FOREWORD

Mindanao incarnates the many contradictory faces and phases of development. A land of promise it was and continues to be. But like any political birthing, the promise and potentiality are being fleshed out in the arena of contestation and conflict.

Mindanao is a constellation and condensation of historical circumstances and political forces unmatched in other parts of the country. Rich and fiercely independent cultural legacies have survived the ravages of the colonial past and today remain as the material and spiritual edifice of alternative visions of development and nationhood. At the same time, the entire geo-economic landscape of the region has been drastically reshaped and transformed by powerful transnational corporations.
