OVERVIEW

The year 1992 will go down as a memorable year of the PSSC for several reasons. To begin with, it is the year prior to the Silver Jubilee of the Council, and much of the work of the Executive Board and of its various committees concerned themselves with preparatory activities towards the Jubilee celebration. A Calendar of Activities has been drawn for this year, indicating the contributions of its various member associations celebrating towards the Jubilee theme. "Environment and Sustainable Development: Challenges to Social Scientists". In the past month, the "Symposium on Environment and Sustainable Development: Social Science Perspectives" was held with overwhelming success, from the 29th to the 30th of January, and served as the launching activity of the PSSC for the Silver Jubilee.

The past year has also been significant because it marked a period when the Council actively expressed its concern to undertake activities responsive to the critical needs of various sectors of Filipinos. Among these were its sponsorship of dialogues between concerned parties in the areas of open-pit mining operations in Benguet, its direct participation in an archeological project in Surigao which aims to uncover and preserve a previouslyunmapped excavation site in the area, its initiative to propose to undertake for the government of Quezon City innovative techniques to enable it to rationalize a plan for the resettlement of its urban poor communities, its efforts to link-up with the FAPE in order to address the social science teaching needs of private school educators, as well as PSSC's response to the challenge of Pres. Fidel V. Ramos to join multi-sectoral efforts in the resettlement of evacuees from areas affected by Mt. Pinatubo.

Finally, the past year has been memorable, because it saw PSSC's former officers and prime movers either joining the elections (Dr. Florangel Rosario Braid), becoming part of the new Administration, or assuming positions of importance in their respective institutions. To mention a few appointments of national prominence: Education Armand V. Fabella was formerly Secretary Chairman of the PSSC; Dr. Dante Canlas, formerly sitting as Executive Board Member in the PSSC, is now Deputy Director-General of the NEDA; Quezon City Administrator Dr. Manuel Alba was member of the Governing Council; Mr. Sofronio Ursal, currently representing the Philippine Society for Public Administration in the Social Issues Committee, has been appointed Commissioner in the Commission on Audit, while Dr. Romulo Virola, a former member of the Governing Council has been retained as the Director of the National Statistical Coordinating Board.

On another level, we have witnessed the following appointments of social scientists to administrative positions in their respective institutions: Dr. Patricia Licuanan. former Chairperson of the Executive Board is currently the Vice-President for Academic Affairs of the Ateneo University, while Dr. Ledevina Cariño, formerly member of the Governing Council was appointed to the position of Vice-President for Public Affairs of the University of the Philippines. Another appointment at the U.P. of a PSSC member is that of Dr. Proserfina Tapales of the Philippine Society for Public Administration as Dean of the College of Public Administration. At the Polytechnic University of the Philippines, Dr. Hector B. Morada (Treasurer of the Council's Executive Board) currently serves as Director, Special Research Projects, while Dr. Wilfrido V. Villacorta acts as Senior-Vice President for External Operations at the De La Salle University.

The appointment of our esteemed colleagues to positions of national or institutional responsibility describes the various key roles which social scientists can play in determining the course and future of Philippine society and development. They are also important links between the PSSC, on the one hand, and the academe and the nation, on the other hand — both of which the Council is tasked to serve.

THE LEADERSHIP OF THE COUNCIL

The Governing Council

The Philippine Social Science Council is presently composed of 14 regular and 36 associate members. However, the Governing Council is composed only of the original member-associations, which are represented in the Council by their current presidents. For the past two years, Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon of the Philippine National Historical Society has served as the Council's Chairperson, while Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar of the Philippine Political Science Association acted as Vice- Chairperson.

The Governing Council is the policy-making body of the PSSC, and it initiates policies for implementation by the Executive Board and the Secretariat. For 1992, among the significant policy matters taken up by the Council were the following: a system of cash incentives and service awards for the PSSC Secretariat and the creation of a Governing Council Committee to study further the proposed amendments to the PSSC By-Laws by the Ad-Hoc Committee on the PSSC Structure.

The Executive Board

The regular members of the Philippine Social Science Council elected four (4) new representatives to the Executive Board in the 1992 Annual Meeting held on February 15, 1992. The new representatives and the disciplines they represent are as follows:

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST YEAR

The Executive Board serves as the management committee of the PSSC. Apart from implementing the policies and plans of the Governing Council, it supervises the day-to-day affairs of the PSSC as these are worked out by either the various standing committees, or by ad hoc committees created for some special purpose. Some of the important concerns which the Executive Board attended to in the past year were the following:

1. The formation of special committees for the Silver Jubilee

As early as May 15, 1992, the Ad-hoc Committee on the Silver Jubilee was constituted. Chaired by the President of the Executive Board, other Board Members were designated to chair subcommittees necessary to attend to the details of the Celebration. These committees and their respective chairpersons are: Ways and Means - Dr. Allen L. Tan; the Publicity Committee - Dr. Delia R. Barcelona; the Committee on Programs under Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar; the Recognition and Awards Subcommittee which has no chairperson yet; the Prof. Socials Subcommittee under Evelina Pangalangan; and the Finance Committee under Dr. Hector B. Morada.

2. Convening of the Task Force for the Third National Social Science Congress

In June, 1992, the Executive Board decided to convene a multi-organizational committee to start preparations for the forthcoming National Social Science Congress. As in past years, the Third National Social Science Congress (NSSC III) is to be co-sponsored by the PSSC, along with the National Research Council of the Philippines, and the Pi Gamma Mu National Social Science Honor Society. A fourth sponsor is included for the December Congress, namely the College of Social Sciences and Philosophy of the University of the Philippines. Plans are afoot to invite other schools to sponsor the affair also.

Inasmuch as much of the routine work towards the realization of the Congress rests with the PSSC, its President was designated Chair of the NSSC III Committee. The documentation of preparatory activities has also been assigned to the PSSC Secretariat. Other committee members include the following: Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar, (PSSC); Prof. Ofelia R. Angangco (Pi Gamma Mu); Dr. Josefina Cortes (NRCP); Prof. Belen T. Medina (Pi Gamma Mu); Dr. Eva Duka Ventura (NRCP and Pi Gamma Mu); and Dean Consuelo Paz (U.P. CSSP).

Sub-committees for planning NSSC III have been created, and representatives of PSSC memberassociations have been suggested for each one. A tentative program of activities has also been discussed by the Congress Committee, and invitations are to be sent out this month to potential resource persons. The Committee also hopes that the Congress will be keynoted by Pres. Fidel V. Ramos.

3. Ad-hoc Committee on the PSSC Structure

Towards the end of 1991, events which transpired led the Governing Council and the Executive Board to propose that the current organizational structure of the PSSC be reviewed. Essentially, the Council wished to study the possibility that the policy-making and management functions be embodied in only one structure. For this purpose, the Ad-hoc Committee was organized, composed of the original incorporators. In its report to the Governing Council in October, the Committee proposed no changes in the existing structures. Nevertheless, it was recommended by the Council and the Executive Board that the Committee's recommendations and the basis for its conclusions, be subjected to a further review. For this purpose, an Ad-hoc Committee on the Proposed Amendments to the PSSC By-Laws was created, whose task would be to examine all issues currently being raised vis-a-vis the existing By-Laws of the PSSC.

4. Project Planning Committee

To enable the PSSC to respond quickly to requests for project development, the Executive Board constituted a committee from among its members. The first proposal it drafted was "Towards the Sustainable Development of Cities: A Proposal to Develop a Comprehensive Social, Economic, Financial and Physical Information System for Quezon City." A workshop was initially planned in November to firm-up the operational plan, but Quezon City administrator Dr. M. Alba requested for a postponement. This business requires further follow-up. The second proposal which the committee planned to undertake was to set up an Information System for the Rehabilitation and Resettlement Activities of Communities Affected by Mount Pinatubo. However, the finalization of the proposal was deferred because the Presidential Management Staff asked the PSSC to sit-in on a consultative meeting with government agencies led Pinatubo Rehabilitation by the Assistance Development Commission (PARDEC) to discuss the situation in the area. The Executive Board will now have to discuss the implications of the information derived from that consultation. A third proposal in the offing is one which pertains to undertaking secondary analyses of the 1990 National Census Data. A proposal committee meets this month to work-out its plans.

5. Activities of the Standing Committees

Among the key activities of the standing committees this past year, the following stand-out:

- a) Social Issues Committee The holding of a public forum on open pit mining and the subsequent dialogue with officers of the Benguet Mining Corporation; co-sponsoring the National Consultative meeting on agrarian reform and coming up with a "Resolution for the Improvement of Agrarian Reform for the Next Five Years"; the initial consultation with the government on rehabilitation and resettlement of communities affected by Mt. Pinatubo; and planning for the just-concluded national symposium on "Environment and Sustainable Development: Social Science Perspectives."
- b) Research Committee Undertaking the Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey (CAFES) and administering the PSSC Research Awards Program (RAP), including the presentation of research findings in a colloquium series. The Research Committee also addressed the issue of upgrading the quality of PSSC-funded researches in its regular meetings.
- c) Institutional Development Committee The establishment of a PSSC Visiting Fellows Program which allowed three foreign scholars to affiliate with PSSC and carry out their research in the country; facilitating the search for three National Social Scientists; and drawing up a training program in the teaching of social science, particularly in the regions outside Manila.
- d) Membership Committee The study of and recommendations for incentives and sanctions to strengthen the participation of member organizations in PSSC.
- e) Finance and Personnel Committee Enriching the system of rewards and incentives for service to PSSC by the Secretariat, and

clarifying rental and related issues between PSSC and tenants.

The Publications Committee, the By-Laws Committee and the Nominations and Elections Committee performed their expected roles in consonance with their official functions. We thank all of them for making possible the smooth working of the Council.

CONCLUDING NOTES

In addition to committee work, the PSSC has also been engaged in several commissioned research and training activities, on which the Executive Director will render a report. The PSSC Visiting Fellows Program has also been operationalized, after a couple of years spent discussing its contours.

Another ongoing project which will have significant impact upon completion is the Social Science Encyclopedia Project. We hope that member associations involved with this endeavour will soon be able to complete their manuscripts.

Finally, the Central Subscription Service has attempted to reach out to more audiences, not only to be able to realize profits from its publications, but to be able to disseminate social science literature to broader sectors as well.

1992 was the prelude to our Silver Jubilce. This year, the PSSC plans to celebrate its Twenty-Fifth Anniversary as a social science network through a series of coordinated activities by its member associations, in celebration of "Environment and Sustainable Development: Challenges to Social Scientists".

We are pleased to note that our members have responded enthusiastically to our call for their participation in the Jubilee. Note the variety of conferences, meetings, symposia and even musical events contained in our Twenty-fifth Anniversary Calendar of Activities. Should any one else wish to include other activities of your organizations in this compendium program, the Secretariat will be pleased to get your schedules. The Programs and Socials Committee of the PSSC also have a year-long series of celebratory events being planned, and we hope to see all of you in these functions, including especially our colleagues from outside of the National Capital.

Before the end of our Jubilee, we hope to add another dimension to the vision and objectives of the Philippine Social Science Council - to develop a sustainable body of social science theory and practice for the future generations. Together, let us give spirit to Philippine social science through the cultivation of interdependent and mutually beneficial relationships — between the social sciences and other disciplines; between the academe, policy-makers, practitioners and the communities; and between men, women, and the biosphere.

Congratulations to all on the occasion of our Silver Jubilee!

THE YEAR IN RETROSPECT

ORGANIZATION

The work of the Philippine Social Science Council is carried out by the Governing Council, Executive Board, standing Committees, ad hoc committees, individual consultants and the Secretariat. Except for the Secretariat, these various bodies get organized and elect their officers during the first two months of the year.

The Council, Executive Board and Committees

The Council in 1992 was chaired by Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon (Philippine National Historical Society), with Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar (Philippine Political Science Association) as vice-chairperson.

The Executive Board was headed by Dr. Amaryllis T. Torres (psychology), with Mr. Generoso G. de Guzman (statistics) as vicepresident. Elected treasurer was Dr. Hector B. Morada (demography).

Four new members of the Executive Board started their 3-year terms in March 1992: Shirley C. Advincula (political science), Ma. Concepcion P. Alfiler (public administration), Delia R. Barcelona (communication), and Sabino G. Padilla, Jr. (anthropology).

Chairing the standing committees in 1992 were the following:

Generoso G. de Guzman (statistics) – Institutional Development Committee; Rosario M. Cortes (history) – Social Issues Committee; Emma E. Porio (sociology) – Research Committee; Shirley C. Advincula (political science) – Membership Committee; Hector B. Morada (demography) – Finance and Personnel Committee; Delia R. Barcelona (communication) – Publications Committee; Ma. Concepcion P. Alfiler (public administration) – By-Laws Committee; and Telesforo W. Luna (geography) – Nominations and Elections Committee.

Five ad hoc committees were active in 1992. The Awards Ad-Hoc Committee reviewed the nominations for the National Social Scientist awards in anthropology, history and public administration; the Silver Jubilee Ad-Hoc Committee made initial plans for the celebration of PSSC's 25th year; the Project Planning Committee drew up possible projects to help Government, specifically Quezon City; and the Ad-Hoc Committee on the PSSC Structure chaired by Dr. Mercedes B. Concepcion, began meeting in 1991 to recommend changes in the organization of PSSC.

The Ad-Hoc Committee on the PSSC Structure finished its deliberations and gave its report and recommendations to the Council on October 23, 1992. The Council and the Executive Board found a need for further discussion and consultations on the recommended changes and created another committee for this purpose. The group, called the Ad-Hoc Committee on the Proposed Amendments to the PSSC By-Laws started meeting in December 1992. (Appendix D of this report gives the complete list of all the committee members who served in 1992.)

The Secretariat

Three members of the PSSC Secretariat received permanent employment status in 1992 -Ma. Lina Gina V. Tuzon, Project Leader, and Research Assistants Mark M. Averilla and Richard de Dios.

In 1992, the Council and the Executive Board approved a recommendation from the Finance and Personnel Committee to grant cash incentives in addition to the existing service awards for the Secretariat, as follows:

During the 1992 PSSC Mid-Year Meeting; three members of the staff received service awards: Leo F. Malinay, Coordinator for Center Management and the Accounting Division, and Geronimo V. Benoza, Maintenance Assistant, both for five years of service, and Marcial M. Frias, Messenger/Driver, for 20 years of serving the PSSC.

Among the several benefits of the Secretariat from PSSC is a Staff Provident Fund (SPF). It serves as a source of loans to the staff and funding for income-generating activities which the staff may wish to pursue as a group. The fund comes from a monthly contribution of both the PSSC and the staff.

In 1992, attempts were made to improve the administration of the Staff Provident Fund by restructuring it and amending its by-laws. The goal is to make it run as a cooperative of the PSSC employees.

PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

RESEARCH

Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey (CAFES)

To ensure complete independence in the field operations between the Census of Agriculture and Fisheries (CAF) and the Evaluation Survey of the Census of Agriculture and Fisheries (CAFES), the National Statistics Office (NSO) commissioned the services of the Philippine Social Science Council and its Research Network to undertake the evaluation survey. The aim of the project is to evaluate the completeness and the quality of information collected in the 1991 CAF. Having conducted the Census Evaluation Survey (CES) for the NSO in 1991, the PSSC possesses the necessary experience and capability in handling such projects. The project involves field data gathering, matching, follow-up survey, data encoding, data processing, data analysis and report writing.

Designated overall project director is Prof. Ruben F. Trinidad, PSSC Executive Director. Dr. Ann Gironella of the UP Los Baños Institute of Mathematics, Statistics and Physics (IMSP) is the project technical consultant, with the Secretariat as the overall support center. Started in April 1992, the CAFES is now in its data analysis stage and is expected to be completed in June 1993.

Survey on Youth Organizations

PSSC also ran a small survey for the UNESCO on youth information and documentation sources in preparation for the setting up by UNESCO of an International Youth Clearing House and Information Service to be known as INFOYOUTH. The survey sought to find out from the respondent youth organizations the current status of their resources and facilities and their views on the possibilities of cooperation and collaboration within the global INFOYOUTH network to be set up.

IGBP-Philippine National Committee

The PSSC was invited to send a permanent representative to the National Committee of the International Geosphere Biosphere Program (IGBP), an interdisciplinary research organization focusing on global change. Along with other international research programs, it addresses critical questions related to global environmental change.

The IGBP-Philippine National Committee was organized by the Department of Science and Technology, and the National Research Council of the Philippines (NRCP) serves as its Secretariat.

The PSSC representative in the IGBP is Dr. Teodoro M. Santos (Philippine Geographical Society).

Research Awards Program

Now on its 20th year of operations, the PSSC Research Awards Program (RAP) has continued PSSC's commitment to develop a pool of social science experts. Through this program, research grants are provided to graduate students undertaking their thesis work.

Since the program's full swing operation in 1972, a total of 408 grantees have benefitted from the RAP including the 10 grantees this year. Of these, 252 were awarded grants in the MA/MS level; 140 in the Phd/EdD/DPA level; and the remaining 16 were awarded to already established social scientists needing assistance for their individual research projects. As in the previous years, a large majority (84 percent) of the grantees are enrolled in academic institutions located within the National Capital Region. Only about 10 percent are enrolled in universities outside Metro Manila and two (2) percent outside the country.

To help generate relevant and useful studies in the different fields of the social sciences, the nesearch findings of the grantees are disseminated in a colloquium series. Early this year, the Research Committee held its second colloquium with the the theme "Crisis' and Creativity: Research Highlights from the PSSC Thesis Grants". Six previous grantees, namely, Dr. Lourdes Abadingo, Dr. Anselmo Lupdag, Dr. Vicente Mariano, Prof. Ma. Myrtle Onod, Dr. Ma. Lourdes Rebullida, and Dr. Evelina Vicencio, presented their research such intenies as works. Discussed were administration of elections, leadership, antinatalist social movements, church and policies. development, and creative teaching." The first colloquium was held in 1991 during which four studies were presented from the completed projects in 1988 and 1989.

Simultaneous with information campaigns about the program, the Research Committee came up with a list of revised research guidelines for prospective grantees and a set of suggestions for PSSC to address the issues of upgrading the quality of PSSC-funded researches. There is an urgent need for PS\$C to work on fund sources to accommodate a possible increase in the number of RAP applications. Appendix A presents data on the 1992 RAP grants.

INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND PROFESSIONALIZATION

PSSC Visiting Fellows Program

The PSSÇ: Visiting Fellows Program (VFP) was established in 1992 to answer the numerous queries for affiliation from various scholars. It aims

to assist and facilitate studies in Philippine society and culture by both foreign and local researchers.

The Institutional Development Committee prepared the Visiting Fellows Program guidelines. The program's implementing guidelines are currently being revised and will soon be submitted for approval by the Board and Council.

The Council welcomes Visiting Fellows who will conduct research in any of the following social science disciplines: anthropology, communication, demography, economics, geography, history, linguistics, political science, psychology, public administration, statistics, sociology, and social work.

The status of Visiting Fellow may be granted to experienced scholars, researchers, or full-time social science graduate students upon approval of their application for a period of one (1) year and may be extended up to a maximum of two (2) years. While the program does not provide any form of financial assistance, it extends other forms of assistance/service to successful applicants such as the provision of office space.

By the end of 1992, the PSSC had granted affiliation to three scholars under its Visiting Fellows Program. They were Dr. T.K. Majumdar, a professor from the Indian Institute for Studies in Industrial Development, Mr. Kiyokazu Koshida, graduate student of Hokkaido National University, and Mr. Mir Mohammad Rowsonazzaman, research officer of the Bangladesh Social Science Research Council. Dr. T.K. Majumdar did a comparative study of squatter communities in Manila and New Delhi, Mr. Koshida did research the Aetas of Zambales, and Mr. on Rowsonazzaman observed and studied the research granting and documentation programs of the PSSC.

National Social Scientist Awards

The PSSC National Social Scientist Awards are given to Filipino social scientists in recognition of

their outstanding achievements and contributions to the growth of their respective disciplines and the promotion of social sciences in general.

On February 15, 1992 PSSC conferred the awards to three outstanding scholars during its annual meeting. The three scholars are Dr. E. Arsenio Manuel for anthropology, Dr. Marcelino A. Foronda, Jr. for history, and Dr. Raul P. de Guzman for public administration.

Dr. E. Arsenio Manuel is noted for his research on Philippine epics and other forms of folklore, and for an extensive Filipiniana collection which now forms a major part of the University of the Philippines Library. He spent most of his professional life in the University of the Philippines.

Dr. Marcelino A. Foronda, Jr. as a historian is best known for his scholarly research and publications. His teaching career was spent at the De La Salle University.

Dr. Raul P. de Guzman is recognized for his outstanding works in the study and practice of public administration.

Conference Grants

To help strengthen professional social science associations, PSSC has annual grants to its 14 regular members to help with their conferences. Each member receives P5,000 under the Conference Grant program.

SOCIAL ISSUES

Environment and Sustainable Development

Open-Pit Mining. The issue of open pit mining engaged the Social Issues Committee (SICOM) in 1992, starting with an attempt to get an internal consensus or agreement in the Council and the Board in February on what further action SICOM should take concerning the issue. Should SICOM take a stand against open pit mining and advocate such a stand, or should SICOM merely bring in various views for ventilation and information?

Acknowledging that consensus-building on many social issues is not tenable, the SICOM decided to sponsor a public forum on open pit mining with a "balanced panel" of resource persons. On April 30, 1992, the forum on "The Interplay between Culture, Environment and State Policy: Open Pit Mining" was held in PSSC. Acting as resource persons were Engineer Catalino Corpuz, head of the Mining Communities Development Center and Dr. Teodoro M. Santos, member of the PSSC Executive Board. representing the discipline of geography. Two engineers from the Atlas Mining Corporation and the DENR-Bureau of Mines also participated. Their presentation informed the audience about the positive and negative aspects of open pit mining.

The Benguet Mining Corporation (BMC) had been invited to the public forum but failed to send a representative. Wishing to have more information about their open pit mining activities, SICOM maintained contact with the BMC, and on August 7, 1993 SICOM members were invited to the BMC headquarters for a friendly dialogue with the highest ranking officials of the Corporation, led by President and Chief Executive Officer Dennis R. Belmonte. The dialogue informed BMC about PSSC's concern regarding the difficulties of the tribal folk in the Cordilleras whose livelihood and existence has been threatened by the activity of big corporations. However, the social scientists, wanting to hear all sides of the problem, were ready to hear the side of the BMC. The BMC, in turn, informed them about the efforts which the Corporation has taken to properly compensate and relocate the miners' families as well as measures taken to protect the environment in their open pit activities. The social scientists were also assured of being welcomed to the mining sites if they wished to pursue their plans of a field trip to Benguet.

The wider concern for environment and sustainable development led the SICOM to plan, in conjunction with the preparations for a similar regional conference in Asia and the Pacific, a national symposium on the topic in early 1993. The plans included paper readers from Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao and the participation of government, NGOs and social scientists. The general aim of the gathering is to discuss social science perspectives of environment and sustainable development and to collate these into a country paper for a regional conference of the Associations of Asian Social Science Research Councils.

Mt. Pinatubo Communities

The plight of the victims of the Mt. Pinatubo eruption and subsequent lahar flows was another concern which occupied the SICOM meetings. The Committee requested the major dailies to publish an appeal to President Fidel V. Ramos in October 1992 for Government to make a quick decision on the resettlement sites and to provide jobs to the Pinatubo victims. The appeal received a reply from the President, informing the SICOM on the Government's program in lahar-damaged areas. He further invited the group to dialogue with the Kabisig People's Movement Cooperation Center and to get in touch with Secretary Renato de Villa's office for possible tie-up in the planning and implementation of Mt. Pinatubo rehabilitation program.

The Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao (Anthropological Association) has its own tie-up with the Sentro Para sa Ganap na Pamayanan, an NGO which works with the Aetas in the Pinatubo area.

Agrarian Reform

Before national elections were held in June, there were various attempts by offices and agencies to help evaluate the agrarian reform program in preparation for the changes that the elections would make in government.

In January 23-24, 1992 the National Statistical Coordination Board invited the PSSC to participate in a workshop to develop a mechanism for monitoring and evaluating agrarian reform and rural development. The workshop was held at Hotel Nikko Manila Garden under the sponsorship of the Center on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific. PSSC was represented by Prof. Carmen Jimenez of the Psychological Association of the Philippines and a member of the University of the Philippines - Netherlands Project on Agrarian Reform and Rural Development.

On April 23, 1992 the PSSC Auditorium was the venue for a national consultative meeting on agrarian reform which was co-sponsored by the Institute of Agrarian Studies (IAst), U.P. Los Baños, the National Research Council of the Philippines (NRCP), and PSSC. The consultative meeting resulted in a "Resolution for the Improvement of Agrarian Reform for the Next Five Years." This was sent to then President Aquino's Transition Committee and other agencies. Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar, chairperson of the SICOM's Task Force on Agrarian Reform, coordinated the activity for PSSC.

Protection of Cultural Treasures

The historical and archaeological research in Panhutongan, Placer, Surigao which began in the last quarter of 1991 continued throughout CY 1992. Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon and Dr. Eusebio Dizon of the National Museum headed the project. Funding was provided by The Toyota Foundation, the Daiwa Bank Foundation for Asia and Oceania, the Oriental Ceramics Society, Caltex Philippines and several friends of PSSC who share in the goal of conserving our national treasures. The Presidential Committee on Culture and the Arts donated equipment for the archaeological excavation of the schoolgrounds where, in 1990, dug-out log coffins and clay and ceramic pottery were discovered. The Surigaonon Heritage Foundation, Inc., the National Museum and the PSSC are working together on the project.

From April to June 1992, the scientific team was in Panhutongan for the summer field season. Twenty-eight squares were excavated over an area of 359 square meters. Unearthed were portions of a stone structure, dug-out wooden coffins, individual human skeletons, posts, earthenware, stoneware, porcelain sherds, glass beads, metal implements and fragments, shells and botanical remains such as seeds, leaves and roots.

The archaeological team also surveyed the limestone formation in Barangay Amoslog, Placer, Surigao del Norte. One cave provided cultural materials of archaeological significance and the scientific team theorized that it was probably utilized during the Neolithic and the Age of Contact periods.

Conducted during the summer field season was a field school participated in by students from Mindanao State University, University of the Philippines, the Surigao National School of Arts and Trade and the Surigaonon Heritage Foundation. The field school participants rendered actual service to the project by working in every phase of the excavation.

A preliminary analysis of the findings and a slide show on the excavation were presented to social scientists during the PSSC midyear meeting on 15 August 1992. A pictorial exhibit was also mounted giving other information. Funding to continue the project in 1993 has been committed by The Toyota Foundation. Planned for excavation is the un-touched area immediately beneath the present school building in the Panhutongan school grounds. The building, termite-infested and in need of repair, will be torn down and a new building will be constructed on a site that has been given clearance by the archaeological team which did transect excavation of the grounds. Planned also is a more systematic study of the Amoslog cave which yielded rich archaeological remains during the brief survey in 1992.

INFORMATION MANAGEMENT AND DISSEMINATION

PSSC Social Science Information

The PSSC Social Science Information, a quarterly publication of the PSSC, came out with three issues as scheduled. The last quarter issue is on the preparation stage as of this writing.

Consistent with the PSSC's thrust towards the dissemination of research outputs, the first quarter issue featured the research highlights of the papers presented during the Research Award Program (RAP) colloquium held in February 1992. The six RAP grantees who contributed to the newsletter were Lourdes E. Abadingo (Philippine elections), Anselmo D. Lupdag (leadership), Vicente D. Mariano (antinatalist policies, religious beliefs and family planning), Ma. Lourdes G. Rebullida (church development), Evelina Vicencio (creative teaching), and Marian Myrtle G. Onod (Lakas Angkan in North Cotabato).

The second and third quarter issues focused on Filipino Nationalism for its theme in celebration of the centennial anniversary of the Katipunan. Sponsored by the Philippine Historical Association, the writers for the two issues were Milagros C. Guerrero, Bonifacio S. Salamanca, Judith B. Baroquillo, Noel Teodoro, Cesar P.

The PSSC Annual Report, CY 1992

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Pobre, Romeo V. Cruz, Pablo S. Trillana III, and Rosario M. Cortes. Their papers presented historical analyses of events as well as significant lessons that could be drawn from the historical experience during the 1898 revolution.

Sponsored by Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao (Anthropological Association of the Philippines), the last quarter issue is expected to come off the press in February 1993.

The Philippine National Historical Society (PNHS) came out with the first issue of a new publication series involving the PNHS and the Heritage Publishing House (HPH) of papers presented in conferences organized and convened by PNHS in different parts of the Philippines. This publication series is separate from *The Journal of History*, which shall henceforth serve as the venue for the serialized publication of the manuscripts and documents belonging to the H. Otley Beyer Collection owned by the family of Mario and Odette Alcantara.

The new publication series shall be known as the PNHS-HPC Conference Proceedings Series. The first issue, In Search of Historical Truth, carries 12 selected papers of the 9th National Conference on Local and National History held in Butuan City in November 1988. Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon, PNHS President, is Editor of the issue.

Social Science Encyclopedia Project

The plan to produce an encyclopedia for each of the 13 social science disciplines in PSSC and publish them in four volumes is proceeding slowly. The contributors, busy with their teaching, research and consultancy work, have not been able to meet the deadline that was set for the finished manuscripts. By the end of CY 1992, only the completed manuscript for Statistics had been submitted. Three other disciplines are almost finished and are putting the final touches to their manuscripts. Each discipline manuscript will carry the discipline's history and state of the art in the Philippines, biographies of outstanding discipline practitioners, and articles or write-ups on the discipline's terms and concepts as used in Philippine research and writing.

Dr. Domingo C. Salita, President Emeritus of the Philippine Geographical Society, is Editor-in-Chief and Chairman of the Council Editorial Board for the project.

Central Subscription Service (CSS)

The CSS continued to operate as a semi-autonomous unit of the PSSC and experience

improved sales (see PSSC Financial Report for 1992) of consigned books and monographs and of journals in the social sciences.

In its effort to strengthen its distributing services, the CSS participated in the meetings or conventions of the member associations, such as the Psychological Association of the Philippines on August 21, 1992 and the joint Philippine National Historical Society-Philippine Political Science Association on September 30, 1992 in Manila. On November 18-21, 1992 it participated in the 3rd Book Fair sponsored by the University of St. La Salle in Bacolod City. Book buyers came from Region 6.

Frank X. Lynch Library

There has been a significant increase in the library collection this year. Donations from both local and foreign institutions keep coming. The library receives an average of 30-40 titles of books and monographs per quarter. From 3,378 titles in 1991, the total collection to date rose to 3,613, excluding some 30 new, unrecorded titles.

Only five theses/dissertations were added to last year's collection of 357 titles.

The library did not subscribe to additional publications this year.

Two minor inventories were conducted in March and August 1992 to assess losses in collection and to ensure that the library materials are still in their proper places.

Computerization of the library is still ongoing.

Desk Top Publishing Unit

The PSSC Desktop Publishing Unit upgraded the capability of its equipment in September 1992. The memory of its two computer units was increased by four megabytes. New softwares were installed including MS Windows 3.1, Aldus Pagemaker 4.0, MS Word, and Corel Draw 2.0. Computer manuals were also purchased. The desktop staff now operates under a "windows" environment which enables them to be more efficient and innovative in their work.

Started in 1991 through a US\$10,000 grant by UNESCO, the Unit has continued servicing the desktop publishing needs of the Council. It also accepts from its clients job orders such as the preparation of camera-ready manuscripts for journals, books and other publications as well as printing of programs, brochures, and certificates.

For this year, some of the manuscripts formatted by the Unit camera ready were those of the Philippine Economic Journal, the Philippine Political Science Journal, Dr. Vivencio B. Ardales' books on Logic Made Easy and Basic Concepts and Methods in Research, Dr. Natalia M. Morales' work on Politics, Science and Democracy and Dr. Cesar Mercado's Conducting and Managing M. Communication Survey Research; The Asian Experience. Also formatted and published were the Proceedings of the Ninth Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC) Conference and the Joint UNESCO-AASSREC Regional Symposium on Human Resource Development held in the PSSC in 1991.

NETWORKING AND LINKAGES

Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC)

The PSSC activities in connection with AASSREC in 1992 were related to preparations for the 10th Biennial Conference of AASSREC in September 1993, Tokyo, Japan.

The PSSC Executive Director, Ruben F. Trinidad, attended the AASSREC Executive Council Meeting in Tokyo on March 22-27, 1992 to plan for the 10th Conference. Amended and approved for presentation was the draft of the AASSREC By-Laws which Prof. Trinidad had prepared.

Also approved as activities for the 10th Conference were a Regional Symposium on "Environment and Sustainable Development: Social Science Perspectives", and a Panel Discussion on "Economic Reforms and Democratization in the Asia-Pacific Region."

To help prepare the Philippine paper on Environment, the PSSC drew up plans for a national symposium which shall be held in January 1993. The proceedings of the symposium shall be incorporated in the country paper.

Likewise, PSSC requested a young economist, Dr. Gilbert Llanto, to prepare the country paper for the panel discussion on economic reforms.

International Federation of Social Science' Organizations (IFSSO)

The PSSC is a member of the International Federation of Social Science Organizations (IFSSO), an international forum for the cooperation and communication among Councils, Academies and other Organizations responsible for the development, training and funding of research in their respective countries. For CY 1992 and 1993, PSSC has the honor of serving on the IFSSO Executive Board.

IFSSO-sponsored activities have benefited the PSSC Secretariat in the past, through a research workshop which one of the coordinators attended in London in June 1987 and a visit with the Korean Social Science Council in May 1990 by the then PSSC Center Manager.

Asia-Pacific Information Network on Social Science (APINESS)

As a member of APINESS, PSSC sent Ms. Alana G. Ramos, Coordinator for the Research and Training Division, to the Third APINESS Regional Advisory Group meeting on August 25-29, 1992 at New Delhi, India. Fifteen network members attended the meeting, which discussed problems encountered with respect to the information network and possible activities for the coming year.

International Social Science Council (ISSC)

The ISSC is a Paris-based international non-governmental organization which acts as a forum for international social science cooperation and the understanding of global projects in the social sciences.

For its 40th anniversary, the ISSC invited the PSSC as an observer at its General Assembly in Paris on December 3-5, 1992. The invitation was made in connection with ISSC's desire to enroll national and regional social science councils as direct members, to enhance its professional capacity and ability to carry out its fundamental mission as stated above.

Dr. Eva Duka Ventura (Philippine Political Science Association) represented PSSC as observer during the December 1992 General Assembly of the ISSC in Paris.

PLANS AND PROSPECTS

Plans for research, training and information systems are part of the prospects for PSSC in 1993 and the succeeding years, to strengthen the impact of the social sciences on local and regional development.

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Multidisciplinal Analyses of Census Data Sets

The National Statistics Office (NSO) has the data sets from the previous censuses that have been taken in the Philippines. The PSSC has made preliminary contacts with NSO for the data sets to be made available for analyses on various topics, such as the status of children or the status of women over the years. Also possible under this proposal are re-analyses of the data by sectoral interest and re-packaging of the data for popular dissemination.

Proposal for Regional Teaching Workshops

Upon the initiative of the Institutional Development Committee, a proposal is being drawn up for a training program in the teaching of social science, particularly in the regions outside Manila. This is in answer to the long-felt need of continuously developing and upgrading the content and quality of social science training in the country.

The training program aims to raise the expertise and competence of faculty members in handling their courses. The activities will involve the preparation of course modules by the PSSC member associations, the conduct of training seminars for the trainors of the Council's networks of regional universities and research centers, and the implementation of the training programs in three regional sites, to be done jointly by the regional networks and regular associations.

The proposal will be submitted to the Fund for Assistance to Private Education (FAPE).

Training Program in Social Research

Scheduled for implementation is the conduct of a training program in social research, specifically on evaluation research. Tasked to undertake the program is the Institutional Development Committee.

The Evaluation Research Training Program, tentatively set for April 1993, is designed to help participants gain better understanding of the basic concepts and theories of evaluation research, research designs, and the methods for gathering, processing, and analyzing evaluation research data. The program hopes to develop the participants' skill in designing and implementing evaluation programs for their own projects. The program is open to government agencies, NGOs, and the faculty and researchers of universities and research centers.

Proposal to Develop a Comprehensive Social, Economic, Financial and Physical Information System for Quezon City

An initial meeting with Dr. Manuel Alba, Quezon City Administrator, in August 1992 alerted the PSSC to the wisdom of setting up a comprehensive social, economic, financial and physical information system for the Quezon City government.

Designed to meet the information needs of the City's planners and policymakers, the project will involve a state-of-the-art based data monitoring and evaluation system with the perspective of creating "sustainable cities."

A concept paper of the project has been sent to the Office of the City Administrator for reactions. If approved, a pre-project workshop shall be conducted to identify substantive and operational concerns as well as a comprehensive plan of action.

Organizing for the Silver Jubilee Celebration

The PSSC prepared to mark its 25th year of existence in 1993 by organizing into committees and planning a year-round list of activities around the general theme of "Environment, Sustainable Development and the Social Sciences."

The major committees and their chairpersons are the Ways and Means Committee under Dr. Allen L. Tan; the Publicity Committee under Dr. Delia R. Barcelona; the Committee on Programs under Prof. Carmencita T. Aguilar; the Recognition and Awards Subcommittee; the Socials Sub-Committee under Prof. Evelina Pangalangan, the

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National Social Science Congress III Committee under Dr. Amaryllis T. Torres, and the Finance Committee under Dr. Hector B. Morada.

An omnibus calendar of activities containing the planned activities as well as the monthly activities of the 14 regular member associations and the 36 associate members for CY 1993 was drawn up for distribution. Meetings, public fora, associational conventions, and socials will keep PSSC and the various social scientists in the country busy as they commemorate the beginnings of the Council and what it has accomplished for the past 25 years.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT

HECTOR B. MORADA, Ph.D.

The national economic difficulties that caused many business failures in the country in 1992 did not spare the operations of the Philippine Social Science Council. The sustained growth of the finances of the Council has tapered down. However, through prudent financial management. the Council was able to maintain at least a minimal gain in the current year. The General Fund coasted at a 0.5 percent increase from P4.992 in 1991 to P5.014 million in 1992. million Expenditures on the other hand declined by 3.2 percent from P4.006 million in 1991 to P3.878 million in 1992. Receipts from the Special Funds also declined from P2.536 million in 1991 to P2.159 million in 1992, or 14.9 percent. Expenditure from the same fund rose significantly by 21 percent from P1.924 million in 1991 to P2.329 million in 1992.

This was due mainly to the large disbursements in 1992 for expenses incurred in 1991. On the whole, therefore, total receipts fell short by 4.72 percent from P7.528 million in 1991 to P7.173 million in 1992. Aggregate expenditures also declined from P6.263 million in 1991 to P6.206 million in 1992, or only 0.9 percent.

At the end of 1992, total assets stood at P15.821 million compared to P13.699 million in 1991 or an increase of 15.5 percent. The total claims (liabilities) against the total assets was P3.699 million, hence a gross liquidity of 4.247. Since the total assets of P9.127 million consisted of restricted funds (endowment, sinking, and project funds), the net liquidity stood at only 1.78. This means that for every peso debt of the PSSCouncil, it has more or less two pesos to pay off its immediate obligations.

Operations of the General Fund

Of the total receipts of P5.014 million, the operations of the Center continued to be the largest generator of funds at 63.4 percent, followed by investment incomes which contributed about 30.6 percent. The remainder (6.0 percent) came from miscellaneous sources. In the last several years, the Center income has grown to be the greatest source of sustenance for the PSSC.

On the other hand, of the total expenditure of P3.878 million, operational costs (personnel, utilities, maintenance) accounted for 71.4 percent while research and development expenses claimed only 28.6 percent.

Operations of the Special Fund

External donations to projects amounting to P2.159 million in 1992 was short by only 14.9 percent from the 1991 level. The big contributors in 1992 were the National Statistics Office (P1.775 million), The Toyota Foundation (P0.289 million), and Ford Foundation (P0.071 million).

The total expenditures of P2.329 million in 1992 were made in support of the Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey (P1.702 million), Surigao Project (P0.433 million), AASSREC Biennial Conference (P0.071 million), Desktop Publishing Project (P0.049 million) and the rest of the funds were allotted to three minor projects.

Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balances

The total assets of the Council amounting to P15.821 million are mainly in the form of investments (notes, bonds, time deposits, and stocks) amounting to P11.841 million; cash on hand and in banks, P1.953 million; inventories and other assets, P1.038 million; receivables, P0.579 million; and property and equipment (excluding PSSCenter), P0.410 million. Our investments are being managed by the Bank of the Philippine Islands, Private Development Corporation of the Philippines, and Fund for Assistance to Private Education. The total claims against the assets were placed at P3.699 million in 1992. These consist mainly of accounts payables and accrued expenses, P1.386 million; subscribers and tenants deposits, P0.495 million; unearned administrative income and rental, P0.266 million; and the rest of the liabilities are due to staff provident fund, publishers, brokers, taxes, social security, and the ADC.

The total fund balances of the General and Special Funds stood at P5.594 million in 1992. Other fund balances are made up of the endowment fund, P4.666 million; sinking fund, P0.134 million; staff development fund, P0.348 million; and others, P1.268 million.

The PSSC Budget for 1993

The budget of the Philippine Social Science Council for 1993 calls for an outlay and expenditure of P5,862,020 divided into P5,011,850 for the General Fund and P850,170 for the Special Fund. The budget was approved by the Governing Council on December 17, 1992 upon the recommendation of the Finance and Personnel Committee of the Executive Board which met on November 23, 1992. The preparation of the budget took into account the operation of the Council in the last three years (1990-1992) as well as the budgetary askings of the various working committees. The various items of the outlay and expenditure were estimated by taking into account present economic conditions.

General Fund. The projected receipts of P5.012 million is higher by 1.5 percent over that of P4.937 million in 1992. The expected receipts will be sourced mainly from the Center income, P3.132 million; the investment income, P1.500 million; and the Central Subscription Service (CSS), P0.300 million.

The expenditure program for 1993 calls for an Operating expense of P4.206 which is up by 20.6 percent over that of P3.487 million in 1992; and Council and Working Committees expenses of P0.806 million which is more by 28.1 percent over the P0.629 in 1992.

Special Fund. In 1993 the PSSC shall undertake three projects which are totally funded at P850,170 by The Toyota Foundation, National Statistics Office, and the UNESCO (Bangkok Regional Office).

The project funds are to be applied to the Surigao Archeological Project, P625,000; Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey, P175,170; and the Symposium on Environment and Sustainable Development, P50,000. A COMPILATION OF THE ANNUAL REPORTS OF ACTIVITIES OF REGULAR AND ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

INTRODUCTION

This section includes the annual reports of regular and associate member associations of the Philippine Social Science Council which were submitted in time for publication.

Some of these reports were summarized or rewritten to meet the constraints of space of the publication but most of them are herein reprinted in toto.

Out of the total of fifty (50) memberassociations – 14 regular and 36 associate – only twenty-one associations submitted their annual report on time.

Nine (9) regular members namely: Philippine Association of Social Workers (PASW), Philippine Economic Society (PES), Philippine Geographical Society (PGS), Philippine Historical Association (PHA), Philippine National Historical Society (PNHS), Philippine Political Science Association (PPSA), Philippine Sociological Society (PSS), Philippine Statistical Association (PSA) and Psychological Association of the Philippines (PAP) submitted their reports of activities for 1992.

For the associate members, twelve (12) were able to submit their reports. These are the Agricultural Credit Policy Council (ACPC), College of Mass Communication, University of the

Philippines (CMC-UP), College of Social Work and Community Development, University of the Philippines (CSWCD-UP), Congressional Research and Training Service (CRTS), Inc., International Institute of Rural Reconstruction (IIRR), Institute for Social Research and Development, St. La Salle University (ISRAD-SLSU), National Tax Research Center (NTRC), Research Institute for Mindanao Culture, Xavier University (RIMCU-XU), Social Research Center, Ateneo de Davao University (SRC-AdeDU), Research and Statistics Center, Bicol Univesity (RSC-BU), School of Urban and Regional Planning, University of the Philippines (SURP-UP) and Social Development Research Center, De La Salle University (SDRC-DLSU).

In general, the activity reports of the members focus on some of the following concerns: a) changes in organizational structure; b) new thrusts and programs; c) research projects and researchrelated activities; d) holding of semi-annual meetings, conferences or conventions; e) conduct of seminars, workshops and other training programs; f) contribution of articles to or publication of journals; g) holding of public fora and other forms of info-dissemination campaign; h) membership campaign; i)institutional development; and j) problems and recommendations.

I. REGULAR MEMBERS

PHILIPPINE ASSOCIATION OF SOCIAL WORKERS, INC. (PASWI)

The present set of PASWI National Board is finishing its second year term with greater resolve to unify and strengthen the Association. In affirming the initiatives of the first year, the Board reorganized the Working Committees to ensure better performance.

Efforts to increase membership and reach out and disseminate information to social workers nationwide were undertaken. The PASWI President was able to visit and attend the chapter Assemblies in Cebu, Iloilo and Cagayan de Oro. The interest and active response from the field are extremely encouraging. The need to update information, sharpen skills and share current trends in the various fields of practice as well as units were common concerns expressed during the visit. There were tremendous good will and ideas from colleagues in the Chapters. There really should be a direct and closer link between them and the Board.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership Committee

There was a marked increase in the Association's membership this year which can be attributed to vigorous information dissemination efforts and organization/reorganization of various PASWI chapters nationwide. The efforts of Rosario B. dela Rosa and Josefina Albao, past and present Chair are hereby recognized.

Membership increased by 125 from that of last year broken down as follows: 31 lifetime members, 190 regular members and 4 associate members.

There have been attempts to increase membership fees in order to meet current costs

but due to the fears that paid members might be reduced, the fees were not increased.

The Association has started through our part-time Secretary to provide assistance in the renewal of Social Work license with the Professional Regulation Commission. The complete listing of members has also been encoded in the computer and membership cards are now being issued to members who regularly pay their dues.

Chapter Committee

More and more social workers from the regions, provinces, cities and municipalities have been reached by the Association through the help of the newly created Chapter Committee now being headed by Ms. Rosario dela Rosa and Ms. Catalina Fermin.

For this year the following chapters have been organized/re-organized: Cagayan de Oro, Legazpi, Iloilo, Cebu, Tacloban and Zambales. Various activities and conferences are now being undertaken by these chapters.

Program Committee

Through the able leadership of Ms. Regina de Jesus, and the ever present assistance of her PMHA staff, the Committee was able to come up with relevant activities for the year as follows:

1. Forum on the topic "General Social Work Practice: A Sharing of Experiences" with Prof. John Cossom, Vice-President of Canadian Association of Social Workers as Speaker. This was held on February 11, 1992 at the PMHA Auditorium.

2. PASWI joined as co-sponsor in the 2nd University of the Philippine College of Social Work and Community Development Silver Anniversary Lecture Series on the topic "Roots of Despair, Seeds of Hope: Social Development in the 21st Century with Focus on Disability and Social Development". Dr. Deogracias Tablan, National Secretary of Rehabilitation International spoke followed by reactions from three panelists. This was held on March 3, 1992 at the U.P. Diliman.

3. Jointly sponsored with the Philippine Mental Health Association (PMHA) a forum entitled "Facts and Fallacies About Aids: Our Concern" on July 9, 1992 at the PMHA Auditorium. Three panelists, a social worker, a medical practitioner and a psychologist were invited for the purpose.

4. Lecture-forum on the "Effects of Science and Technology on Culture and Society" held on September 1, 1992 at the PMHA Auditorium. Dr. Nathan Strong, a Social Anthropologist from the University of California, USA was the guest lecturer.

Advocacy Committee

From the request of Sister Sandra, Rosario dela Rosa volunteered to SWAP Committees during the second quarter of the year. The Committee continued to support the concerns and issues which affect Social Workers nationwide. Through the initiative of Ms. Rosario dela Rosa, letters were sent to the Civil Service Commission and the DILG regarding the case of the social workers in Iloilo. Similar action was also made with regards to the official attendance of social workers in the celebration of Social Welfare Week.

The Association expressed its strong opposition to the proposed merger of the Department of Social Work and Development (DSWD) and the Department of Health (DOH). Through a joint resolution of the National Council for Social Development Foundation of the Philippines (NCSD) and the National Association of Social Work Educators, Inc. (NASWEI), this sentiment was brought to the Office of the President. Further, the Association sent a letter of thanks to the President for designating a professional social worker as Acting Secretary of DSWD. We also expressed our hope that Acting Secretary de Leon will be finally appointed as fullfledged Secretary.

The Association's Constitution and By-laws underwent review and enrichment which the members, during the PASWI Conference, unani mously endorsed and approved.

International Relations Committee

For this year the Committee headed by Ms. Annabellee Singzon continued to facilitate linkaging activities on accounting capacity with International Social Work agencies/ associations. The Committee was able to provide assistance to the PASWI delegates to the World Assembly of the International Federation of Social Workers (IFSW) held in Washington on July 18-22, 1992.

Efforts are being geared towards possible twinning with National Associations in some countries as Australia and the USA. The Committee has submitted several proposals on this important attempt to link us closer to colleagues abroad. A Special Report of the group headed by Vice-President Ninfa Franco is expected. During the Social Welfare Week celebration PASWI delegates will participate to echo the outcome of the World Assembly in Washington.

Publication and Research Committee

The PASWI is also involved in the Philippine Social Science Encyclopedia project where the Association was allotted some 300 pages. The President and the Vice-President attended the Council Editorial Board meetings which were also attended by the officers and members of other social science disciplines.

The PSSC has appointed the PASWI Disciplinal Board with Prof. Esther Viloria, former DSWD Undersecretary Rosita Fondevilla, PBSP's Aurora Tolentino, Prof. Ninfa Franco and the PASWI President. The articles which are written by professional social work practitioners and teachers are being prepared in three major areas: State of the Art of the profession, methods and practice, biographies and a glossary of terms and concepts. The manuscript is due to be submitted to PSSC by end of 15 December 1992. The Encyclopedia Project will be completed and published next year in time for the Silver Jubilee Celebration of PSSC.

Awards Committee

The Committee headed by Catalina Fermin was entasked with selecting appropriate individuals for awards to be given this year.

Last June 20, 1992 as nominated by the PASWI Board Ms. Gloria Gonzalez was named 1992 Most Outstanding Social Worker by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC). Philippine Association of Board of Examiners (PABE) and the Philippine Federation of Professional Associations (PFPA). The justification for the award will be provided the Committee later, inasmuch as the PASWI President was out of the country during the selection process. Just recently, Ms. Rosita L. Fondevilla was selected from among a list of nominees by the Committee to the Philippine Social Science Council's National Artist Award for Social Work. The members of the Committee are Ninfa Franco, Patricia Bernad, and Nina Hamili.

Publication Relations Committee

The Committee was able to facilitate press releases for PASWI activities and concerns, one of which was the news item on the NCSD-PASWI-NASWEI stand on the merger of DSWD and DOH. It is also responsible for advertising and promoting this occasion. **Continuing Education Committee**

In line with the Continuing Education Program, which is a prerequisite in renewing the Social Work License, a committee headed by Mrs. Catalina Femin was created by PASWI securing the application for the renewal of license to the profession. It will also review the guidelines for Continuing Education/Accreditation for Registered Social Workers. Two representatives from NASWEI to the committee will be requested. Relative to the devolution of DSWD, the Committee will advocate for the hiring of professional Social Workers by the Local Government Executive. The committee also plans to prepare Standard & Ethics for each Social Work field of practice.

Involvement with Government and Other Non-Government Agencies

The Association also got itself involved via attendance of Board members to other agencies/ associations such as the Philippine Cancer Society, Philippine Tuberculosis Society, Girl Scouts of the Philippines and others. Ms. Angela Ma. Pangan is representing PASWI in the Department of Education, Culture and Sports Technical Committee on Social Work Education as well as with the newly-formed DSWD Advisory Board.

PHILIPPINE ECONOMIC SOCIETY (PES)

Seminars

In order to provide a forum for the discussion of critical issues affecting the Philippine economy and society and to promote economics education in the country, the PES organized or co-sponsored various seminars.

With the support of the Friedrich Ebert Stiftung, the PES organized the following national and regional seminars: Seminar on Policies for Sustaining Development in the 1990s, Quezon City, April 3, 1992: The seminar discussed issues related to macroeconomic stabilization, industrial and agricultural policies, resources and environment policies, and the Local Government Code.

Seminar on Priorities for the Economic Development of Mindanao, Cagayan de Oro City, July 31, 1992: The seminar discussed issues related to autonomy and decentralization, provision of social services, the mining industry in relation to environmental protection, and the role of tourism in the development of the region.

The PES also co-sponsored the following seminars with national and international organizations:

Conference on Policies for Foodcrop and Agricultural Sector Development: Imperatives and Options, sponsored by Department of Agriculture in collaboration with the Philippine Institute for Development Studies and the Philippine Economic Society with the support of the Asian Development Bank, Asian Institute of Management, Manila, 25 March 1992.

Seminar-Discussion on Development and the Environment sponsored by Philippine Institute for Philippine Studies, Philippine Economic Society and the World Bank, Makati, July 15, 1992.

Symposium on Business and Economic Prospects sponsored by the Corporate Planning Society of the Philippines in cooperation with the Philippine Economic Society, Pasig, September 10, 1992.

In collaboration with Friedrich Ebert Stiftung, plans for the conduct of national and regional seminars for 1993 have recently been firmed up. A national seminar on the implications of AFTA on Philippine economic development will be held in Manila on February, while three regional seminars on the theme: World Competitiveness and Human Development will be held in Zamboanga in April, Bacolod in July, and Legaspi in October. AFTA Multisectoral Study Commission

The PES was a member of the AFTA (ASEAN Free Trade Area) Multisectoral Study Commission and participated actively in the Overview Committee of the Commission. The Commission was created by President Aquino through Executive Order No. 510. Among the Commission's tasks were to identify the issues and implications of AFTA and ASEAN Economic Cooperation on the Philippine economy and its industrial, agricultural, financial and service sectors, and to recommend guidelines, directions and policies for the government in its discussions and negotiations with the ASEAN governments in all areas of economic cooperation. Dr. Mario Lamberte ably represented the PES in the Commission.

Participation in the FAEA Annual Meeting

The 17th Annual Meeting of the Federation of ASEAN Economic Associations was held in Surabaya, Indonesia on November 15-17, 1992. This year's host was the Indonesian Economists Association. The theme of the Annual Meeting was "AFTA and Beyond". The discussions were focused on the political economy of AFTA and its potential impact to member ASEAN countries' trade and development with attention to specific industries. The participants agreed that while the AFTA Agreement started out a mainly political document, it is necessary to put economic content to such an Agreement..

This year's delegates to the Meeting were Drs. Mario Lamberte, Bruce Tolentino, Robert Teh, Jr. and Alejandro Herrin. Dr. Tolentino presented a paper on "The Impact of AFTA on the Food Processing Industry in ASEAN", while Dr. Teh presented a paper on "The Impact of CEPT Mechanism on the Philippine Agricultural Sector". Drs. Lamberte and Herrin acted as discussant and session chairman, respectively. Next year's meting will be held in Malaysia on September 1993, and will be hosted by the Malaysian Economic Association. The theme of the meeting will be "Trade in Services in ASEAN". The Philippines was assigned to prepare a paper on "Trade in Professional and Labor Services in ASEAN".

PSSC Encyclopedia Project

The Philippine Social Science Council (PSSC) has embarked upon a project called Philippine Social Science Encyclopedia Project. Under this project each member discipline was invited to prepare a manuscript that would contain: (1) history and current situation of the discipline; (2) biographical sketches of up to 10 outstanding practitioners of the discipline; and (3) major concepts and terms used in the discipline with corresponding explanation. The launching of the Encyclopedia is targeted for 1993 in conjunction with the Silver Jubilee Celebration of the PSSC.

In implementing the project, the Board requested a number of PES members to prepare parts of the required manuscript in areas of their own expertise. Dr. Gilbert Llanto is serving as PES coordinator of this project and has represented the PES in the PSSC Committee on the Encyclopedia Project. PES still has to receive the contributions of several writers before it can prepare the overall manuscript for submission to PSSC.

Training Workshops

The main activity of the Board for 1992 consisted of preparing for and holding the first "Training Workshop in the Teaching of Introductory Sociology." The program as conceived is a series of training activities for teachers in various regions of the Philippines, in answer to a need which has been expressed in surveys and past conferences of the Society. Not all sociology teachers in the schools and colleges of the country majored in sociology or have professional social science training.

The PSS was awarded a grant by the National Research Council of the Philippines to hold a pilot workshop in Nueva Ecija for teachers from the Cordillera Autonomous Region, Region 1, Region 2 and Region 3.

The workshop was held in Central Luzon State University (CLSU), Muñoz, Nueva Ecija on September 18-19, 1992 and was attended by 50 participants. Acting as resource persons and their topics were: Ricardo G. Abad – culture and social groups; Carolyn M. Añonuevo – socialization; Cynthia Rose B. Bautista – social change; Ledivina V. Cariño – research methodology; Virginia A. Miralao – stratification; and Clarissa A. Rubio – ergonomics.

The next workshop is being planned for May 12-14, 1993 in Lucena City for teachers in the Southern Tagalog region.

Plans for the PSS National Convention

Due to the large expense involved in holding national conferences, the PSS conventions are held every other year. The last convention was held in February 1991. The next one will be in October 1993 as part of the 25th Jubilee celebration of PSSC. It will be held in Cebu City on the theme "The Human Dimensions of Sustainable Development."

Social Science Encyclopedia Project

The Society is participating in the project of publishing an encyclopedia on the 13 social science disciplines under the PSSC umbrella. The PSS Discipline Editorial Board (DEB) is composed of Belen T. Medina, Virginia A. Miralao, Isabel Panopio, and Manuel Diaz.

In November 1992 the DEB revised its original list of topics for the sociology portion of the Encyclopedia. In addition to the history and state of the art of the discipline in the country, the sociology portion will carry articles describing the developments in the sub-fields or areas of sociology in the Philippines and the biographies of outstanding sociologists. A PSSC Council Editorial Board composed of representatives from the disciplines meets every month to report on the progress and problems of manuscript preparation. Prof. Belen T. Medina represents the PSS in this Council Editorial Board.

PHILIPPINE STATISTICAL ASSOCIATION (PSA)

The year 1992 was rather a busy one. Most objectives laid down in the Five-Year Plan approved in the Planning Sessions which met in the Development Academy of the Philippines in the middle of 1991 were achieved. In addition to these, the PSA celebrated its Ruby (40th) Anniversary in the last week of September this year. Among the significant activities are the following;

1. Membership – The membership increased in 1992 as follows:

These bring the total membership in 1992 as follows: Individual, 522; Life, 156: and Institutional, 1.

2. Quarterly meetings - There were two quarterly meeting conducted in the current year:

- a. April 22 Presentation of accomplishments of PSA in the Program for 1992.
- b. July 8 Restudy of the program to restructure the Philippine Statistical System. The study was triggered by the veto of the President on the enrolled bill reorganizing the Phil Stat. System in May this year.

3. Annual Conference held on October 29, 1992 also considered the reorganization of the Philippine Statistical System. This time, however, the consultation was made on a larger scale. Significant decision was to create an ad hoc committee to hear and evaluate the opinions of The PSSC Annual Report, CY 1992

various sectors on the issues raised in the quarterly meeting of July 8 and consequently write a substitute bill for presentation to the Congress. The Committee was composed of Drs. Tito Mijares, Cristina Parel, Mercedes Concepcion, the President of PSA, and one representative each from the House of Representatives and the Senate, and Ms. Carmelita Arce.

4. Training. Two projects were undertaken this year. These are: 1) Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Training of Field Personnel for the National Statistics Office and 2) Preparation of Training Manual for the Statistical Research and Training Center.

5. Celebration of the Ruby (40th) Anniversary, September 24-27, 1992. The celebration was highlighted by the following: 1) Opening Ceremonies (Sept. 24) managed by Bobby Ericta. On this occasion a video presentation: "The PSA through the 40 years" was staged. 2) The first Stat Quiz, which was managed by Butch Africa and Marge Guerrero was a complete success that moves are underway to institutionalize this activity. The quiz was a cooperative endeavor of the NSO, SRTC, DECS, DOST and San Miguel Corporation. 3) Testimonial Dinner (Sept 25) at the Nikko Hotel. Awards were given to three living founders and all past presidents of the PSA. Principal speaker was Mr. Jose T. Pardo, President of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry. 4) 5-K Fun Run (Sept 27) at the U.P. Academic Oval managed by Ruben F. Trinidad with the assistance of RUNNEX Club. There were 146 participants from NSO, NSCB, CB, SRTC, UP Stat Center, BIR, RUNNEX, and other offices.

6. PSA-ASAP Project. The multimillion peso cooperative project between USAID and PSA entitled "Statistical Development and Analysis in Support of the Agribusiness Sector" started in March 1992. The general objective of the project is to strengthen the national agricultural statistical system to be responsive to the data/information needs of the agribusiness sector and national food security. The project which is to run 30 months is divided into two component parts: 1) Censuses, Frames and Surveys and 2) Agribusiness Data System. PSA undertakes the operation with the Bureau of Agricultural Statistics with the active assistance of a pool of consultants from the NSO, DA, and the private sectors, representing livestock and poultry producers. Other private sector interests shall be considered also in due time. The total project cost is P63.9 million, of which P12.9 million have been released by the USAID. Total expended amount at the present is P8.9 million.

7. Finance. The financial viability of the PSA has never been as good this year compared to previous years. Receipts in 1992 exceeded that of 1991 by 44.4 percent. Disbursement in 1992 also arose by 62.5 percent over that of 1991. Despite the higher rise in expenditure our fund balance in 1992 still rose by 30.5 per cent over 1991.

Receipts in 1992 was P716.6 thousand compared to only P496.3 thousand in 1991. The bulk of income came from donations amounting to P235.0 thousand, representing one-third of total receipts. Administrative incomes amounted to P246.5 thousand, or 34.4 percent.

Disbursement in 1992 was P515.8 thousand as against the level of P319.4 thousand in 1991. The single biggest item of expenditure was the donation to a Statistics Professorial Chair at the University of the Philippines amounting to P171,103.89, representing the proceeds of the PSA raffles conducted in September this year. The level of expenditures fee Operating and Programs were almost of the same level as of last year.

The fund balance of the Association in December 1992 stood at P859.3 thousand compared to P658.5 thousand in 1991.

Recommendations:

1. Create a PSA Endowment Fund, the earning of which shall finance special projects of the PSA.

- a. The endowment fund shall be funded from donations received for this purpose and one half of the net annual surplus of the General Fund of the Association.
- b. Transfer the amount of donations received in 1992 to the Endowment Fund to become the seed money of the Fund. For information of the Board, these donations were given by the donor based on the promised that these amount shall form part of the PSA endowment fund.

2. Approved the proposed budget for 1993 calling for an income program amounting to P712.5 thousand and an expenditure program of P475.6 thousand. A P236.9 thousand surplus is also program. These amounts will be correspondingly adjusted if the Board of Directors approves the proposal to create the PSA Endowment Fund.

AGRICULTURAL CREDIT POLICY COUNCIL (ACPC)

A. Research Projects

- 1. Term Lending Research Project. Documentation analysis of the market for and profitability of term lending in the Philippines.
- 2. Documentation/Case Study of Innovative Credit Scheme. Consists of studies on the Grameen Bank Replication Project and other innovative credit schemes.
- 3. Evaluation and Efficiency Studies of NGOs, Self-Help Groups and Cooperatives. An evaluation of the relative efficiency of the different types of people's groups as credit conduits.
- 4. Credit Markets in the Fisheries Sector Under CARP. Presents credit patterns and availability in the aquaculture sector, and analyzes the CARP's impact on credit markets for the fisheries sector.

- 7. Rural Bank Rehabilitation Program Evaluation. Evaluation study of the Rural Bank Rehabilitation Program under CB Circulars 1142, 1158 and 1172.
- 8. An Assessment of Credit Guarantee Programs: A Second Look. A major study aimed at assessing the performance of agricultureoriented guarantee programs at the farmer-borrower level.

B. 1. Regular Activities

- a. Institutional Loans Monitoring. Monitoring of the volume of production loans granted by banks to the agriculture sector.
- b. Programs and Projects Monitoring. Monitoring of the performance and status of funds of various lending projects, credit guarantee schemes and insurance programs supportive of the agriculture sector.

- 2. Special Projects
- a. Inter-Agency Task Force for Monitoring Agri-Credit. A task force created to address the problems and data gaps in agricultural credit monitoring.
- b. Grameen Bank Replication Program Monitoring. Experimental credit programs such as the

Grameen Bank (GB) Replication Program are closely monitored on a regular basis.

- c. DAPCOPO Program Monitoring. Another regular monitoring activity involving innovative credit schemes.
- d. DA Special Foreign-Assisted Projects Mo itoring. This special activity resulted from an orientation/briefing given by the ACPC to the Department of Agriculture and other program directors in connection with its function of reviewing, monitoring and evaluating agricultural projects with financing components.
- e. Fisheries Sector Program (FSP) Monitoring. Involves monitoring developments on the FSP, specially on its credit component.
- f. Rural Bank Rehabilitation Program/CFI Enhance Program. An inquiry on the status of the rehabilitation program for the rural banking system as contained in CB Circulars 1143/1158/1172 and the CFI Enhancement Program.
- g. Rider Studies. Studies utilizing the household survey mechanism of the Bureau of Agricultural Statistics (BAS) and the Social Weather Stations (SWS) to gather data on credit at the farm level.

C. Agri-Credit Guarantee Programs Management

1. Comprehensive Agricultural Loan Fund (CALF)

a. GALF-GFSME (Guarantee Fund for Small and Medium Enterprises) Guarantee Program. Provides guarantee coverage for loans of small and medium enterprises, particularly small cooperatives engaged in agribusiness projects.

b. CALF-Bagong Pagkain ng Bayan Guarantee Program. Provides guarantee coverage for agricultural development loans of local government units. c. CALF-PCIC (Phil. Crop Insurance Corporation) Guarantee Program. Provides guarantee coverage for loans for the production of agricultural crops, livestock and aquaculture products.

d. CALF-QUEDANCOR (Quedan and Rural Credit Guarantee Corp.) Guarantee Program. Provides guarantee coverage for storable commodities such as grains (for farmer groups) and other allied products.

2. Special Credit Programs

a. Development Assistance Program for Cooperatives and People's Organizations. A lending program for national, regional or provincial-based federations of cooperatives and people's organizations to assist agri-based groups which are not serviced by banking institutions.

b. Fisheries Sector Program Credit Component. The FSP is an ADB-funded credit program managed by the ACPC-CALF. A credit seed fund has been established to support income diversification among marginal coastal fishermen, and intensification of aquaculture development.

c. Grameen Bank Replication Program. Initially an action-research program to test an alternative credit delivery mechanism for the poorest of the poor. The program provides support to NGOs/ cooperative rural banks, which are replicating the Grameen Bank model, through training, guarantee coverage for loans of beneficiaries, operating support fund, loan fund brokering, research and documentation.

d. Integrated Rural Financing Program. Provides comprehensive assistance to organized farmers' groups at very affordable terms, through the Land Bank's rediscounting program and the use of the credit line approach to financing.

e. Cooperative Bank Formation Assistance Program. Aims to help sustain the cooperatives' initiatives in establishing their own coopbanks by providing the necessary assistance to ensure their effectiveness and viability to service the banking and credit needs of its farmer members.

The University of the Philippines, through the College of Mass Communication in agreement with Tulane University has proposed a linkage under the AID University Development Linkage Program.

The linkage program between the two institutions aims to establish а sustained collaborative working relationship for an international, social mobilization training and research program. CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH AND TRAINING SERVICE (CRTS), INC.

1992 proved to be a year of breakthroughs in legislative development for the Congressional Research and Training Service (CRTS), a nonpartisan, nongovernmental legislative support structure. These include the setting-up of new programs such as the library, research and program development and the expansion of linkages with local and international organizations through the Congressional Studies Association of the Philippines (CSAP) and the International Legislative Support Services in Asia (ILSSA), both CRTS initiatives. Guided by a newly formulated framework for legislative development, CRTS geared its activities to enhance the institutional capability of Congress and the executive to produce quality legislation and to broaden the base of popular participation in the legislative process.

1. New Board of Officers

To ensure the continuity and direction of its programs, the CRTS elected a new Board of Officers for a three-year term. It is composed of the following: Dr. Socorro L. Reyes, President; Sheila S. Espine, Vice President; Ma. Vicenta Vega, Secretary; Rowena Bernardez, Treasurer; Marianne Mananzan, PRO; and Eden Hernandez, Board Member.

2. Legislative Training and Education

The Legislative Training and Education Division conducted skills-building workshops, information-orientation seminars, and consultation and agenda-setting seminars for Members of Congress, their staffers, and other sectors doing Congress-related work. These include legislative liaison officers from the Executive Branch, sectoral associations, people's organizations, regional legislative assemblies, and foreign dignitaries and visitors. The Legislative Information Development and Publication Division provides nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) and people's organizations (POs) with data and information on the status of legislation in five issue areas: environment and natural resources, economic reform, social justice and human rights, women, and local government. In November, the CRTS released its initial issue of the "Legisla tive Alert," a bi-monthly status report on the bills filed in the various committees to alert NGOs and POs on issues which may require their pro-active intervention.

4. Library and Documentation

A newly created division of the CRTS, the Library and Documentation Division provides front-line services responsive and relevant to the needs of researchers gathering data on a wide range of legislative issues and concerns. This "one-stop-shop" for materials and documents on the Philippine and foreign legislatures caters to walk-in researchers, who are ably assisted by two full-time staff.

The services of the Unit include: (1) Library Services, which maintains books, journals, monographs, published and unpublished theses/ dissertations and other materials related to legislation including basic information on the local legislative systems and affairs of different regions of the Philippines and basic facts about foreign Parliaments; (2) Legislative Documents, a compilation of committee reports, journals, directories and collection of bills, resolutions, and Republic Acts; and (3) Info Catalogue/Resource Database, a local and international catalogue of legislature-related materials that are found in different government agencies, academe and nongovernment or private voluntary organizations to assist users in locating such materials for their reference.

5. Legislative Research and Program Development

The Division is in-charge of three programs : research, women's legislative program, and local legislative development. The Research program involves researches related to legislative development in both the national and local levels of government. Its projects include a UNICEFfunded comprehensive legislative agenda for children called "Idealizing the Convention on the Rights of the Child" and "Documentation of the Experience of Sectoral Representatives in the Eighth Congress."

The Women's Legislative Program addresses the need to broaden women's participation in politics by providing support services such as and training research women in to nongovernmental and governmental sectors. Through this program, the CRTS initiated, together with the Women's Legal Bureau, coalition of 13 women's groups working to push for the enactment of woman-focused laws called Sama-Samang Inisyatiba ng Kababaihan sa Pagbabago ng Batas at Lipunan (SIBOL).

The CRTS also completed a one-year "Legislative Capability Building Project" for the Regional Legislative Assembly (RLA) of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) as part of its Local Legislative Development Program. The project involved the conduct of seven skills-building modules designed to enhance the technical competence of the Members and staff of the RLA.

6. Institutional Linkages and Networking

The CRTS made a major breakthrough in the international front when it established linkages with GOs and NGOs engaged in legislative support servicing during a "Regional Consultation Meeting of Legislative Support Services in Asia" held at the Manila Hotel last August 17-21,1992. As the convenor of this conference, the CRTS played a crucial role in organizing the International Legislative Support Services in Asia (ILSSA), a venue for cooperative legislative projects such as an Asia Databank, and a Regional Legislative Training and Research Academy. ILSSA is composed of GO and NGO legislative support structures of Bangladesh, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Mongolia, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Pakistan, Philippines, Taiwan, and Thailand. For two years, ILSSA's Secretariat will be based in Manila with Dr. Socorro L. Reyes as Chair of the Steering Committe.

The establishment of institutional linkages at the local level was likewise given priority. This was accomplished through the organization of the Congressional Studies Association oſ the Philippines (CSAP), a network of GOs and NGOs doing Congress-related work. Initiated by the CRTS, CSAP aims to provide a venue for complementarity in the area of legislative development. Other member organizations include the Congressional Planning and Budget Office. Institute for Strategic and Development Studies, Instructech, Makati Business Club, and the Ateneo Center for Social Policy. Its first major activity was a roundtable discussion on "The Impact of the Local Government Code on Congressional Legislation" held on November 25, 1992.

The CRTS also launched the People's and Nongovernmental Organizations Internship Program (POINT). POINT is a six-month intership in Congressional committees in both houses of Congress for workers in the various sectors such as the peasantry, labor, fisherfolks, urban poor, women, and indigenous communities. It aims to provide the NGO/PO community with direct experience and hands-on knowledge of the legislative process. In October, the first batch of interns representing labor, fisherfolk, and environment begun their internship at the House of Representatives.

7. Plans

To respond to the needs of the newly-elected Congress of the Philippines, CRTS is continuously strengthening its existing programs and developing new ones. In January, it will offer a comprehensive six-month training package which will evolve into a Certificate in Congressional Studies. Likewise, it will launch another one-year legislative skillstraining program designed to enhance the institutional capability of the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Albay in January.

In the international front, CRTS has firmly established the foundations for long-term networking with legislative support structures of other countries. This coming year, the Steering Committee will meet again to translate into action ILSSA's agenda for legislative development.

NATIONAL TAX RESEARCH CENTER (NTRC)

A. Major Projects/Studies

1. Survey of the Effectiveness of Various Fiscal (Tax/Duty) Incentive Provisions

The project analyzed the present incentive legislations and regulations administered by BOI and other government agencies engaged in investment and incentive promotion. Based on the response of selected BOI registered enterprises, needed reforms were proposed.

2. Revenue Models for Various Levels of Local Governments

Developed three (3) Revenue Model Codes for the province, city and municipality based on the new Local Government Code. Together with the Revenue Models, instructive guides to local government units were also prepared to enable them to conduct tax codification with minimal assistance from the Department of Interior and Local Government or external tax codification experts.

 Progressivity of Individual Income Tax, CY 1982-1988

The study compared the degree of progressivity of the individual income tax in 1982 and 1988 in view of the tax developments that were instituted during the period.

The study showed that income distribution remains inequitous since majority of tax filers (80%) are still receiving at most P60,000 annually. An improvement in the income distribution of tax filers was noticeable in 1988 with the upward shift in the distribution of tax filers. The relative progressivity of the tax structure improved from 1982 to 1988 as the value of index increased from 0.45 in 1982 to 0.48 in 1988. This indicated the transfer of the part of the tax borne by the lower income group to the more affluent group. Moreover, the upward adjustment in the exemption levels in 1991 is expected to further improve the progressivity of the individual income tax.

5. Tax Performance Analysis, 1990-1991

The study measured the effectiveness of collecting agencies in dispensing their functions by evaluating their actual collections and goal targets.

Tax effort was noted to increase from 14.4% to 15.0%. This was attributed to improved collection efficiency, introduction of new tax measures, and growth in tax bases.

By agency disagreggation, the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) fell short of its target by P1.98B while the Bureau of Customs was above goal by P4.2B. Other agencies likewise exceed planned revenues.

6. Taxation Reforms During the Past Six Years (Major Developments in Taxation, 1986-1991)

The paper consolidated reports on taxation and problems confronting tax administration during the stated period.

It noted significant gains that enhanced the tax system's productivity, equity and efficiency when the 1986 Tax Reform Package was adopted. However, the number of tax laws passed from 1986 to 1991 also led to substantial reduction in revenue collections due either to the lowering of tax rates or the grant of numerous tax exemptions and other fiscal incentives.

Lastly, the study suggested a review of the existing laws particularly on income taxation and then indirect taxes to plug loopholes and improve equity and revenue productivity. In addition, it also considered providing full administrative, legal and budgetary/financial support to tax administrators to achieve set higher standards of efficiency and integrity among these personnel.

7. Comprehensive Income Tax Reform Package

The report composed of six (6) consolidated feasibility studies on direct taxation. Among those included in the package were the simplified net income scheme (SNITS) on corporation, preferential tax treatment of mutual life insurance companies, increasing income tax rates on interest income derived by OBUs from foreign currency loans and discounts to residents, scheme for introducing automacity in the adjustment of personal and additional exemption allowances, granting fixed income earners of employment standard deduction (ESD) and adoption of a 20% creditable withholding tax on interest income from foreign currency deposits.

The development of the capital market remains critical in the country's over-all development due to its role in the mobilization of savings and channeling of investment into productive endeavors. This realization led the private sector to initiate the development of the capital market in the country. The government, in turn, has responded.

The government's role centers on providing the necessary environment conducive to investment and savings and its efficient allocation. Specifically, attention was called on rationalizing the monetary, fiscal and regulatory policies to induce savers and investors to channel their resources into the financial system. It underscores the need to have tax policies that will not be a hindrance but an inducement to the growth of the capital market in the country. Towards this end, the various taxes imposed on capital market instruments are being re-examined to make them more responsive to the development of the capital market with the least

RESEARCH INSTITUTE FOR MINDANAO CULTURE (RIMCU) · Xavier University

The Research Institute for Mindanao Culture (RIMCU) is the social science research arm of Xavier University. During the past year it has undergone a number of important changes, both in its organizational structure and in terms of new research opportunities. This report briefly reviews these new developments.

1. Changes in Organizational Structure

Throughout its 35 year history, RIMCU has been directed by Francis C. Madigan, S.J. The year 1992 saw the end of this long and able tenure. This change consisted of two components. First, the Institute adopted a new set of By-Laws which are intended to guide the course of future decision-making. Under this new system, a Senior Research Council (SRC) has been created. Major policy decisions affecting the Institute must be referred to the SRC. RIMCU Research Associates (professional researchers holding a graduate degree in one of the social sciences) make up, along with the Institute's Operations Manager, the membership of the SRC. The RIMCU By-Laws were formally adopted by the Xavier University Board of Trustees during its March meeting.

It was also during 1992 that Father Madigan announced his intention of stepping down as the RIMCU Director. He was replaced in early June by Dr. Michael A. Costello. Dr. Costello holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Sociology from the University of Chicago. He has been a Research Associate with RIMCU since 1978 and the Institute's Deputy Director since 1983. His research interests include Philippine demographic issues, rural development patterns, ethnic relations and labor force patterns.

Dr. Erlinda M. Burton was subsequently appointed as RIMCU's Deputy Director. As in the case with Dr. Costello, he will hold this office for a three-year term. Dr. Burton received her Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of Pittsburgh. Her special interests are cultural studies, Philippine tribal groups, women, and medical anthropology.

The remaining Research Associates now include Fr. Madigan, Dr. Marilou Palabrica-Costello (on leave), Dr. Imelda Pagtolunan, Mrs. Magdalena Cabaraban, and Mrs. Lita Sealza.

2. New Programs.

Two new programs have been initiated under Dr. Costello's tenure. The first of these is a research dissemination program being undertaken with the cooperation of the Office of the President, Xavier University. A concerted effort is being made under this program to prepare condensed versions of research reports for release to local and national print media. To date, more than twenty articles have been published under this new program, which is being coordinated by Ms. Marites Khanser.

A second innovation is the recent finalization of plans for an official RIMCU retirement plan. This is an especially appropriate step insofar as many of the original employees of the Research Institute are now in the middle of their productive careers, thereby leading them to see the necessity of planning for their retirement years.

3. Research Projects

A complete listing of research projects conducted during the year may be found in Appendix A. The two major fields of research include health and nutrition-related studies (with six projects) and labor force/manpower studies (with three). Other areas include gender roles and economic planning (with two studies each) along with one marketing research study and one statistical/methodological analysis.

4. Meetings and Seminars

In October the Institute held a research dissemination seminar which outlined the findings from a study of child labor patterns in Region X, as was undertaken by Mrs. Lita Palma-Sealza.

5. Problems and Recommendations

Some of the future priorities of the Research Institute include the following:

1. Recruitment of additional Research Associates, including at least one graduate degree holder in Economics;

2. Upgrading of procedures for disseminating reports, reprints and papers to a wider audience;

3. Increased interaction with GOs and NGOs;

4. Implementation of a modest scholarship program for recent B.A. degree recipients; and

5. Upgrading of the RIMCU library facilities.

RESEARCH AND STATISTICS CENTER (RSC) Bicol University

1. Changes in Organizational Structure or Election or Appointment of New Officer

On July 16, 1992, Dr. Jose P. Leveriza was appointed Director of Research, vice Dr. Virginia C. Orense whose appointment has expired. Moreover, Dr. Virginia C. Orense was promoted Professor II. On August 14, 1992, a professor from the Bicol University College of Arts and Sciences, Mrs. Vilma E. Bahoy was transferred to Research and Statistics Center as Professor I. For the whole year, the Center was manned by the Director and six (6) non-teaching staff. The six (6) teaching personnel of the Center were mainly serving the respective colleges where they have teaching loads.

2. New Thrusts and Programs

Agriculture, fisheries and socio-economic researches were still the focus of the Bicol University in its R & D thrusts and programs for 1992. Aside from the three (3) main commodities assigned to Bicol University by the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Forestry and Natural and Resources Research Development (PCARRD), Bicol University encouraged research activities in Science, Technology and Engineering by tapping the faculty from the College of Engineering. During a 5-day seminar-workshop on April 6-10, 1992 held at Bicol University, the faculty were required to develop project proposals for possible funding by PCIERD, NRCP, PCASTRD, and other councils within the Department of Science and Technology, Metro Manila. Besides, the RSC evaluated research proposals for implementation in 1993. The research projects were submitted for consideration and approved by PCARRD representatives during the Regional Tripartite Budget Dialogue on November 24, 1993 held at Bicol University, Legazpi City.

4. Holding of Semi-Annual Meetings, Conferences or Conventions

The BU In-House review was conducted by Bicol University Research and Statistics Center last June 1, 1992. It is a yearly activity which evaluates completed, on-going researches as well as extension development projects of the University. The participants are faculty researches and faculty personnel. Last November 24, 1992, a Regional Tripartite Budget Dialogue was conducted by Bicol University Research and Statistics Center, Department of Budget and Management. BICARRD and PCARRD representatives. The Dialogue was done to evaluate research proposals for 1993 implementation. The proponents whose proposals were considered for 1993 were invited to a meeting for them to know their approved financial budget for their research projects. The Center oftentimes called for conferences/meetings of researchers specifically of Bicol University and other funding agencies.

5. Conduct of Seminars, Workshops, and Other Training Programs

The Bicol University Research and Statistics Center conducted a seminar-workshop for the faculty of the College of Engineering, Bicol University, Legazpi City on April 6-10, 1992. The output consisted of 11 project proposals for possible funding of Philippine Council for Industry and Energy Research and Development (PCIERD), PCASTRD and NRCP (national Research Council of the Philippines). 6. Contribution of Articles to or Publication of Journals, holding of Public Fora and other forms of info Dissemination Campaign

One article was submitted to NSO regarding the CAFES (Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Evaluation Survey) Project.

7. Membership Campaign

Other faculty members who showed interest in research were invited to join on-going researches so that they could become part of the local research network of Bicol University.

8. Problems and Recommendations

Problems:

1. Monitoring research activities in the different colleges for lack of BURSC personnel.

2. The budget of the Center is steadily decreasing, thus even if more research proposals were generated, the research function of the University could not be improved since it has not yet been given full financial support.

3. Updated studies and literature on socio-economic, agriculture, fisheries, engineering and institutional studies were seriously needed for the preparation of research proposals.

4. The Research and Statistics Center is undermanned, especially statisticians and data encoders.

Recommendations:

1. Re-assignment of designated research coordinators because they are more familiar with the on-going activities of the faculty in their respective units/colleges.

2. Develop additional/new outside funding sources, both local and international. This calls for strengthened/revitalized linkages with funding sources. 3. Closer information networking with other research institutions/agencies.

4. Search for statisticians in the different colleges of the University to be available on call whenever researchers require their services, they may be deloaded or, if not feasible, they should be hired on honorarium basis.

This report presents the highlights of the programs and activities of the School of Urban and Regional Planning from January to December 1992.

A. Academic Program

A. 1 Conduct of Faculty Conference

The School held a faculty conference to finalize its proposed diploma program and to discuss other issues affecting the academic programs.

A.2 Approval by the Curriculum Committee of the Diploma Course in Land Use Planning

The School's proposed one-year Diploma Course in Land Use Planning was approved by the Board of Regents on January 30, 1992. Launched in the first semester of AY 1992-1993, the course is designed to respond to the needs of local government officials to upgrade their planning skills given their additional responsibilities through the enactment of the Local Government Code.

A.3 Approval of the Proposed Field of Specialization (Transportation Planning) in the Masters Program

Another curriculum proposal submitted by the School was the addition of a new field of concentration in its Master's program namely transportation planning. The specialization in transportation planning recognizes the need to find workable solutions to the complex problems arising from poor transport planning and management. The course will involve support resources from the Transport Training Center and the College of Engineering. It was also launched in the first semester of AY 1992-1993.

B. Research Activities

The School, through its Foundation, PLANADES conducted several research studies in collaboration with government agencies, local governments and foreign funding institutions. The major studies include the following:

Completed

B.1 Urban Land Reform Consultancy Project (Land Access)

A project funded by the UNDP in behalf of the United Nations Center for Human Settlements (UNCHS), it seeks to: a) obtain an accurate picture of the existing situation on the allocation and distribution of land ("actual access") for housing the urban poor; b) identify the relevant aspects of the Philippine experience on the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP); c) Recommend policy guidelines, legislative and administrative measures and institutional arrangements for more effective and efficient implementation of Urban Land Reform in the study areas.

B.2 Comparative Evaluation of Regional Development Experiences in ASEAN Countries

The study documented the various stages in the evolution of regional development policies in the Philippines. Recommendations in terms of national and regional policy reforms and systems and procedures for regional development planning were presented, with the Bicol Region as a case study area.

B.3 Lingayen Gulf Coastal Area Management Planning Project

The project involved the finalization of the coastal area management plan prepared for Lingayen Gulf which included the formulation of a conceptual framework for common property management (CPM); the prioritization of proposed projects; and the establishment of administrative and implementing mechanism to guide the implementation of the Management Plan.

B.4 Organizational Behavior and Industrialization: Lessons from TNCs in the ASEAN Region

The study is an investigation on the decision-making process and management style of selected transnational corporations (TNCs) particularly on matters pertaining to general administration, personnel, production, and marketing management among others. The study also presented the impacts of TNCs on local industries, local resources, and its effects on the environment.

B.5 Jetafe Ro-Ro Port and Industrial Estate Pre-Feasibility Study

The Project involved the establishment of a Bohol West-Northwest Coast Agro-Industrial Urban-Domain of development compatible with its resource potentials and the provincial and regional development goals.

B.6 Decentralized Shelter and Urban Development Project (DSUD)

Decentralized Shelter and Urban Project commonly known as DSUD is a USAID funded project which is administered by the Planning and Development Collaborative, Inc. (PADCO). The PADCO subcontracted the services of PLANADES to produce the following:

i. Comparative report on the critical features of the a) Metropolitan Manila Commission (MMC-CIF); b) Capital Investment Planning (CIP) systems in two (2) other cities in the country; c) CIP systems that were developed in the Provincial Development Assistance Program (PDAP) of the USAID; d) the Local Development Investment Program (LDIP) of the NEDA; and e) the CIP systems in two foreign cities (Bangkok in Thailand and Jakarta in Indonesia).

ii. A proposed Capital Investment Planning (CIP) System for Philippine cities including the corresponding Manual of Procedures.

iii. Relevant workshop documents and materials.

B.7 Towards the Relocation of Selected Families of Guagua, Pampanga: An Evaluation

The study evaluated the project which aimed to improve the socio-economic conditions of the residents affected by the Mt. Pinatubo eruption though the implementation of a package of intervention to include skills training, livelihood, health and infrastruc ture.

On-Going

Metro Manila Infrastructure Utilities and Engineering Program

Phase II

A World Bank-sponsored project which aims to help the municipalities and cities surrounding Metro Manila and Calabarzon area develop and upgrade its environment by providing the necessary utilities and infrastructures.

Pipeline

A group of planners and scientists from Bangladesh visited the School last July 31, 1992 to explore possible areas of collaboration between the UP PLANADES and the Bangladesh Academy for Planning and Development (APD). The proposed collaborative program will be funded through the Technical Assistance Project of the APD as well as from other sources to be explored by both institutions.

C. Training and Extension

C.1 Extension Activities

The School continued with its participation in the following National Government Committees of which it is a regular member.

C.1.1 Inter-agency Local Planning Assistance Program

Initiated and led by the Department of Interior and Local Governments (DILG), this extends technical assistance to local government units in upgrading their capability in town planning.

C.1.2 Environmental Education Network of the Philippines (EENP)

This is a 17-member organization whose objective is the promotion and strengthening of programs in environmental education.

C.1.3 International Training Network on Low-Cost Water Supply and Sanitation (ITN)

This network, organized by the Local Water Utilities Administration (LWUA) in 1990, seeks to respond to the need for improvements in community health and environment.

C.1.4 UP Promote Sensing and Geo-Information Systems Network

An ad hoc committee which included a representative from SURP conduct training programs as well as instituting academic courses in remote sensing and GIS using a multi-disciplinary approach.

C.1.5 Environmental Sanitation Information Center Network (ENSICNET)

ENSICNET is a network for the exchange of information on environmental sanitation. An ADB-funded, it aims to strengthen and develop the national environmental systems of China, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines and Vietnam.

C.2 Training Activities

The School conducted the following training programs during the period:

C.2.1 A Training Program on Metropolitan and Urban Planning of BLIST Areas

The Program was participated by the officials and personnel of the local planning and development offices of Baguio City, La Trinidad, Itogon, Sablan and Tuba; the regional offices of national agencies and the provincial offices from February 11- April 4, 1992.

Aimed to equip the participants with the necessary skills in the preparation of metropolitan structure and municipal master plans.

C.2. Seminar-Workshop on Investment Programming for the Natural Resources Management and Development Program Personnel (NRMDP)

Aimed to upgrade the skills of the participants in the area of investment programming and to develop their ability to put into operation programs and projects with specific locations, beneficiaries, implementation scheme and funding sources. Thirty (30) selected staff members of DENR central and regional offices attended the seminarworkshop from May 25-29, 1992.

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH CENTER (SDRC) - De La Salle University

A. Organizational Information

The SDRC (formerly DLSU-RC) was established in 1979. It has been undertaking research in furtherance of the University's commitment to the development of the country and its people. Its research projects address impotant development concerns: population, education, health care delivery, international contract labor, upland resource management, women and youth, and social equity.

SDRC also provides training programs in evaluation research and social analysis of development programs, research methodologies and teaching of the social sciences.

The SDRC is headed by Dr. Robert C. Salazar, with the following as researcher associates: Dr. Irma Coronel, Ms. Stella Go, Ms. Ma. Elena Chiong-Javier, Dr. Pilar Ramos-Jimenez, Dr. Exaltacion Lamberte, Dr. Jesusa Marco, Dr. Trinidad Osteria, and Dr. Carmelita Quebengco.

B. Research Projects and Other Research-Related Activities

1. Participatory Uplands Management Program (PUMP)

Started in 1981, PUMP, a research and action program, seeks to assist upland communities in effectively managing their resources. This has been done in close coordination with other institutions in order to reorient them toward community-based, participatory approaches to sustainable upland development. The major projects under this program include:

- a. Technical Support to DENR-UDP. The director and research staff continue to be active members of the Upland Development Working Group (UDWG) and the Agency Technical Committee of the DENR respectively. As ATC members, the staff became involved in committee work particularly in designing guides and in planning for trainings and workshops for DENR personnel and extension workers. They also participated in workshops, conferences organized by the DENR-UDP either as moderators, facilitators or resource persons.
- b. Upland Research Studies. Two studies are on-going: one looks at cross-farm visits as a strategy for technology transfer while the second investigates the issue of selling stewardship certificates. These were undertaken to generate lessons needed for policy formulations and project implementation.
- c. Philippine Uplands Resource Center (PURC). PURC which is a consortium of four institutions continues to meet the long-term need for information resources on the uplands. Its total library collection now includes 3,183 volumes of books and manuscripts and four video cassettes. PURC also serve as secretariat of the Upland NGO Action Committee (UNAC).

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- d. Pundasyon Hanunuo Mangyan School (PHMS). This is a pilot action-research project that addresses the development needs of the Hanunuo Mangyan in Oriental Mindoro by establishing a culture-based elementary school.
- e. Training/Apprenticeship of Two Hanunuo Mangyan Community Leaders in the Management of their own community school. This "hands-on" training of at least two Mangyan leaders in basic school management is being undertaken as a prelude to the full turn over of the school to the Mangyan community.

2. Rapid Appraisal of High Risk Communities: The Case of Pasig, Taguig and Kaloocan City. This rapid appraisal project identified high risk communities and came up with relevant baseline information on them.

3. Health and Nutrition Status of the Health Seeking Behavior Among Families in Depressed Urban Communities. This research project on urban poor communities in Metro Manila is composed of two parts: (1) epidemiology study to identify the major diseases that pose significant health risks to urban poor residents, and 92) health-seeking behavior study to explain the health-seeking behavior of the urban poor families. The study hopes to provide more information along the health situation among urban poor communities.

4. Information Collection and Recording System: The Situation Among Primary Health Facilities in the National Capital Region (NRC). The study analyzes the experiences of health centers with respect to data collection and management specifically in the use of the Field Health Services Information System (FHSIS) of the Department of Health. The study hopes to come up with guidelines for effective collection and recording of data using the FHSIS.

5. Management Studies and Social Science Research in Support of the Upland Development Program. This project consists of two parts: (1) management studies and (2) preparation of the final manuscript of the monitoring and evaluation manual.

The management studies attempt to cull the lessons learned from the pilot projects of the Upland Development Program in terms of project planning, implementation and control, and based on these lessons to come out with recommendations on how the management systems can be better adapted or integrated into the Integrated Social Forestry Program.

The manual on monitoring and evaluation was completed and published.

6. Task Force on Social Science and Sexual/Reproductive Health. This project is tasked with identifying how the social scientist can help the biomedical scientist in providing medical services to the people, particularly providing disadvantaged women service for their reproductive health needs. This can be identified by a research agenda that the Task Force members will come-up with after they make a biosocial framework at the end of the Task Force's six-month term.

The vision of the Task Force is for the women to have a better life through participation in the various forms of production in society, other than the reproduction of the specie. This can be done by providing women with relevant and correct information about sexual and reproductive health and on how to tackle sex and health related issues.

7. Innovative Health Care Management: Lessons from Case Studies of Selected HAMIS Awardees. The study aims to provide DOH-GTZ with case descriptions and analyzes of 10 selected Health and Management Information System (HAMIS) project awardees which are to be used as data inputs for improved health care management in the Philippine grassroots context and the management of the forthcoming HAMIS contests. Emphasis is on investigating the ways in which the project cases are able to serve a defined poor populace and how this populace responds to project undertakings.

8. Socio-Cultural Determinants of Induced Abortion in Developing Countries: The Case of Manila, Philippines. This research project is a part of a multi-center study which is being coordinated by the Institute of Population Studies, University of Exeter. This expects to find the factors which are associated with an increased risk of abortion both in the community and in the hospital environments. By comparing, not only the demographic but also the socio-cultural characteristics of women who underwent abortion, to those who did not, it is expected that policy- makers will have a better understanding of a high risk population, to which more intensive sexual/ family planning education and follow- up may be applied.

C. Seminar/Training

1. Seminar Series on the Local Government Code and its Implications. These were held during the early months of 1992.

2. Regional Consultation on Social Policy Development in Asia. The two-day consultation attended by participants from Thailand, Indonesia and the Philippines reviewed the nine issues/ concerns identified from the UN interministerial consultations on social policy. The possibility of setting-up a regional network for research, information, and technical exchange in social policy development was explored. Priority areas in research for regional collaborative efforts were also identified. This was held June 8- 10, 1992 at De La Salle University.

3. Talk on Prostitution, Condom Use and HIV in Thailand. This was held July 13, 1992, with a guest lecturer, Dr. Nicholas Ford from the University of Exeter.

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PSSC RESEARCH AWARDS PROGRAM GRANTEES

GOVERNING COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS CY 1992



- I. Calling of the meeting to order. The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m.
- Proof of Quorum. Eleven out of fourteen members of the Governing Council were present
- III. Approval of the minutes of the meetings held on 15 February 1992 and 17 June 1992. The minutes of the meetings were approved as presented.

IV. New Business

A. The President's Report

Dr. Torres presented the mid-year accomplishments of the Philippine Social Science Council. According to her, for the 1st half of 1992, PSSC addressed a number of social concerns such as the archaeological and cultural study of Surigao treasures, agrarian reform, and environmental issues. PSSC was also involved in projects and Ma. Amylene Dizon Susan Evangelista Araceli M. Fampo Marcial M. Frias Irma Gonzales Ofelia Labra Lourdes S. Pacuribot Julia Raymundo Emily Tuzon Ma. Gina Lina Tuzon Lydia G. Wenceslao

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activities in collaboration with government and NGOs. Organizationally, she reported that there was an ongoing assessment of the structure, functions, and bylaws of the PSSC. She also said that the Council is planning for the 1993 Silver Jubilee and the National Social Science Congress III.

Finally, she expressed optimism that with these activities, "a more dynamic Council will be achieved that will be able to assume broader functions in the face of new challenges in the 90's."

B. Integrated Report of the Regular and Associate Members

Prof. Ruben F. Trinidad rendered the integrated report of the regular and associate members of the Council. He noted that the activity reports of the members underscored their continuing commitment to enhance the role of social sciences in influencing changes in Philippine society.

He observed, however, that the achievements of the members could have been more far-reaching had external as well as internal problems affecting the associations not been persistent. Among the problems cited were the lack of funds, the limited involvement of individual members of the associations due to their heavy workload, and the concentration of PSSC activities to Metro Manila.

With these problems, the members made the following recommendations: (1) the need to assess the strengths and weaknesses of each member with focus on the positive role of strong leadership and active participation; (2) the need for PSSC to decentralize its activities through greater involvement province-based member of organizations and promotion of nation wide cooperation among social scientists; and (3) the need for PSSC to take initiatives in advocating certain institutionalization of mcchanisms responsive to the needs of the social science disciplines students, and practitioners.

Finally, Prof. Trinidad stressed that the success of the Council's endeavors to effect social change would always depend on the extent of the collective efforts of the members as one body.

C. Open Forum

Prof. Aguilar acted as forum moderator.

1. Other activity reports of members

Dr. Bauzon reported that the PNHS is holding its National Conference on "Local and National History" on October 15-17, 1992 at the Mindanao State University in Tawi-Tawi. He also said that the Society recently signed its fourth Memorandum of Agreement with the University of Santo Tomas providing for joint collaboration in researches, symposia, and other activities.

Dr. Tan informed the body that the PAP will have a conference on August 21-22, 1992 at the

Philippine Normal University with the theme "Personal Transformation as a Requisite to National Stability and Prosperity."

Prof. Alfiler reported that the Philippine Society for Public Administration (PSPA) participated in the 40th anniversary of the College of Public Administration, University of the Philippines last June 1992.

Dr. Suleik said that the PSA is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year an among its activities are a raffle draw, a statistical quiz for freshmen U.P. students, a fun run, and a testimonial evening.

2. Report of the Bylaws and Membership Committee

Prof. Alfiler said that the By-Laws Committee is looking at the structure of the Council. She said that the Committee is awaiting the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on PSSC Structure before it will submit its proposals on amendments to the By-Laws.

Prof. Alfiler also said that the Membership Committee has proposals to promote active participation of the members.

Dr. Torres added that the Committee in general was asked to formulate guidelines on representation and participation of the members to the Council's activities. Specifically, the measures sought to address the issues of: (1) whether or not it is possible to have fixed representation in the PSSC committees and (2) whether or not the Council will take steps to sanction members who have incurred a number of absences from meetings of the Council. She said that these guidelines will be sent to the members for their study and consideration.

92-08-01 With respect to the suggested sanctions, the Philippine Society for Public Administration (PSPA) representative conveyed their reactions: (a) Dr. Santos informed the body that the PHA had approved the recommendations of the Membership Committee in toto.

3. Update on the Encyclopedia Project

Dr. Salita briefed the body on the progress of the project. He said that the target date for completion is on December 1992. So far, each discipline is represented at the Editorial Board, discipline editorial boards were formed, and writing of the manuscripts is ongoing.

4. PSSC Silver Jubilee celebration

Dr. Torres discussed the year-long program of activities of the Council for its Silver Jubilee celebration. The activities cosnist of a symposium on sustainability of development, walk for a cause, Valentine's day party, Mt. Banahaw trek, holding of National Social Scientists Awards, cultural night, raffle draw, and the holding of the Third National Social Science Congress (NSSC III) as the culminating activity.

She also announced that PSSC is offering its auditorium facility for free to the members whose activity themes are related to sustainability of development which is the PSSC's theme.

Prof. Aguilar encouraged the members to volunteer for various committees in charge of the celebration or suggest ways to improve it.

With respect to the NSSC III, Dr. Torres said that its principal sponsors are the PSSC, the National Research Council of the Philippines, and the Pi Gamma Mu International Honor Society. The Pi Gamma Mu, according to Dr. Ventura, is celebrating its 60th year of existence and its initial activity will take off with the holding of a roundtable discussion on August 27, 1992.

PHILIPPINE SOCIAL SCIENCE CENTER FUNCTION PROFILE CY 1992

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AMENDED BY-LAWS OF THE PHILIPPINE SOCIAL SCIENCE COUNCIL, INC. (S.E.C. REG. NO. 37048)

AS OF (July 27, 1988)

ARTICLE I - NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. (PSSC) is a non-stock, non-profit, nongovernmental, and nonsectarian organization for scientific, cultural, and educational purposes. (As amended, December 10, 1977 and further amended July 27, 1988).

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES

The PSSC intends to consolidate the resources of local social scientists by providing the leadership likely to enhance their impact on the improvement of the quality of life of the nation and the development of a just and humane society. To this end the PSSC shall undertake measures: (As amended July 27, 1988.)

a) To seek and take the necessary actions to cultivate among the different social science associations and disciplines, areas of common interest that concern social problems and go beyond the specific interest of any particular association, discipline, or profession; (As amended, December 10, 1977)

b) To strengthen the voice of the social science disciplines, associations and professionals by participating in discussions and opinion making and by promoting and assisting their various journals through the creation of a central publication and subscription service, through press releases, news bulletins, special publications, and sponsoring of public symposia and forums; (As amended July 27, 1988).

c) To offer to the government, business, and other sectors assistance in social science research and education, policy formulation, and program development;

d) To develop stimulate, support, or encourage social science research projects particularly those of a cooperative and multi-disciplinary nature, that tend to meet problems of national and\or international scope; (As amended, December 10, 1977).

c) To suggest priorities for the funding of research projects and other activities undertaken by the PSSC or by social scientists; (As amended July 27, 1988).

f) To offer advice on priorities in questions of thesis and dissertation support, graduate assistantships, faculty exchange programs, social science faculty development programs, and fellowship programs for advanced studies;

g) To serve as a clearinghouse for the collection and exchange of information on research and other related activities in the social sciences and to make recommendations on the current national and international issues; (As amended July 27, 1988).

h) To assist persons and organizations engaged or interested in the social sciences with respect to placement opportunities and similar activities and information such as the strengths of various training institutions and the availability of grants and scholarships local and abroad; (As amended July 27, 1988).

i) To serve as administrator of fellowship, scholarship, training and research grants, from foreign and local sources; (Entirely new provision, July 27, 1988).

j) To advocate sound policies for good government that will sustain growth and develop a more egalitarian national community. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988).

k) To render consultancy and training services in planning, policy making, surveys, feasibility studies, program and project development, evaluation, monitoring and management of socio-economic activities. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988).

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The PSSC shall have three categories of members:

Regular **A**. Members are those duly established, qualified, independent, private, non-profit national societies, associations, or organizations, actively engaged in any or several of the various social science disciplines, which publishes a journal or a similar learned publication at least once a year and whose membership is open to qualified social scientists, and agree to report periodically the institution/associations' activities to the PSSC on or before December 31 of each year. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

B. Associate Members are those duly established and qualified social science research institutions, organizations, centers, government research agencies and the like, actively engaged in any or several of the various social science disciplines where membership is restricted to those who are employed and/or enrolled in them and whose organization is a contributor to or publisher of a journal or a similar learned publication at least once a year and agree to report periodically their activities to the PSSC, on or before December 31 of each year. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

C. Affiliate Members are those duly established and qualified foreign social science research institutions, organizations, centers, and the like whether locally or foreign based, actively engaged in any or several of its various social science disciplines where membership is restricted to those who are employed and/or enrolled in them and whose organization is a contributor to or publisher of a journal or a similar learned publication at least once a year and agree to report their activities to the PSSC, on or before December 31 of each year. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 2. Discipline Limitation. For purposes of qualification, the social science disciplines shall be limited to the following for the present:

Anthropology
 Communication
 Demography
 Economics
 Geography
 History
 Linguistics
 Political Science
 Psychology
 Public Administration
 Sociology
 Statistics

Section 3. Admission of Members. Admission to membership in the PSSC shall be by invitation only. A regular member may sponsor any number of qualified societies, associations, or organizations for admission as regular, associate or affiliate members. An invitation is extended upon the recommendation of the membership committee and indorsed by the Executive Board to the Governing Council for approval of membership by at least two-thirds (2/3) vote of all the members of the Council. Membership shall take effect upon the payment of the annual dues. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 4. Membership Dues. The annual dues of regular, associate and affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board which shall take effect the following calendar year. A two-thirds vote of the members thereof shall be required to change the current membership rate. Until the Executive Board decides otherwise, the fees for regular members shall be P500.00 per year, for associate members, P250.00 per year, and affiliate members shall be US \$500.00 per year. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 5. Membership Evaluation. To ensure thorough evaluation of all proposals for membership and to renew the status of members, the Executive Board shall appoint a Membership Committee of not more than five members. This Committee shall report to the Executive Board and submit recommendations for proper action. (As amended July 27, 1988)

Section 6. Membership Rights and Privileges. Regular, associate and affiliate members shall be entitled to privileges as may be determined and promulgated by the Executive Board. The PSSC has no authority over the internal affairs of its member associations. (As amended July 18/21, 1984)

ARTICLE IV - COUNCIL

Section 1. Governing Body. The governing body of the PSSC shall be the Council. The

policies established by the Council shall be carried out by the Executive Board which shall also act on matters of urgency. The Council shall meet at least six times a year. In February, April, June, August, October and December of each year. The time, date and place shall be determined by the Council, except that the meeting in February and August shall always be held on the third Saturday of February and August, and shall be known as the annual and mid- year meetings respectively. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and amended July 27, 1988).

Section 2. The Council shall be composed of:

A. The President or one authorized representative of each of the social science societies that has been admitted to membership in Category A (Regular Members). (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended as proposed July 27, 1988)

B. The President or one authorized representative for each of the duly established and qualified social science research institutions, organizations, centers, government research agencies, university departments, and the like that has been admitted to membership in Categories B and C (Associate and Affiliate Members). (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988)

C. The ex-officio members who are the immediate past chairperson of the Council, the President and the Executive Director. (New provision, July 27, 1988).

Section 3. If for any one discipline more than one national society have been admitted to membership in Category A, these societies shall be requested to decide among themselves through their representatives what their joint vote shall be on matters taken up by the Council. In case agreement cannot be reached, no vote shall be counted for that discipline. It shall be the policy of the Council, however, not to admit more than one national society or organization per discipline. (As amended December 14, 1985 and further amended July 27, 1988).

Section 4. Powers. The powers of the Council shall be the following:

1. The Council shall elect the members of the Executive Board during its annual meeting, in accordance with the list of nominees presented by the Nomination Committee, and on the basis of one vote per discipline duly represented by one or more regular members of the PSSC.

2. It shall approve the admission of new discipline into the PSSC.

3. It shall determine the basis, objectives and general policies of PSSC. It shall approve, amend or modify the proposed program of major activities submitted by the Executive Board. Upon general approval of the scope of activities, the Executive Board will have the corporate powers to implement such a program, including the administration, receipt and disbursement of funds. (As amended July 27, 1988).

4. It shall receive and approve the Council's annual and financial reports and audit the receipt and disbursements of funds and properties of PSSC as administered by the Executive Board including such funds entrusted to PSSC by other organizations. (As amended July 27, 1988).

5. It shall approve the budget. (As amended July 27, 1988).

6. It shall appoint the auditors upon the recommendation of the Executive Board. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 5. Officers of the Council. The officers of the Council are the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and the Executive Director in his

capacity as Secretary of the Council. (New Provision July 27, 1988 amendment.)

Section 6. Chairperson. The chairperson of the Council shall be elected by members belonging to category "A" from among themselves at their first meeting. He shall serve for a period of two (2) years until his successor is duly elected and qualified. He is not eligible for immediate reelection. He shall preside over the meetings of the Council. He shall be head of the PSSC. The chairperson will be an ex-officio member of the Executive Board. Should the chairperson cease to be the regular PSSC Associations' (Category "A") representative in his second year as chairperson, the association where he comes from may designate its representative to the Council. But the incumbent chairperson continues to finish his second year term as such. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

Section 7. Vice-Chairperson. The vicechairperson shall be elected by the Council from among themselves. The term of office is one year without prejudice to reelection. In case off absence or inability of the chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson shall exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the chairperson. He shall have such powers and duties as the governing Council or the chairperson may from time to time prescribe. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988)

Section 8. Attendance at Council Meetings. Council meetings shall be attended by the President or duly authorized representative of each member organization classified as Category A who shall be properly certified. Members under Category B and C shall attend only meetings in February and August. All meetings of the Council shall be held at the principal office of the PSSC, unless the Governing Council and the Executive Board decide to hold the meeting elsewhere. (As amended July 27, 1988.) Section 9. Voting. At any meeting of the Council, each discipline represented by one or more regular members in good standing shall be entitled to only one vote duly given in writing and presented personally to the Secretary of the PSSC for inspection and recording at/or prior to the opening of the meeting. No proxies shall be accepted. Associate and affiliate members in good standing shall not vote but may be heard at any meeting of the Council. (As amended July 18/21, 1984)

Section 10. Quorum. A quorum for any meeting of the Council shall consist of a majority of the authorized representatives of regular member associations in good standing present personally, and a majority of such quorum shall decide any questions at the meeting, save and except in those matters where the Corporation Law requires the affirmative vote of a greater proportion.

Section 11. Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the Council shall be held on the third Saturday of February of each year, at the time and place to be determined by the Council chairperson. Written notice of the annual meeting shall be sent to each member-representative in good standing at least two (2) weeks before the date set for each meeting. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

Section 12. Special Meeting. Special meetings of the Council may be called by the chairperson or upon recommendation of the Executive Board or at the request of at least one-third (1/3) of the authorized representatives of regular member associations to the Council in good standing. A written notice stating the day, hour, place, and purpose of the meeting shall be sent at least four (4) days before, to each member in good standing. (As amended July 27, 1988) Section 13. Order of Business. The order of business at the annual meeting of the Council shall be as follows:

(1) Proof of the required notice of the meeting;

(2) Proof of the presence of a quorum;

Provision for recognition of representatives

(3) Approval of the proposed agenda;

(4) Approval of minutes;

(5) Report of the Executive Board;

(6) Unfinished business

(7) Other business; and

(8) Election of Executive Board members for the ensuring year.

Section 14. Procedural Rules. Unless otherwise specified, Robert's Rules of Order shall be the basic rules of procedure in all proceedings of the Council. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 15. Compensation. Memberrepresentatives of the Council shall not receive any compensation for their services. (As amended July 27, 1988)

ARTICLE V - EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. Number and Qualifications. The Board of Directors of the PSSC shall be known as the Executive Board. The Executive Board of the PSSC shall consist of not more than fifteen (15) elective members cach being the solc representative of one of the disciplines mentioned in Art. III, Scc. 2. A Board Member must be a member of good standing of a learned/professional association which is a regular member of the PSSC; he shall be selected on grounds of distinction in terms of professional integrity and achievement. One cannot simultaneously be a

member of the Executive Board and an authorized Council-member representative. The chairperson of the Council and the Executive Director shall be ex-officio members of the Board with no voting rights. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended December 12, 1987)

Section 2. Powers. The powers of the Executive Board are the following:

1. The Executive Board shall exercise the corporate powers of the PSSC in carrying out the business and affairs of the PSSC. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988).

2. It shall implement the general policies and objectives established by the Council according to its best judgment and discretion.

3. In matters of urgency, it shall be empowered to act on behalf of the Council even beyond the scope of the established general policies and objectives. Nevertheless, it shall notify the Council of its actions at the earliest convenient time.

4. It shall administer and control the properties and funds of PSSC as well as those funds and projects entrusted to the PSSC.

5. It shall create such subsidiary bodies or committees which may be necessary to carry out the functions of the PSSC.

6. It shall supervise and oversee the Secretariat and the subsidiary bodies of the PSSC.

7. It shall establish a working relationship with government offices, non-governmental organizations, financial and educational institutions, and professional social science organizations, both here and abroad. (As amended July 27, 1988). 8. It shall, when so invited, mediate and arbitrate conflicts among social science disciplines and associations.

9. It shall promote participation and membership in the PSSC or other professional social science associations and research organizations.

10. It may delegate to any officer or member of the Executive Board such powers and duties as it may deem proper and which may be allowed by law.

11. It shall submit reports every quarter to the Council summarizing its accomplishments, projects and programs being undertaken or to be undertaken and the problems connected thereto. (Entirely new provision. July 27, 1988)

Section 3. Quorum. A majority of the members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business, and every decision of the majority of such quorum, duly assembled as a Board, shall be valid as a corporate act, save and except in such matters in which these By-Laws or the Philippine Laws may require the affirmative vote of a greater proportion of the members.

Section 4. Board Meeting. The Executive Board shall meet within two (2) weeks after their election by the Council in order to elect their officers and to transact any other business. Thereafter, the Board shall hold regular monthly meetings at such time and place as the Board may prescribe. Special meetings may be called by the President, or upon the written request of four (4) Board members, giving the purpose of such meetings. Notices of all special meetings shall be given at least four (4) days previous to the date fixed for the meeting. In case of inability on the part of a member to attend a meeting, he may send his duly authorized representative. However, his representative shall not be entitled to vote. (As

amended December 10, 1977 and further amended July 27, 1988).

Section 5. Vacancies. If any vacancy shall occur in the Executive Board as a result of disability, death, resignation, or removal for cause by the Executive Board, such vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled from the recommendees of the association/organization concerned by the majority vote of the quorum present in a meeting of the Executive Board. The action of the Board shall be submitted for review by the Council at the next meeting of the Council. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further July 27, 1988).

Section 6. Minutes. Minutes of the meetings of the Executive Board shall be kept and carefully preserved as a record of the business transacted at such meetings. The minutes shall contain such entries as may be required by law, such as:

- (1) Calling the roll;
- (2) Approval of the agenda;

(3) Disposal of or action on the minutes of the previous meeting;

- (4) Unfinished business;
- (5) New business; and
- (6) Adjournment

Section 7. Allowances. Members of the Executive Board and Council may receive per diems and/or allowances to be determined by the Board for attending meetings. Any change in per diems and/or allowances shall be effective on January 1st of the year following its approval. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27. 1988).

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Executive Board shall be a president, a vice-president, a Treasurer, and an Executive Director who shall act as the secretary. With the exception of the Executive Director and Secretary, all the Officers of the Executive Board shall be elected by the Board Members from among themselves. (As amended December 14, 1985 and further amended July 27, 1988)

Section 2. President. The President shall be elected by the Executive Board members from among themselves. The President shall also be an ex-officio member of the Council. The term of office is for two years starting with the election in and he is not eligible for February "1990" reclection. Should the president cease to be discipline representative in his second year as president the association where he comes from may designate his replacement. The president shall preside over the meetings of the Board. He shall be the chief executive officer and shall be responsible for the effective execution of the policies determined by the Council and further defined by the Executive Board. He shall have general supervision over the affairs properties and employees of the PSSC. He shall appoint with the consent of the Executive Board all members of the committees. He shall submit quarterly reports to the Council. He shall perform such other duties which the Board may delegate to him from time to time. (Entircly new provision July 27, 1988).

Section 3. Vice-President. The Vice President shall also be elected by the Board from among themselves. The term of office is one year without prejudice to reelection. In case of absence or inability of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the President. He shall have such powers and duties as the Executive Board or the President may from time to time prescribe. (Entirely new provision amendment July 27, 1988)

Section 4. Secretary The Secretary must be a resident and citizen of the Philippines; he shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Council, Executive Board, and all committees, in a book or books kept for the purposes; he shall keep in safe custody the seal of the PSSC, and when authorized by the Executive Board, affix such scal to any paper or instrument requiring the same. The corporate seal of the PSSC shall always be attested to by the signature of the Secretary. The Secretary shall have charge of the reports, records, documents and papers as the Board may direct. He shall make such reports and perform such other duties as are incidental to his office or are properly required by the Executive Board and by the He shall attend to the giving and President. serving of all notices when required either personally or through the services of the Secretariat. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Section 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds, receipts, and disbursements of the PSSC. He shall deposit all moneys and other valuables of the PSSC in such bank or banks as the Executive Board may designate. He shall render to the President or to the Executive Board, whenever required, an account of the financial condition of the PSSC and of all transactions made by him as Treasurer. He shall keep correct books of account of all transactions of the PSSC, which shall be subject to annual independent audit. (As amended July 27, 1988).

All checks paid out or endorsed by the PSSC shall be signed by the Treasurer or the Executive Director and countersigned by the President or the Vice-President. (As amended July 27, 1988). However, as determined by the Executive Board, subsidiary accounts may be authorized for purposes of administration for subsidiary committees; in these cases, the signatories may be determined by the Executive Board. The Treasurer shall also be elected by the members of the Board from among themselves. The term of office is one year without prejudice to reelection. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988)

Section 6. Executive Director. The Executive Director shall act concurrently as the Secretary of both the Council and Executive Board. He shall be selected jointly by the Governing Council and the Executive Board and appointed by the President for a term of three years without prejudice to reappointment. He shall be the chief operating officer who shall oversee the implementation of the programs and projects of the Council and its consulting and training services. He shall coordinate with the working committees in the performance of their duties. He shall head the Secretariat whose functions are provided under Art. VII thereof. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988).

Section 7. Vacancies. In case of temporary absence of any officer or for any other reason that the Executive Board may deem sufficient, the Board may, by a majority vote, delegate the powers and duties of such officer to any other officer, or to any Board member for the time being, provided such delegation is not covered by any express prohibition of these By-Laws (As amended July 18/21, 1984).

Section 8. Creation of New Positions or Committees. The Executive Board may create such other positions or committees subject to review and approval by the Governing Council as may be necessary to further the affairs of the PSSC, specifying the duties and responsibilities that are attached to such positions or committees. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

ARTICLE VII - SECRETARIAT

Section 1. There shall be a Secretariat of PSSC that shall be responsible for maintaining an efficient staff for servicing the requirements of the Council, the Executive Board and the officers of PSSC in pursuance of the objectives of PSSC.

Section 2. The Executive Director shall be in-charge of the administration, direction and supervision of the Secretariat and receive instructions from the Executive Board through the President in the implementation of the Board's policies and decisions. As such, the Executive Director shall be the signatory of all contracts on behalf of the Executive Board, provided that in his absence the Board may designate another signing officer. (As amended July 19/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988)

a) He shall assist the Treasurer in the performance of his dutics and responsibilities as defined in these By-Laws. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988)

b) He shall make full reports on the organizations, membership, finances, program activities and accomplishments at least once a year. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended December 12, 1987)

c) He shall perform such other functions as may be assigned to him by the Executive Board or the Chairperson from time to time. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended December 12, 1987)

d) The remuneration of the Executive Director shall be fixed by the Executive Board. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended December 12, 1987

ARTICLE VIII - FRIENDS OF PSSC

Section 1. There shall be a body to be known as the friends of PSSC, composed of five to nine individuals, known for their commitment and capability of promoting the social sciences through funding and resource generation among others. (Entirely new provision, July 27, 1988.)

Section 2. The Executive Board shall choose the members of the Friends of PSSC for a term of five years on a staggered basis. The Chairperson of the Council, the President and the Executive Director shall be ex-officio members of the Friends of PSSC. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988.)

Section 3. This body shall meet at its pleasure or upon the request of the Executive Board. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988.)

Section 4. This body may be consulted by the Executive Board on matters that will advance the objectives and interest of the PSSC. (Entirely new provision July 27, 1988.)

ARTICLE IX - FISCAL YEAR

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the PSSC shall begin on the first day of January and shall end on the last day of December of the same Calendar Year. (As amended December 10, 1977 and further amended July 27, 1988.)

ARTICLE X - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. Elections. The members of the Executive Board shall be elected by the authorized representatives of the regular member-associations of the PSSC (Article V. Sec. 1) in good standing at its annual meeting and shall hold office for three (3) years and until their successors are duly elected and qualified to be held on the third Saturday of February of each year. Members of the Board are to be elected on a staggered basis with an annual turnover of one-third of the membership. The term of office for the newly elected members of the Executive Board will commence on March 1st following their election. They shall be elected for a term of three (3) years and shall not be eligible for immediate reelection, but may be renominated to the Executive Board after three years. (As amended December 10, 1977, December 14, 1985 and further amended July 27, 1988)

Each discipline represented in the Board shall be entitled to only one (1) vote. (As amended December 10, 1977)

Section 2. Nomination Committee. The Nomination Committee shall consist of three (3) members appointed by the Chairperson on or before November 15 of each year. Members of the Committee will be chosen from among the authorized representatives of professional associations which are regular members of the PSSC. (As amended July 27, 1988).

Not later than the end of December of each year, the Nomination Committee shall request the regular member associations to submit their nominees to the Executive Board. Each regular member association may nominate one or more candidates. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and further amended July 27, 1988)

Qualifications (Art. V., Sec. 1) and other relevant particulars about nominees, including their acceptance of the nomination and their ability to attend Executive Board meetings, if elected, shalt be circularized to all the authorized representatives of regular member-associations to the Council at least two (2) weeks before the annual meeting.

Incligible for nomination are members of the Nomination Committee. (As amended July 18/21, 1984 and July 27, 1988).

Section 3. Committee on Elections. At the annual meeting of the Council, the elections of the members of the Executive Board shall be held under the direction and supervision of the Committee on Elections. This Committee shall consist of three (3) members appointed by the Chairperson of the Council from among the representatives of regular members of the Council. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

The elections shall be done by secret ballot and the vote of each nominee shall be counted accurately and honestly, and shall be duly recorded as certified by the Committee on Elections. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

Section 4. Oath of Office. The new members of the Executive Board and Officers of the Council and the Board shall take their oath of office not later than two (2) weeks after their election. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

ARTICLE XI - PUBLICATIONS

Section 1. Authorization. Publication of journals, newsletters, reports, monographs, proceedings or other publications, by the PSSC, may be authorized by the Executive Board. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

Section 2. Editorial Boards. Each periodical published by the PSSC shall have an Editorial Board consisting of an Editor and such other personnel as may be appointed by the President with the consent of the Executive Board. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

Each Editorial Board shall recommend publication, subscription, and distribution policies for the approval of the Executive Board. It shall survey all periodicals carrying materials of interest to the PSSC and devise means of mutual aid and cooperation. The term of office and compensation of Editors and personnel of each periodical publication shall be fixed by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE XII - CORPORATE SEAL

The corporate seal of PSSC shall be in such a form as may be approved by the Executive Board in accordance with government regulations. (As amended July 27, 1988.)

ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Articles of Incorporation. The Articles of Incorporation of the PSSC may be amended by at least two thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Council entitled to vote at any regular or special meeting duly called for the purpose.

Section 2. By-Laws. Any By-Laws may be amended or repealed by at least a majority of all the members of the Council entitled to vote at any regular or special meeting duly called for the purpose.

Section 3. Procedure. Proposals for amendment may be submitted by the Executive Board or by a petition by at least three (3) representatives of regular, associate or affiliate members to the Council at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of the Council. An amendment originating by petition shall be referred to the Executive Board for its recommendations as to ratification. (As amended July 18/21, 1984)

Section 4. Ratification. Following action by the Board, the Secretary shall furnish a copy of the proposed amendment and the Board's recommendation in a communication address to the Council. If the proposed amendment is urgent, a special meeting is called; otherwise the amendment shall be submitted to the Council for approval or ratification in accordance to Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this Article on its regular meeting. (As amended July 27, 1988.)
