippines held on Nay 15 at the Philippine
Normal College, Manila; 2) National Academy of Science and
Technology Week held on July 12-15 at the Philippine International Convention Center, Manila; 3) Annual Convention of
the Psychological Association of the Philippines held on
August 16-18 at the Philamlife Auditorium, Manila and Ateneo
de Davao University Seminar-Workshop on "Bilingualism and
Inter-disciplinarity in the Social Sciences" held on October
17-23 in Davao City.

Apart from the foregoing the CSS also sent some of its publications for exhibit at the *Mid-Atlantic Region - Association for Asian Studies*, *Inc.* Annual Meeting held on October 23 to 25 at the University of Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania, U. S. A.

3. SPECIAL PROJECTS

3.1. The PSSC-IDRC Warkshop. The International Development Research Centre in collaboration with the PSSC organized the National Workshop on Finance and Administration for Projects Assisted in the Philippines by the IDRC on February 11-12. The venue was at the Asian Institute of Management.

The aim of the national workshop was to discuss the finance and administrative problems encountered by IDRC-

assisted projects in the Philippines. Thus, common problems were raised and workable solutions which could ensure smoother operation of the various projects were discussed.

Participants came from 15 IDRC-assisted institutions. Two persons, the project coordinator and the finance officer, represented each institution. A brief paper was presented by each institution regarding the finance and administration problems encountered on IDRC-assisted projects. The institutions represented were the following: Philippine Council for Agriculture and Resources Research, Institute for Small-Scale Industries, De La Salle University, Educational Development Projects Implementing Task Force, National Housing Authority, Institute of Community and Family Health, Institute of Labor and Manpower Studies, Asian Institute of Tourism, National Science Development Board (renamed National Science and Technology Authority or NSTA), University of the Philippines at Los Baños, Laguna, Isabela State University, National Food Authority, Technical Board of Agricultural Credit, Visayas State College of Agriculture, and the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc.

The IDRC was represented by Jingjai Hanchanlash,
Regional Director, Asian Regional Office, E.D. Zdyb, Associate
Director In Charge of Policy of the Comptroller and Treasurer's

Office, IDRC Canada and Wilfredo A. Reyes, Regional Controller, Asian Regional Office.

Resource persons from selected government ministries and agencies (National Economic and Development Authority, Ministry of the Budget, Bureau of Customs, and the Central Bank of the Philippines) were invited to participate.

3.2. Meeting of PSSC associate members. On July 12, the associate members of the PSSC held a special meeting at Kowloon, Makati.

The meeting was called for two reasons: 1) To involve the associate members in the planning of the PSSC annual meeting and convention in December, and 2) To ask the associate members for their comments, suggestions and ideas on how to make PSSC more responsive to the role it should play in the development of the social sciences.

To attain greater participation in PSSC activities, the members decided to meet regularly twice a year, i.e., every May and October and to sit (two or three at a time) as observers in the monthly meetings of the Executive Board.

Thus on October 23, a joint conference of PSSC regular and associate members was hosted by the Language

Study Center and the Research Center of the Philippine Normal College, at the Language Study Center Auditorium, PNC, Taft Avenue, Manila. The associate members briefly reported on their activities for the current year. Aside from this, papers on the general topic "Perspectives in Contemporary Social Science Research" were presented and discussed. The social science disciplines were divided into three groups. A paper was read by Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon, for geography, history, political science and public administration; Dr. Mahar K. Mangahas, for economics, demography, social work and statistics; and Dr. Cesar Mercado for linguistics, anthropology, mass communication, psychology and sociology. Their respective discussants were Dr. Telesforo W. Luna, Dr. Sylvia Guerrero and Dr. Emy M. Pascasio.

3.3. Symposium on Social Science and Development. As the participation of the social sciences in the observance of National Science and Technology Week, the PSSC sponsored a symposium on Social Science and Development on July 13 at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC). Logistical support was provided by the National Science and Technology Authority.

Bro. Andrew B. Gonzalez, F.S.C. and Dr. Armand
V. Fabella were the symposium speakers. Bro. Andrew talked

on "Filipinization of the Social Sciences: A Red Herring?", while Dr. Fabella talked on "Technology Transfer and Development."

3.4. The ADC Asian and MUCIA/Nepal Fellow-ship Programs. For almost 3 1/2 years now, the PSSC Secretariat has been administering the Agricultural Development Council (ADC) Asian Fellowship in the Philippines. There are 21 Asian ADC fellows this year. Most of them are taking up graduate studies at the U.P. at Los Baños, U.P. Diliman, Quezon City and at the Ateneo de Manila University, Loyola Heights, Q. C.

The PSSC has also been administering the Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities,
Inc. (MUCIA) Fellowship Project in the Philippines for the
past 2 1/2 years. There are eight (8) fellows this year.

Administrative funds were provided by ADC and MUCIA to PSSC for their fellowship programs.

3.5. The Ethnicity and Fertility Project.

This project, began in May 1980, is expected to be completed by the end of this year. The draft of the research has been submitted by the senior investigators of the Philippine team, Ms. Ma. Cecilia Conaco of the U.P. Department

of Psychology and Ms. Pilar Ramos Jimenez of De La Salle
University to the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies (ISEAS)
in Singapore which has been collaborating with the PSSC
Research Network on the project.

3.6. PSSC recognition for Dr. Gerardo P. Sicat; awards for the best research center, the best journal and the best research. During its annual convention on December 4, 1982, the PSSC will honor Dr. Gerardo P. Sicat, well-known economist, for his invaluable services to the social science community of the Philippines.

The PSSC through its various committees will also give awards to the best journal, the best research project, and the best research center. This is the second year that the PSSC will give these awards; the first was in December 1980.

4. FINANCES

The Council continues to receive generous support from the following funding agencies: The National Science Development Board (NSDB), now the National Science and Technology Authority (NSTA), the Fund for Assistance to

Private Education (FAPE), the Ford Foundation (FF), the
International Development Research Centre (IDRC), the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS), and the
National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA). The
PSSC is grateful for the continued support of these agencies.

Attached are the Financial Statements and Supplementary Schedules for the nine-month period ended September 30, 1982 and Auditor's Report.

We hope to generate substantive support to carry out our programs and projects especially when the Center is finally operational.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
SEPTEMBER 30, 1982

MOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

The Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. (PSSC) is a National Science Development Board certified non-stock, non-profit, scientific-cultural-educati-nal organization and is exempt from income tax pursuant to Section 27 (3) of the Tax Code and Section 24 of Republic Act No. 2067 as amended by Republic Act No. 3589, provided no part of the income will inure to the benefit of any individual or stockholder.

Its operations are funded by grants and donations from the Ford Foundation, National Science Development Board, National Economic Development Authority, International Development Research Centre, Fund for Assistance to Private Education and various civic, educational, scientific, cultural and business organizations.

NOTE 2 - GENERAL PROGRAM SECRETARIAT

The Secretariat acts as the working arm of the Council. Operating funds are provided by earnings derived from income of the endowment fund.

NOTE 3 - CENTRAL SUBSCRIPTION SERVICE

The Central Subscription Service (CSS) is a program of the Council. It was established to assist the council member associations in the publication of their journals and other social science books and monographs through centralized management and distribution.

NOTE 4 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting - The accounts of the organization are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting to insure the obsevance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the organization. Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes, into funds established according to their nature and purpose, thus maintaining separate accounts for each fund.

The Council follows the accrual basis of accounting for its transactions.

Inventories - Inventories are valued at cost as determined by first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is computed on a straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets.

NOTE 5 - ENDOWMENT FUND

This account represents a grant made by the Ford Foundation of US \$200,000.00 to the Council and matched on a one to one basis by the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) by contributing \$1,500,000.00 to the fund.

The amount donated by the Ford Foundation was converted at the banks buying rate of $$\psi 7.33$$ to US \$1.00 or \$1,466,003.00

The grant provides among other things, that only the earnings of the principal fund will be utilized for the operation of the Secretariat. The Council availed of the Services of Private Development Corporation of the Philippines and Ayala Investment and Development Corporation to act as Investment Managers of the fund.

NOTE C - PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and Equipment consist of the following:

Acquisition and improvements are charged to property accounts while expenditures for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

NOTE 7 - ADMINISTRATIVE FEES

These represent fixed fees allocated by the Agricultural Development Council and Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities, Inc. to the Secretariat.

NOTE 8 - PSSC BUILDING COMPLEX

On July 16, 1981, a grant was extended by the Government of Japan to the Philippine Government under the Exchange of notes signed by both governments, establishing the PSSCenter.

On December 14, 1981, a memorandum of agreement was made between the University of the Philippines System and the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. whereby the university authorized PSSC to construct within the university's campus its building complex in an area consisting of 8,018.50 square meters under such terms and conditions mutually agreed by both parties.
